

SUMMARY OF HIGHER EDUCATION SPECIAL ITEMS

The Eighty-first Legislature, Regular Session, 2009, directed the Legislative Budget Board and the Higher Education Coordinating Board through Section 54 of the Special Provisions Relating Only to State Agencies of Higher Education in the 2010–11 General Appropriations Act to study the higher education special items listed under the Special Item Goal in preparation for the Eighty-second Legislative Session:

Sec. 54 Special Item Study. The Higher Education Coordinating Board and the Legislative Budget Board shall use the appropriations in this Act to study each item under the Special Item Support Goal in preparation for the 82nd Legislative Session. The study shall include but not be limited to determining:

- a.) if the special item is for "start up funding" and if so, for how long should it be continued,
- b.) does the institution get formula funding for the item and should the item be reduced by an equal amount and,
- c.) does the item still serve its original purpose and if so, how long should it continue.

It is the intent of the Legislature that items identified as "start up funding" only be funded for six years after the inception of the program.

SPECIAL ITEMS

Higher Education Special Items are loosely defined as items that are not supported through formula funding and support the special mission of the institution, such as the McDonald Observatory at the University of Texas at Austin. However, special items can also be used to support new academic programs or address geographic disparities and other inequities among institutions. Special items are categorized into four objectives for the general academic institutions, Texas State Technical Colleges, Lamar State Colleges and system offices (instructional support, research, public service, and institutional support) and five objectives at the health related institutions (residency training, research, health care, public service and institutional support).

In response to Section 54, Special Item Study, the Higher Education Coordinating Board and the Legislative Budget Board developed a questionnaire to survey the institutions concerning their special items. The surveys form the basis of this report.

In this report, the Higher Education Coordinating Board and the Legislative Budget Board provide the information in a format that will assist the Legislature in determining the disposition of special items pursuant to the questions presented in the rider and identifying other characteristics of the special items.

There are 323 special items listed under the Special Item Support Goal in the 2010–11 General Appropriations Act totaling \$1,242.6 million, including nineteen new items funded through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). These items range from \$65.6 million for the Paul L. Foster School of Medicine at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center to \$45,764 for a coastal zone laboratory at Texas A&M University at Galveston. The median special item appropriation in 2010–11 is \$14.3 million.




FIGURE 2 2010–11 SPECIAL ITEM FUNDING

Overall, special item funding has grown 85 percent over the past five biennia (**Figure 1**). Special Item funding has increased from 4.3 percent of higher education funding in the 2002–03 biennium to 5.5 percent in the 2010–11 biennium. As special item appropriations have increased over this time period, the health-related institutions' share of the total has increased (**Figure 2**).

The number and funding level for each special item is specifically identified by the Legislature for each institution. The percentage of direct state support (defined as General Revenue, ARRA and certain General Revenue—Dedicated) provided through special items and the number of items vary widely between institutions (**Figure 3**) ranging from 66.4 percent at University of North Texas System Office to 2.6 percent at the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center.

FIGURE 1 SPECIAL ITEM FUNDING



INSTITUTIONAL ENHANCEMENT

Institutional Enhancement totals \$400 million for the biennium or 32.2 percent of total special item funding. The strategy was created for all institutions in the 2000–01 General Appropriations Act, when the Seventy-sixth Legislature consolidated and reduced the number of special items by rolling several into one strategy. For the General Academic Institutions the Eighty-first Legislature decided to convert as much non-formula funding from the Excellence strategy in the Operations Support goal and the Institutional Enhancement strategy into formula funding. As a result of this funding methodology swap, Texas A&M University is the only institution without an Institutional Enhancement strategy, because all of the funding was converted to formula.

REVENUE-CONTINGENT APPROPRIATIONS

Several institutions receive special item appropriations that are contingent on the Comptroller of Public Accounts certifying that the activities supported by the appropriations will generate additional revenue to the state. Seventeen of these appropriations, identified by Section 48 of Article III Special Provisions, support three networks of Small Business Development Centers (SBDC) around the state. A fourth SBDC network in that provision is supported by an appropriation made to a community college, and is not listed here. Eight institutions receive revenue-contingent appropriations for other business incubators and centers. (**Figure 4**)

TEXAS COMPETITIVE KNOWLEDGE FUND

The Eightieth Legislature created a special item called the Texas Competitive Knowledge Fund to support faculty for the purpose of instructional excellence and research at four institutions (**Figure 5**). Funding amounts are based on a three-year average of total research expenditures as reported in the Accountability System at the Higher Education Coordinating Board. The Eighty-first Legislature increased the appropriation to \$126.2 million from its original appropriation of

\$93.2 to maintain funding levels at \$1 million for every \$10 million in research expenditures. Though the Eighty-first Legislature did not make new appropriations to them for the 2010–11 biennium, riders in the bill patterns of three additional institutions, The University of Texas at Dallas, The University of Texas at El Paso, and The University of Texas at Arlington, indicate that upon attaining a three-year average of \$50 million in research expenditures, \$5 million in General Revenue funds appropriated to the institution will be considered an appropriation for the Texas Competitive Knowledge Fund.

START-UP FUNDING

There are twenty-one special items reported as "start up" funding by the institutions (**Figure 6**). Three of these items are for new institutions (UNT Dallas, A&M San Antonio, A&M Central Texas), two support the expansion of the University of Texas at Tyler and Texas A&M University—Texarkana into four year institutions, and two

support the opening of a new Texas Tech Health Sciences Center's Paul L. Foster School of Medicine in El Paso, and the expansion of the Texas A&M College of Medicine.

Twelve of the special items that were reported as "start up" funding by the institutions are over six years old. The largest items in this group are the new Paul L. Foster School of Medicine at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, and the emerging universities in Dallas, San Antonio and Killeen.

Community Colleges, while not included under Sec. 54, of the Special Provisions Relating Only to State Appropriations of Higher Education, have eight special items totaling \$13.9 million in 2010–11.

Detailed information as reported by each institution follows.

1 Science Education Center

Start Year: 2002 2010 2011

Appropriation \$300,000 \$187,031 \$187,031

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

To train pre-service and in-service science teachers by offering them standards based inquiry science instruction coupled to rigorous science content in all major disciplines with innovative methods to improve their content knowledge and teaching skills. Also, to expand teacher training activities for science education majors significantly, provide direct contact outreach activities to students, promote Science, Math, Engineering and Technology (STEM) workforce development across the state, and increase the number of students in the graduate programs.

How did the Special Item originate?

It started in Seventy-seventh Legislature, Regular Session. Senate Bill 1 (General Appropriations Act)

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

Formula funding will not be able to support this program in the near term, though it may be possible for the newly funded UTeach Arlington program to assume some of the SEC's responsibilities once the 5-year grant period is over and the program is firmly established.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

This funding supports the offering of courses for students in the following programs: Master of Arts in Interdisciplinary Science, Master of Education in Curriculum & Instruction - Open Option, Interdisciplinary Studies undergraduate students seeking certification at the elementary and middle school levels. In addition, the SECC provides general support to all undergraduate majors in the College of Science by providing study materials for loan, a group study lounge, a quiet study area and a computer lab. In the 2008-2009 academic year, 11,651 items were checked out from the SECC resource desk for student use. The SECC also loans standards-based, nationally field-tested science teacher kits to area teachers free of charge. During the school year, we typically have multiple kits checked out to teachers every week. The SECC also serves as the home for the ExxonMobil Science Ambassador program that has performed science demonstration "magic" shows for over 24,000 K-12 students.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Without the special item appropriation it would be necessary to eliminate the Master of Arts in Interdisciplinary Science program for science teachers that has produced 73 graduates since its inception in 2001. Without the line item funding, the Science Education and Career Center (SECC) at UT Arlington would be forced to close. In the 08-09 academic year, the SECC checked out 11,651 study materials to UTA students. The students that work at the check-out counter are supported by the line item, as is the administrative assistant that manages the student workers. Part of the salary for the SECC's director is paid from the line item. This director is responsible for procuring the grant and gift funds that augment the outreach and science education efforts of the SECC. In addition, the SECC director also serves as the liaison between the College of Education and the College of Science. The director is heavily involved in teacher certification issues and in putting together teams across the colleges to apply for private, federal and state grants. These teams have brought in almost \$3.5 million since 2007. These efforts would be curtailed if the director were forced to teach additional courses to compensate for lost salary. The ability to host ExxonMobil Bernard Harris Summer Science Camps would be compromised if this line item was not funded since the SECC director's time as executive camp director is part of the required match required by the grant.

2 Automation and Robotics Research Institute

Start Year: 1986 2010	2011

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

ARRI's mission is to enhance the global competitiveness of the manufacturing sector in Texas. This is accomplished by 1) working with existing manufacturing firms and 2) by creating a world class micromanufacturing cluster that will lead the way into the economy of the future. The recently established Texas Microfactory is a one-of-a-kind facility integrating research, development, education, training, pilot production, and commercialization.

Micro and nano scale systems technology is an emerging field. While much effort has been spent on the underlying science, the commercialization of this technology is limited by a lack of a systematic approach to manufacturing, which in turn leads to high costs, long delays in product introduction, and also poor yields.

By pioneering micromanufacturing, ARRI is positioning Texas as the global leader that will attract both startup and large corporations. We anticipate the creation of around 10,000 new, direct, high tech jobs in the next decade. More specifically, ARRI's leadership in automation at the micro and nano scales will make it possible to retain these jobs in Texas, and virtually eliminate the flight of manual assembly jobs to cheap labor markets.

Much of the micromanufacturing work at the Texas Microfactory is aimed at the defense sector, and contributes to the protection of our troops and to better medical treatment for casualties and returning veterans.

How did the Special Item originate?

It was started in Sixty-Ninth Legislature, Regular Session. House Bill No. 20. General Appropriation Act.

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The Automation & Robotics Research Institute (ARRI)

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

ARRI would be unable to sustain operations and none of the above accomplishments would be achieved.

The University of Texas at Arlington 3 Rural Hospital Outreach

Start Year: 1978 2010 2011

Appropriation \$75,000 \$45,802 \$45,802

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The original mission to provide continuing education programs to nursing staffs of rural hospitals in 15 counties surrounding Tarrant County has been achieved and expanded. The RHOP, based on requests for service, provided education to 159 counties' long term care, home health, mental health facilities, and Critical Access hospitals. The RHOP personnel are actively involved in both state and national rural health organizations, meeting another mission of the RHOP. The UT Arlington College of Nursing faculty deliver both the face to face and on-line programs that are requested by rural health care facilities to ensure state of the science quality care.

How did the Special Item originate?

It started in Sixty-fifth Legislature, regular Session. H.B. 510. The program was launched by the University of Texas System College of Nursing at Fort Worth. The Fort Worth campus of the UT System College of Nursing was established in 1971 and became a part of The University of Texas at Arlington in 1976. The Rural Hospital Outreach Program was one of the first major efforts of the College of Nursing to respond to local community needs, especially rural communities. Very early in the development of the College of Nursing, a rural focus was initiated and has continued to present. These efforts resulted in a two-year grant from the Sid Richardson Foundation to establish the program.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? Funding expenditures were limited to the biennium with required special item funding continuation requests

submitted for review at each legislative session.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

Formula funding is not applied to non-degree continuing education programs. Continuous changes in the rural health care environment make it difficult to forecast education needs in a given year. Ongoing administrative and staffing changes, new and evolving evidence-based nursing strategies, and new medications, treatments, and technology are some of the major factors used to determine education needs of staff each year. Health care facilities face changing accreditation and statute mandates affecting patient care protocols and must therefore adjust continuing nursing education requirements. These variables make it difficult to establish a set funding pattern when there is no established baseline from which to follow pre-determined formula.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The activities of the RHOP support the Mission of the University by providing opportunities for community service in rural Texas. The established history of excellence and innovative teaching strategies by the College of Nursing faculty, provide the RHOP with a wealth of educational opportunities for rural nurses.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Neither the College of Nursing current budget nor the low rural adjusted fee schedule for RHOP continuing education courses could sustain this program. There is a direct relationship between funds received through appropriations, grants and the level of program productivity and outcomes. Discontinuing the \$45, 802 funding would result in loss of infrastructure to maintain the program. As a consequence the initial reason for supporting this program, the need to update the knowledge and skills of rural nurses, would not be met by another group in Texas or nationally. The bottom line is the health care of rural Texas citizens. Since health care personnel shortages, especially nursing shortages, exist and predicted to increase in urban areas of Texas, there will be a disproportionate impact on rural areas where severe shortages already exist. It is a hardship for rural facilities to provide release time to nurses to attend continuing education programs especially if nurses need to travel to urban centers. Facilities have

been and would continue to be unable to pay registration fees necessary to fully support the RHOP program. Without planned, ongoing, accessible and affordable continuing education programs for rural nurses within their own settings, the potential for lower quality patient care of rural residents is increased. Organizations collaborate and provide limited funding to support the RHOP in an effort to ease the burden of decreased state funding allocations.

4 Institute of Urban Studies

Start Year: 1967 2010 2011

Appropriation \$75,000 \$296,374 \$296,374

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Through its teaching, conferences and outreach activities, the Institute analyzes and seeks solutions to the problems facing metropolitan areas in Texas. The Institute of Urban Studies, through its provision of management, planning, and economic development assistance and its applied research activities to local communities public service, supports the social and economic development of Arlington, the region and the state.

How did the Special Item originate?

During the 1960s there was an urgent need to develop an ongoing research program which would address many of the emerging problems that resulted from urbanization. Former Senator Don Kennard met with several faculty and staff members from the University of Texas at Arlington and they developed a proposal establishing an Institute of Urban Studies. In January 1967, Senate Bill No. 464 was introduced in the Texas Senate at the Sixtieth Texas Legislature. The bill passed the Senate on April 10, 1967 and the House on May 8, 1967. It was signed by Governor John Connolly on May 23, 1967.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No, the need for an Institute of Urban Studies is as strong today as the time when it was created with more than 80% of American living in urbanized areas. President Obama has called on city planners throughout the nation to begin a new kind of city planning, where cities are the solution to our nation's problems.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. The Institute only does research and projects for communities and does not provide any credit hour courses.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The special item supports the work of the Institute of Urban Studies and the School of Urban and Public Affairs. The School of Urban and Public Affairs was established in 1990 and it offers one undergraduate program and five graduate degree programs: Master of Public Administration, Master of City and Regional Planning, Master of Arts in Urban Affairs, Ph.D. in Public and Urban Administration, and Ph.D. in Urban Planning and Public Policy. In the last five years, the School of Urban and Public Affairs has graduated 278 graduate students, many who are now working for city governments throughout the State of Texas. Presently, there are 642 undergraduates and 284 graduate students.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Elimination of the Institute of Urban Studies special item at UTA would terminate the Institute and its services to local and state agencies. These students have included a broad range of research, training, and service activities tailored to the needs of urban and rural-urban jurisdictions in Texas.

5 Center for Mexican American Studies

CMAS was established by a rider in 1994 by the 73rd legislature, but was not provided funding, with the legislature allowing UTA to use the student deposit fund as the source of funding. This fundingwas eliminated many years ago.

Currently, the State of Texas provides \$41,462 of the CMAS budget dedicated to a .4991 salary line for a CMAS faculty member. CMAS is currently in the process of actively recruiting new joint faculty with these funds in collaboration with academic department searches, upon the retirement of the professor this year to whom these funds were dedicated. This funding from the State of Texas gives us the first opportunity in years to offer salary directly to new hires, as opposed to our previous constraints in offering more modest research stipends from our other accounts. It is crucial that the current funding continue, so that we can continue to offer more core Mexican American studies classes for our minors and for those interested in studying Mexican American Studies who are unable to minor due to their majors in colleges that do not allow for minors, including Nursing, Business, Education, and Engineering. These students take our courses even with the structural constraints against their ability to minor formally in Mexican American Studies. The remainder of our budget is supplemented by the University as part of its long-standing commitment to maintaining the center as a unique interdisciplinary ethnic studies center on the UTA campus with a thoroughly elaborated teaching, research, and service mission. This support allows us operate in terms of salary with a skeleton staff of Director, one full-time Administrative Specialist, and .60 FTE Program Coordinator.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The Special Item allows CMAS to administer a number of ongoing programs with sufficient faculty, including (1) an interdisciplinary academic minor in Mexican American Studies; (2) a public Spring Distinguished Lecture series, initiated under the current Director, that hosts Latino and Latina figures of national prominence in the arts, the social sciences, the media, and the political arena; (3) sponsorship and co-sponsorship of Latino student organizations including the Association of Mexican American Students and a variety of multicultural service fraternities and sororities; (4) a monthly research seminar featuring presentations of research activities by CMAS Faculty Research Associates who are awarded modest annual research stipends; (5) co-funding and hosting of special events with other Centers and administrative programs on campus and with academic departments who partner with CMAS in bringing in guest speakers; (6) active participation in such UTA activities as Preview Days introducing various units on campus to the student body; (7) outreach activities that cater to Spanish-speaking parents interested in improving their students opportunities for school success; (8) public lectures to groups in the metroplex on Latino population trends, including, as examples, the Dallas office of the Department of Education, the City of Arlington meeting of division heads, area police chiefs, and professional associations like the National Association of Schools of Urban Planning.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Slower growth in enrollment of Hispanic students at U.T.Arlington; less awareness among Spanish-speaking immigrant parents and children of higher educational

The partnerships involved in HET and HETDEX would be broken: HET - UT, Penn State, Stanford, Münich and Göttingen and HETDEX - UT, Texas A&M, Penn State, Münich and Potsdam.

Other valued scientific collaborations with university with telescopes at McDonald would be broken: Rice University, Boston University, and University of Michigan

UT's participation in the design, construction, and operation of the Giant Magellan Telescope, a 24-meter telescope to be completed by 2018 (funding permitting) would be at risk. UT is a founding partner with Texas A&M, and other select US and international (Australia, Korea) organizations.

The negative economic impact would be substantial. The Austin economy would lose an estimated \$4 million in funding from non-State grants and private funding. The area

around Fort Davis would lose about 60 permanent jobs. Closure of McDonald would negatively impact the tourist traffic which brings about \$8 million to Jeff Davis county. Training of K-12 teachers and students statewide would be curtailed, if not eliminated.

No; In order for UTPA to tap into formula funding classes currently taught by UT-Austin would have to be transitioned to UTPA. Further, this Special Line Item does not cover the costs of the initiative; UTPA is using approximately \$170,000 in scarce institutional dollars to pay for facility use in the Regional Academic Health Center building.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Cooperative Pharmacy Program

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The pharmacist shortage in the lower RGV continues to be affected by population growth and aging, the expansion of pharmacy services (i.e. increases in community pharmacies, hospitals, and other health care facilities), and pharmacist retirements.

The Texas Workforce Commission estimates from 2006 through 2016 describe an annual need of 45 pharmacists in the Rio Grande Valley, representing an average growth rate of approximately 42%. The Texas Department of State Health Services quantifies need per county as the ratio of pharmacists per 100,000 population. As of September 2009 the average ratio for counties comprising the RGV is 35 (range 20-46), compared to 78.7 for the state.

The Texas State Board of Pharmacy stated in their Strategic Plan 2009 – 2013 that the current number of pharmacy graduates will continue to fall short of state needs, despite the development of new pharmacy programs. The most recent report from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (January 2009) confirmed this information.

Thus should continued funding not be approved, pharmacist needs for the RGV may continue to remain unmet. It is recommended that alternative efforts be undertaken by the state to ensure that qualified students from the lower RGV continue to have access to pharmacy education. Lastly, should continued funding not be approved the state would still need to honor the commitment made to existing students through graduation.

The University of Texas - Pan American 3 Starr County Upper Level Center

To provide upper level higher education opportunities to persons in the Western region of the Rio Grande Valley (Starr County)

How did the Special Item originate?

The 77th Legislature enacted a statute (H.B. 1753 and C.S.H.B. 1753) that allowed the University of Texas-Pan American to "establish an extension campus at Rio Grande City to offer the upper-division courses required for students enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program at the university." The bill amended Section 77.12 of the Texas Education Code by adding subsections (d) and (e).

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

- Inability to materially improve and maintain the momentum of this initiative, including the operation of a new 30,000 square foot facility that began construction in FY 2009 and is scheduled to open for classes in September 2010.
- Failure to respond to the continued need for teachers in the western region of the Rio Grande Valley.
- Failure to respond to the educational and economic needs of the area, characterized by high poverty, high unemployment, low levels of educational attainment, and high illiteracy.
- Failure to establish collaborative partnerships with the public schools and South Texas College in trying to meet the "Closing the Gaps" initiative of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and the State's K-16 initiatives.

4 Center for Entrepreneurship and Economic Development

The Center interfaces with secondary and post secondary educational systems to develop a seamless curriculum for grades K-16 in manufacturing/engineering education.

CFM will be forced to close and manufacturers in the South Texas Region will not have access to affordable technical and research assistance needed to maintain their competitiveness at the national and global levels.

The University of Texas - Pan American 6 K-12 Collaboration

No; formula dollars are generated via the classes taken by concurrent enrollment students. However, the formula appropriation only minimally subsidizes the cost of instruction. Promotion of the program and delivery of services is dependent on funding through this line item.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No; charging full tuition and fees would help but other activities would not be funded.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

This line item provides several strategies to help UTPA meet the student access goals of the Closing the Gap state initiative. One of the most successful strategies is the Concurrent Enrollment Program where high school juniors and seniors are invited to apply to take university courses for college credit. UTPA's Concurrent Enrollment Program was designed to encourage more rigorous course taking for high school students and to allow them to earn college credit while in high school. Students must be on the Recommended or Distinguished Achievement high school plan and meet one of the following requirements (Top 10%, GPA of 90+, or have an ACT score of 22+ or SAT of 1030). Students may enroll in a maximum of two courses per semester and these courses must be part of the core curriculum (excluding developmental coursework, kinesiology, and upper level division courses). Classes are taken on the UTPA campus and taught by a UTPA professor. In some cases, concurrent enrollment students are also provided the opportunity to take courses offered via inter-active television. UTPA has formed partnerships with over 30 school districts across South Texas to make this program accessible and affordable for qualified students.

The AP initiative is augmented by the Advanced Placement Summer Institute which offers College Board AP Training to area high schools teachers. Additionally, the program supports a Math Conference for high school teachers hosted by UTPA annually.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The University would be forced to discontinue successful access programs serving South Texas high school students that encourage students to take more rigorous courses to prepare for college. This would decrease the number of students prepared for college and increase time to graduation.

- 2) Cooperative Doctoral (\$155,581,1.4 FTEs) To support a cooperative agreement with the University of Houston to provide opportunities for graduate enrollment in education.
- 3) Incentive Scholarships (\$269,428,1.0 FTE) To provide scholarships to upper level students and to encourage teachers to pursue advanced professional degrees. Funding also being used for talent-based scholarships in music, academics, chess, etc.
- 4) Matching Technology (\$474,081,5.5 FTEs) Blackboard is being used for instruction on campus and for courses offered at a distance and classrooms have been retrofitted to use smart technology for teaching.
- 5) Library Core Print Collection (\$232,560,1.0 FTE) Dollars leveraged with \$250K match from TSC to expand the collection in the areas of online print databases and print materials to comply with current ALA standards.
- 6) Science Technology (\$259,373,4.3 FTEs) To provide support to students who are Pre-med, to start new degree programs: Masters in Physics, Bachelors in Environmental Sciences

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Institutional Enhancement funding plays a significant role in financing the core mission of our institution by providing a base level of funding for our institution's services and programs. Institutional Enhancement funding helps support leading edge and innovate programs in education not otherwise supported by formula funding. Because there are no other sources of funding available, a reduction to our Institutional Enhancement funding would erode the quality of our programs and result in declines in the level of services that we have been able to deliver to students. Therefore, it is important the current level of General Revenue support be maintained and not reduced.

UTB/TSC, the youngest University in the UT System, has a smaller number of academic programs as compared to our peer institutions - UTPA, UTEP, UTSA, UTPB and UTT. UTB currently has 40 Bachelor programs as compared to an average of 53 of our peer institutions. UTB currently has 23 Masters programs as compared to an average of 52 of our Peer institutions. Our peer institutions have had more time to develop programs. If this funding is not continued, we will not be able to create the same robust programs that other mature Universities have developed.

The University of Texas of the Permian Basin

Institutional Enhancement funding plays a significant role in financing the core mission of our institution by providing a base level of funding for our institution's services and programs. Institutional Enhancement funding helps support leading edge and innovative programs in education not otherwise supported by formula funding. Because there are no other sources of funding available, a reduction to our Institutional Enhancement funding would erode the quality of our programs and result in declines in the level of services that we have been able to deliver to students. Therefore, it is important the current level of General Revenue support be maintained and not reduced.

Institutional Enhancement funds were added by the 76th Legislature to help fund the most critical needs for each institution, consolidating special items such as Distance Education plus recognizing fixed institutional costs. For UT Permian Basin, this funding provides for infrastructure not adequately funded through the formula because of institutional size. It allows UT Permian Basin, as the sole baccalaureate and graduate institution serving the Midland-Odessa area and surrounding rural counties, to provide quality educational programs for the region. Institutional enhancement allows us to maintain and build distance education programs. Delivery of quality programs at a distance is important to a region of the state where students have vast distances to travel between higher education campuses.

How did the Special Item originate?

Institutional enhancement was provided to all Universities to help address issues of access and excellence not covered through formula funding. The funding also rolled into a single special item what were formerly known as instructional special items. We are not aware of the process used for the conversion in the legislative activities for that session.

Not unless the formula setting process is changed significantly. The formula is currently set as the level of approximate average for cost incurred. The average does not have students needing to travel for a hundred miles to attend class. West Texas has a lower college going rate than the state average. It has a higher first generation college going population than the average for the state. This population needs services and access that might not be met by the average. The institutional enhancement funding provides a level of access and excellence that simply covering the average costs would not allow the University to meet the unique needs of West Texas.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The special item supports literally every program in the University. It provides the margin of excellence for all programs. Distance learning is used by all areas in the University.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

There would need to be an increase in tuition and/or fees charged to students or severe reduction in course offerings to students. Accreditations may also be in jeopardy.

The Institutional Enhancement funding is especially important to UT Permian Basin as a small school with a higher percentage of fixed costs to "open the doors." The 2010-2011 Institutional Enhancement Special Item amount is 19.9% of the non-TRB, General Revenue Fund financing for the institution. These funds provide significant support

for the University and in turn provide a regional University to citizens of the Permian Basin and its surrounding counties.

The many first generation college students in the region and at the University need the improved services that these funds enable the University to provide. The Institutional Enhancement funds are a critical factor in enabling the University to work toward the Closing the Gaps goals of participation and success in quality educational programs. Without these funds the University would be seriously harmed in working to fulfill its mission.

2 Instruction Enhancement

The rider was adopted by the Education Subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee and recommended to the House which adopted it and the Senate concurred.

Not as the formula currently works. The discrepancy between average funding per student FTE and the funding available to smaller universities is significant.

Improving campus economies of scale as well as an improved programmatic mix may allow for an eventual reduction in the item.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The Special Item supports the University as a whole in bringing its General Revenue funding per student full time equivalent closer to the statewide average level of funding. The item supports faculty and staff positions and salaries (which remain below average) as well as general operations of the University.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

There will be greater pressure to raise tuition and fees. It is important to the success of the University and especially its students that the gains achieved in retention, graduation rates, courses taught by tenured/tenured track faculty, and reduced turnover of faculty and staff be maintained.

3 Center for Energy and Economic Diversification (CEED)

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The Center for Energy and Economic Diversification acts as a focal point for energy research, economic diversification, business assistance and development, and professional training for the Permian Basin. Its mission is to strengthen the competitive focus of the region's primary industry, the energy industry, and help diversify the regional economy to create new jobs through the application of research results, commercialize technological development, introduce new technologies, and encourage entrepreneurial activities.

How did the Special Item originate?

The Special Item originated in 1990. The original Legislative Appropriations request from June 1988 said, "Private funding for the physical facility has been attained. However, a special item request in the amount of \$100,000, FY90, and \$75,000, FY91 is needed for initial operations. Such operational funding is exceedingly difficult to raise in any early phase of an undertaking. These funds will support the University faculty and other operational costs in the first research projects at the Center.

If such funding is not forthcoming, the economic development of the region will be greatly impeded. (Legislative Appropriations Request, FY 1990 and FY 1991)"

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. The CEED is a research and public service activity and does not generate SCHs. Thus it will not receive formula funding. The result is that formula funding will never be able to support this Special Item.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The operation and infrastructure of the Center for Energy and Economic Diversification (CEED) is supported by the Special Item.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

If the Special Item funding was not available, the continued operation of the Center for Energy and Economic Diversification (CEED) would not be possible, except at a greatly reduced level and only through reallocation of scarce funds from other areas and programs within the University. A considerable amount of private and federal funding and support rely on the infrastructure and match in-kind services provided through State funds.

4 John Ben Shepperd Public Leadership Institute (JBSPLI)

Appropriation \$890,000 \$698,938 \$698,938

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The JBSPLI serves a statewide purpose for the promotion of education, leadership training, practical application, and public service. The comprehensive mission is "to provide Texans an education for and about leadership, ethics, and public service." The "Mission" is accomplished through numerous avenues, including: practical leadership skill training, exposure to outstanding speakers and mentors, providing networking opportunities, supporting internships in the arena of public service, and other means and methods to develop leaders of all ages in Texas.

How did the Special Item originate?

In the early to mid-1990's Senator John Montford, Lt. Governor Bob Bullock, John Ben Shepperd, and others were looking for a way to develop leaders in public service. At the time, Senator Montford was the Chair of the Senate Finance Committee, and he provided the funding for the JBSPLI in the budget. At that time, he put \$1,000,000 into the budget for its funding. However, in the final analysis, after all budget items were cut approximately 12-13% by the Legislature, the final amount of funding for the first year was \$890,000.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. Formula funding supports graduate and undergraduate instruction within the University. The John Ben Shepperd Public Leadership Institute (JBSPLI) is a public service activity supported solely by the Special Item.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The John Ben Shepperd Public Leadership Institute (JBSPLI) is the main program at the University supported by the Special Item. The primary part of the JBSPLI program is its public service activities. Additionally the Special Item supports some faculty positions in the Public Leadership degree programs. The Special Item supports approximately 6,000 students annually at the university and secondary levels as well as community citizens.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Strong moral leadership, high ethical standards, and integrity in public service have declined in the past decades. Fewer individuals seek public office because of intense media scrutiny, cost, and disdain for politics. The JBSPLI is committed to reversing this trend through numerous methods: mentoring "leaders," teaching them about "leading," introducing them to individuals in public service, internships, practical seminars, and methods to motivate and inspire to "make a difference" in their communities and state. The Texas Leadership Forum, held in Austin, each year gives the participants an opportunity to explore the Capitol and hear from Senators, Representatives and Texas leaders about service to Texas. The JBSPLI holds 25-35 Shepperd System of Service programs a year throughout the state targeting high school students and teaching about leadership and cooperation to accomplish goals. The JBSPLI targets young adults to sharpen their skills in leadership and develop new skills. The JBSPLI has originated and sponsored the following programs: practical workshops for civic groups, social and professional groups, and businesses; and short term workshops on topics of vital interest to college students. The JBSPLI is the only public leadership institute legislatively mandated to provide leadership training in the State of Texas. Without funding, the program would be maintained at only a much smaller, gift supported level.

5 Small Business Development Center (SBDC)

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The Small Business Development Center (SBDC) provides management assistance to current and prospective small business owners. Small businesses are defined as those employing fewer than 500 employees. SBDC's offer one-stop assistance to individuals and small businesses by providing a wide variety of information and guidance in central and easily accessible branch locations. The program is a cooperative effort of the private sector, the educational community, and federal, state, and local governments and is an integral component of the U.S. SBA's Entrepreneurial Development's network of training and counseling services. The UTPB Small Business Development Center serves a sixteen county region of West Texas including the major population centers of Midland and Odessa. The UTPB Small Business Development Center operates in conjunction with the Northwest Texas Small Business Development Center Regional Program and the Small Business Administration.

The program has been identified and continues to maintain the status of "revenue neutral", so not funding the program would result in a loss of general state revenues. It is important for the SBDC Special Item program funding to meet or exceed the level certified as "revenue neutral" by the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts.

How did the Special Item originate?

The original Special Item occurred in the Legislative budget setting process in response to an Exceptional Item Request in Fall 2002.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No. The item is part of statewide funding for the Small Business Development Centers program.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item?

No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. The SBDC is a public service activity and does not generate SCHs. Thus it will not receive formula funding. The result is that formula funding will never be able to support this Special Item.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The operation of the Small Business Development Center is supported by the Special Item. The federal funding requires a local match.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The University does not have the ability to reallocate funds to further support the SBDC with internal resources since it is experiencing significant growth in credit instruction programs. Many regional communities are continuing to lose their population base, so these communities within our region are unable to provide local funding assistance for needed and required SBDC program expansion. Not funding the Special Item will hinder further development of a healthier West Texas economy.

Over the past six fiscal years the SBDC counseled 1,916 clients accounting for 11,494 counseling hours. The SBDC assisted in the start up of 330 businesses resulting in the creation of 1,123 FTE full time and part-time jobs. The SBDC is very active in rural outreach and assists minority and woman owned businesses in receiving HUB certification and assistance for Disadvantaged Small Businesses. These resources would be lost if the SBDC funding ended.

The program has been identified and continues to maintain the status of "revenue neutral", so not funding the program would result in a loss of general state revenues. It is

The University of Texas of the Permian Basin 9 Performing Arts Center

Appropriation \$190,000 \$250,000 \$250,000

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The University has begun the construction of the Wagner Noël Performing Arts Center and related classroom facility at the CEED location (Arts, Convocation, and Classroom Facility), central to the communities in the region. This Special Item continues the funding previously provided for staff to begin preparations for opening the Performing Arts Center in 2011. Significant lead time is required for booking performances, development of policies, and related activities.

The Special Item request will allow the Wagner Noël Performing Arts Center/Arts, Convocation, and Classroom Facility to function effectively when it is scheduled to open. The University does not have the ability to reallocate funds to support the Performing Arts Center with internal resources since it is experiencing significant growth in credit instruction programs. If funding is not available, there will be limited expertise to help the Performing Arts Center perform at the best levels initially.

How did the Special Item originate?

The original Special Item occurred in the Legislative budget setting process in response to an Exceptional Item Request in Fall 2006. A Rider set the original Special Item.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

It is doubtful that the full operations of the Wagner Noël Performing Arts Center will ever be fully self supporting. Performing Arts Centers are not included in the formula other than through the projected space needs model. Formula funding based on student credit hours will not provide support for the facility.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The Music instructional program currently receives partial support from the Special Item. In its developmental stages, the Music program has received funding from the Special Item in order to grow itself into a robust program by the anticipated opening of the Wagner Noël Performing Arts Center. Equipment, music, and related materials have been provided. The public service program of the University has been supported as the planning for opening and operations continues, including policy and program development, recruitment of traveling shows and performers, and the many related details needed for a successful opening of the Center.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Funding for pre-operational functions for the Wagner Noël Performing Arts Center would cease. Planning for an effective opening and operations of the Center would stop. In effect, UTPB would have an 1800 seat performance space but no operations funding, no procedures for operations, and no programming. The University does not have the ability to reallocate funds to support the Performing Arts Center with internal resources since it is experiencing significant growth in credit instruction programs. Thus there would be limited expertise to help the Performing Arts Center perform at the best levels initially.

1 Texas Pre-Engineering Program (TexPREP)

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of the Texas Prefreshman Engineering Program (TexPREP) is to provide a challenging academic program (across the state of Texas through its partner colleges and universities) designed to motivate and prepare middle and high school students for success in advanced studies leading to careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics). TexPREP is a proven national program with an emphasis on increasing the number of women and minorities in STEM fields.

How did the Special Item originate?

The special item was a legislative request from UTSA for the Texas Prefreshman Engineering Program.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

What University program is supported by the Special item?

TexPREP is a rigorous 7-week summer mathematics-based academic program for middle and high school students (approx 3,474). The program is conducted over four summers in a college setting where students (grades 6 to 11) study advanced material. The academic component includes exposure to Probability and Statistics, Computer Science, Engineering, Problem Solving based on mathematical applications, Mathematics-Based Logic, Physics, and Technical Writing. Classes are held Monday-Friday for five hours daily. TexPREP stresses the development of abstract reasoning and problem solving skills, as well as the application of this knowledge through coursework, team projects, class presentations and examinations. In addition to a strong academic curriculum, TexPREP provides career-oriented guest speakers, field trips, and mentoring by college instructors, high school teachers and undergraduate students majoring in mathematics, science and engineering.

TexPREP, is a statewide program administered by UTSA. In addition to efforts in San Antonio area, the program has been extended to partner colleges and universities across the state. Over the last two years, twelve new sites have been added. In 2010, the summer program will be conducted in 18 Texas cities on 38 college campuses. The cities will include Arlington, Austin, Bay City, Brownsville, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Edinburg, Fort Worth, Harlingen, Odessa, McAllen, Houston, Laredo, Lubbock, San Antonio, Alpine, Richmond, and Victoria.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The elimination of TexPREP funding would negatively impact the progress made to date by TexPREP and related programs in closing the gaps and increasing the numbers of students who are not only graduating from college but also pursuing STEM field degrees and careers. TexPREP expects to serve approximately 3,800 students in 2010 in 18 Texan cities on 38 college campuses, of which 25% will be 1st generation college-bound students. Failure to fund will eliminate this important public service, outreach program.

2 Center for Water Research

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of the Center for Water Research, The University of Texas at San Antonio, is to emphasize a multi-disciplinary approach to solve practical problems related to water as a resource.

The Center for Water Research (Center) is funded to address research and technical issues in water resources in San Antonio and South Texas and of direct benefit to the people of the state of Texas. In addition, the Center provides water-related educational services to the University as part of regularly scheduled classes, and to the community at large.

CWR offers the collaborative expertise of highly qualified engineers and scientists to determine efficient and effective strategies for research and data acquisition. While providing water-related academic programs, CWR professionals and students use a multi-disciplinary approach to identify water-related issues and to solve water resource problems within the community.

Projects define challenging education and research opportunities to provide hydrological, environmental, and other basic data for water resource planning and management both in terms of costs and results. CWR research and development reflects an increasing concern for the preservation of quality water resources for all facets of water usage.

How did the Special Item originate?

Other, the Center for Water Research funding originated as special item funding.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. The Center for Water Research is public service and serves as an information and data resource center for small cities, groundwater districts, river authorities and other governmental units which would not have access to or could not afford access to information necessary to meet their water resource requirements for the future. In previous biennial periods the CWR has awarded 12 to 15 scholarships for partial research support to UTSA students conducting water-resources research of interest to Texas

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Loss of funding would impact the instructional research and public service aspects of this center; without support for student scholarships, UTSA will not be able to attract the best students to study in the program. Students play a primary role in conducting the research as part of their graduate studies. The Center supports graduate students through competitive scholarships that include a stipend plus tuition support for a maximum of two years.

3 Small Business Development Center

Start Year: 1990 2010 2011

Appropriation \$200,000 \$3,791,138 \$3,791,138

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Small business and community economic development through extension services covering 79-county South-West Texas Border Region, in cooperation with U.S. Small Business Administration partnership and UTSA as regional administrator of the SBDC program. To promote the growth, expansion, innovation, increased, productivity, and improved management for small business, through activities of individual business counseling and technical assistance, group training seminars and workshops, advocacy, and research information. The mission also involves students and faculty through structured service-learning and applied research activities to leverage academic learning and discovery with our public service mission.

The SBDC is tax-revenue neutral certified by the Texas Comptroller and is accredited by the Association of Small Business Development Centers. This special item request for 2010 and 2011 includes an increase at minimum of 10% from the current biennium, pending a final revenue-neutral certified amount to be issued from the Comptroller; so office, which may exceed a 36% and is anticipated in November.

These goals are being accomplished through activities of business counseling, technical assistance, training seminars and workshops, advocacy, research studies, resource information and coordination with the U.S. Small Business Administration and other community business support services. These continued activities at the SBDC region would continue to result in improved performance of small business clients, enhanced economic growth within the service area and full participation by special focus groups such as the women and minority owned businesses, rural businesses, export businesses, and Veteran owned businesses.

Rural communities and businesses would not have the same access to small business development services as the larger Texas cities. State economic development funding investments from the Texas Enterprise Fund and the Emerging Technology Fund (approx \$200 million/yr each program) are predominantly applicable to larger cities and academic research centers, so a less balanced approach to support rural community economic development would result if this \$1.2 million/yr Special Item were to be eliminated or reduced.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

This funding has been integrated into the overall Educational & General (E&G) budget of UTSA. A loss of this funding would equate to a real reduction of about 1 percent of UTSA's E&G funds. Without this support, we would likely need to reduce the course offerings and or shut down some of the duplicated services, which would require students to participate in those activities at the Main Campus.

The University of Texas at San Antonio 7 Institutional Enhancement

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

This item was created to replace a number of other special items eliminated by the Legislature. However, this funding has been rolled in with other state general revenue to fund the overall institutional mission: The University of Texas at San Antonio is dedicated to the advancement of knowledge through research and discovery, teaching and learning, community engagement and public service. As an institution of access and excellence, UTSA embraces multicultural traditions, serving as a center for intellectual and creative resources as well as a catalyst for socioeconomic development for Texas, the nation and the world.

How did the Special Item originate?

Given that the majority portion of that funding covers faculty costs, we could say that this funding is equivalent to the salary costs of 70 faculty positions.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Institutional Enhancement funding plays a significant role in financing the core mission of our institution by providing a base level of funding for our institution's services and programs. Institutional Enhancement funding helps support leading edge and innovate programs in education not otherwise supported by formula funding. Because there are no other sources of funding available, a reduction to our Institutional Enhancement funding would erode the quality of our programs and result in declines in the level of services that we have been able to deliver to students. Therefore, it is important the current level of General Revenue support be maintained and not reduced.

Loss of this funding would translate to about a 5% reduction in discretionary E&G funding. Faculty positions would go unfilled which would further increase the student-to-faculty ratio. Fewer course sections would be available to meet the demands of an ever growing student enrollment.

8 Texas State Data Center

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

To make demographic, economic and related data readily available and accessible to the public and private sectors, to produce annual population estimates for counties and places in Texas, biennial projections of the population by age, sex and race/ethnicity for Texas and counties in Texas for use by Texas state agencies, the Texas Legislature, and private-sector concerns for personnel, facility and budgetary planning, and to provide expert analysis and interpretations of demographic and related trends impacting Texas.

The State Data Center is able to demonstrate how the data, information, and services provided facilitate attraction and distribution of Federal resources, support the work of other State agencies, and assist businesses with making decisions about strategically expanding that creates new jobs within the State. Therefore, the Special Item is associated with increasing State revenue exceeding the cost of operation.

No. While the State Data Center provides an exceptional learning environment for Ph.D. Demography students, the functions and purpose of the State Data Center are focused on generating State, County, and Place population estimates and State and County population projections in addition to analysis of and consultation about demographic data and processes for legislators, State agencies, businesses, and the public. The functions of the State Data Center would be required by the State even if it were not located within the context of an academic setting.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

If these programs are not funded, private and public-sector interests will lose access to important data for personnel, facility and budgetary planning and Texas agencies and private sector concerns will no longer have access to the long-range planning information necessary for effective planning and market development. In addition, state and private-sources will lose access to program personnel to assist them in interpreting and preparing for the demographic changes that are impacting Texas.

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Generation of new knowledge that can be translated to the practical benefit of the State of Texas is a critical catalyst fundamental to the growth, development and well-being of our state. Recognizing this, State Senator Leticia Van de Putte and former State Representative Robert Puente, along with the members of the Bexar County legislative delegation H.B. 1716 and its companion bill, S.B. 728, was written during the 77th session of the Legislature to authorize the creation of the San Antonio Life Sciences Institute (SALSI), a joint initiative between the University of Texas at San Antonio (UTSA) and the University of Texas Health Science Center–San Antonio (UTHSCSA).

This institute was designed to: (1) to facilitate the establishment of collaborative activities between public and private institutions that would lead to the overall enhancement of their research, teaching and service missions; (2) to promote collaboration (e.g., joint doctoral programs and research projects) between these two institutions; and (3) to enable the development of initiatives that will stimulate the growth of the biomedical and biotechnology industries in San Antonio and South Texas fostering the commercialization of the research products of the partner institutions. SALSI's goal is to develop synergies in research and education that exceed the combined efforts of the institutions if each acts alone.

How did the Special Item originate?

HB 1716 and SB 728 authorized the creation of SALSI during the 77th Legislature to facilitate and/or enable collaborative and joint research and degree programs between the UTSA and UTHSCSA. No funding was appropriated for the 2002-03 biennium. State funding in the amount of \$8 million for SALSI (\$4 million for each institution) was not appropriated until the 81st Legislature for the 2010-11 biennium. However, State support for SALSI came in the form of Federal Stimulus Funds allocated through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009, of which the funding is not guaranteed or likely to be sustained beyond the 2010-11 biennium.

Approximately 75 students are supported by this item. In addition to the substantial fiscal ROI, philanthropic success, joint publications, potential intellectual property, and new educational programs, the success of SALSI in enhancing the partnership between academic and health components of the UT System and has been expanded to other collaborative initiatives. Acting upon previous successes SALSI will support (a) core research initiatives in neuroscience, health disparities, medicinal chemistry, biomedical engineering, and prosthetics; (b) collaborative research with UTHSCSA in the core research initiatives and innovative joint educational programs including biomedical and biotechnology programs; and (c) proof of concept awards for technology development and commercialization.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Education is a critical catalyst fundamental to the growth, development and well-being of any region. Without adequate funding to establish SALSI as a permanent ongoing entity, the collaborative efforts undertaken to promote educational and research initiatives will be compromised.

The P-16+ Council brings together leadership from school districts, colleges, businesses, and community sectors to dramatically increase the number of high school graduates prepared to enter and success in college and careers. Through engagement with all of the various community stakeholders, the Council will provide leadership to create a broad learning community throughout Bexar County that focuses on student outcomes in all schools.

There was originally a rider written but when the funding for this item was changed to ARRA, the rider didn't make it into the appropriations act but was added to the UTSA appropriation.

Institutional Enhancement funding was appropriated by the 78th, 79th, 80th and 81st Legislatures to continue to provide scholarship for students and to enhance university academic programs, administration, and information technology.

UT Tyler is a relatively new four-year university committed to providing a higher-than-average quality of education for dedicated, bright students wanting a more challenging education than they can normally find at Texas public institutions, and better jobs. UT Tyler's mission, in addition to helping develop East Texas, is to offer a desperately needed alternative to all the large, urban universities in Texas. Specifically, our vision is: UT Tyler will be nationally recognized as a destination university for high-ability, flagship-capable students. UT Tyler will be the premier public university in Texas offering challenging academic programs and an exciting, personal university experience with smaller classes, service opportunities, and a residential, park-like campus that encourages learning.

UT Tyler is not a Tier One wannabe. Our niche in the UT System and major contribution to the State is to be the best public university in Texas with a focus on undergraduate students.

Institutional Enhancement funding was appropriated by the 78th, 79th, 80th and 81st Legislatures to continue to provide scholarship for students and to enhance university academic programs, administration, and information technology.

- In all likelihood, eliminate several undergraduate and/or graduate programs;

- Reduce some institutionally funded scholarships (in order to avoid destroying certain academic programs);

Because there are no other sources of significant funding available, eliminating our Institutional Enhancement funding would erode the quality of our programs and result in decreases in the level of services we deliver to students.

We have created two campus-wide task forces, one on cost containment and the other on academic reorganization, to begin to prepare to reduce all operations.

3 Institutional Enhancement

Institutional Enhancement funding plays a significant role in financing the core mission of our institution by providing a base level of funding for our institution's services and programs. Institutional Enhancement funding helps support leading edge and innovative programs in education not otherwise supported by formula funding. Because there are no other sources of funding available, a reduction to our Institutional Enhancement funding would erode the quality of our programs and result in declines in the level of services that we have been able to deliver to students. Therefore, it is important the current level of General Revenue support be maintained and not reduced.

Institutional Enhancement funding plays a significant role in making up for base level funding lost in previous sessions. It is all used for salaries in various areas. It helps support faculty and staff in academic programs; student support and success programs; and administrative functions such as our like audit and compliance and financial aid and alumni offices.

See our answer to Part E (consequences) to understand what parts of the University would be affected if these funds were removed.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Losing our Institutional Enhancement funding would be devastating for UT Tyler. These funds are not extra. They fund UT Tyler's core mission. In the session before last, held in 2007, UT Tyler tied for first in the State in terms of enrollment growth, with a 13% increase. However, because new formula weights were being implemented that session, formula-based projected appropriations actually dropped for UT Tyler! Although, ultimately, UT Tyler was "held harmless," none of our growth was funded except through a small, make-shift increase in Institutional Enhancement. We have never been paid for that prior growth and UT Tyler's ability to grow was harmed.

The funding provides partial support for the Cyclotron Institute.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The special item support of the Cyclotron Institute currently provides approximately 10% of the facility funding. The remaining 90% is obtained from external grants and support from TAMU. The special item support leverages over a 9-to-1 return in institute funding. It provides part of the continuing baseline support first agreed to by TAMU and DOE for this DOE Supported Center of Excellence. Since the state special item support has not increased in nearly twenty years, the University has had to provide an increasing operations supplement and the Institute has had to direct an increasingly larger fraction of the federal support to facility operations rather than use it for the research program. The annual special item support is currently insufficient to meet needs for repair and replacement of key facility mechanical and electronic components. Continuing support from the State of Texas was critical to the Institute obtaining funding from DOE and the Welch Foundation for proceeding with an upgrade of the Institute facilities. The upgrade will assure competitive state-of-the art capabilities for at least the next 15 years. With these capabilities, external funding over the next 15 years should be more than \$100,000,000 (in current dollars). Loss of the state line item support without a commitment of replacement funds from the University would lead to severely curtailed operations and almost certain loss of the federal support for research and operations.

2 Sea Grant College Program

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The Texas Sea Grant College Program is dedicated to the understanding, wise use and stewardship of the state's coastal and marine resources. For almost 40 years, the program has provided leadership and expertise about marine issues through focused research, outreach to coastal communities and industries, and strategic communications and education efforts. Texas Sea Grant is a cooperative program between the U.S. Department of Commerce (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) and the State of Texas. Located at Texas A&M University as a unit within the College of Geosciences, Texas Sea Grant provides research funding on a competitive basis to researchers at institutions of higher education throughout Texas. Current priority research areas are in the areas of Coastal Ecosystem Health, Coastal Communities and Economies, and Marine Education. Texas Sea Grant is one of 32 Sea Grant programs in the U.S. that are found in all coastal and Great Lakes states and the territory of Puerto Rico. All 32 Sea Grant programs report to the National Sea Grant Office, which is housed in Ocean and Atmospheric Research within the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. A major strength of the Texas Sea Grant program is that it begins programs that are ultimately adopted by others. Sea Grant is poised to address new issues and work on unanticipated problems associated with the marine and coastal region of the state.

How did the Special Item originate?

The National Sea Grant College and Program Act of 1968 originally funded the Sea Grant Program. The Act came about when similarities were noted between marince science and the federal government's successful land grant program. An educational program of research, extension and training helped make this country the most advanced agricultural nation in the world, and a similar program might work in stimulating the economic advance of marine resources. And where land grant emphasized food production, Sea Grant looks toward transportation, mineral extraction, recreation and ocean engineering, as well as food processing and aquaculture. John C. Calhoun, first Sea Grant Director at Texas A&M University, said: "General Earl Rudder, then Chancellor of the A&M System, as well as President of TAMU, whom I served as Vice Chancellor for Programs, informed me one day that he thought he would be able to obtain approval for one Special Line Item in the upcoming budget for the University, and he asked my opinion as to what that item should be. My reply was that it should be for funds to match the Federal Funds that we expected to receive for establishing a Sea Grant College Program under legislation that had been approved by Congress in 1967. Our Sea Grant proposal was then under consideration by the National Science Foundation, and we had been assured that it would be approved.

No. The program was highly successful, and funding was continued in future special items. Amounts for the first two years were \$475,000 and \$750,000. The requirements of the Federal Legislation for the program were that the institution must supply funding equivalent to at least one half of the Federal contribution.

The Texas Sea Grant College Program supports research at institutions of higher education across the state through competitive grants, conducts outreach programs through county agents and discipline specialists who work primarily with constituents on the Texas coast and has a number of educational activities. While college students are often supported by grants to faculty at their institutions, Texas Sea Grant is not directly involved in teaching at the college level and thus does not generate SCH's. Thus, formula funding would not apply to this program.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The Texas Sea Grant College Program. Sea Grant supports an average of four to five student workers each year who are paid from the Special Item. Virtually every grant supports at least one student, which means an average of 8-10 students each year. Those students are supported by NOAA funds, not the Special Item, but without the

Special Item, we would not be able to obtain the NOAA funding.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Texas Sea Grant receives its NOAA funding in the form of a grant, all of which requires a match of one state dollar for every two federal dollars. Currently the annual amount that Texas Sea Grant receives from NOAA is slightly over \$1.8 million, thus, the matching requirement is in excess of \$900,000. Grantees provide some of the match, but the majority of it is used to support the administrative, extension, communications and education activities of the program. The match was put into place as a mean of making Sea Grant programs across the nation truly cooperative between state and federal government. Without the special item funding, Texas Sea Grant could not meet the matching requirement.

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Clean, affordable, and sustainable energy is critical to the State of Texas, not only to Texas consumers, but also as a major economic engine that affects the global competitiveness of the United States. Energy has for many decades been an area in which Texas has led in providing solutions to the challenges facing the nation and the world.

The Energy Resources Program (ERP) at Texas A&M University was created to provide the State of Texas with a concentration of expertise in research, teaching, and public service directed at continuously developing solutions to Texas' and the nation's changing energy and environmental needs. The ERP maintains programs and provides overarching coordination within and between multiple colleges, departments, and disciplines that address both immediate and long-term challenges in an area of major importance to the economy of the State of Texas and the nation. The ERP focuses on advanced and emerging technologies in liquid gas, wind, solar, nuclear, and biofuels, while continuing to make significant contributions to new and innovative strategies for natural gas, as well as other traditional areas that are important to Texas energy and environmental issues.

How did the Special Item originate?

The ERP was created in 1976 in response to the state's assessment that energy supply was of critical concern to Texas, its industries, and its citizens. Since the ERP's inception, the need for finding solutions to the energy problems facing the State of Texas has evolved into being a worldwide challenge. More than ever, energy research is a top priority on the international, national, and state research agenda.

The ERP funding provides the state and University with a critical allocation of funds to support R&D on energy issues vital to Texas and the nation. Funding is used to provide administrative and development support allowing energy expertise throughout the University to develop multidisciplinary initiatives to address critical problems facing the state in natural gas, petroleum, wind, solar, nuclear, and biofuels. The ERP has had tremendous success in funding advanced and emerging technologies in energy and environmental-related issues and has assisted Texas A&M as it continues to occupy a leadership position in the energy research arena. Loss of ERP funding will have a major impact on ongoing energy research at Texas A&M and on our capacity to bring together collaborative efforts between Texas A&M, Texas Engineering Experiment Station, Texas A&M AgriLife, and the Texas Transportation Institute. Energy research will be a major focus of further institutional investment. The University has committed funds over the next 5 years to combine with the ERP monies to

synergize and leverage all resources and to focus on one of the most important multidisciplinary initiatives in the state—energy. As part of this initiative, the University is pursuing the hiring of uniquely qualified senior faculty with national/international expertise in energy R&D, to enhance and bolster current faculty capabilities in this area.

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

To provide the legislature and state agencies with policy research capabilities within Texas A&M University. The PPRL serves many state agencies in developing evidence based public policy. This mission is fulfilled through the employment of creative personnel with the expertise to conduct evaluative research, by operating a prominent survey research center, and through an ambitious, experiential-based training environment for TAMU graduate and undergraduate students. Since its inception the PPRL has undergone dramatic growth in both size and organizational recognition. PPRL personnel have successfully implemented scientifically sound research strategies that test the effectiveness of existing governmental programs and policies and have also provided the scientific foundations to aid policy makers in the development of new policies. The PPRL maintains the largest survey research facility in the Southwest and is nationally recognized for its capabilities in program evaluation.

How did the Special Item originate?

Special appropriation in 1983.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The item most directly supports the research activities of the PPRL and the College of Liberal Arts. It helps sustain the research and administrative infrastructure that underlies the capacity for large scale surveys, needs assessment, program evaluation, and cost benefit analysis of social programs. The item funding helps provide the ability to maintain a staff of trained and experienced researchers available to help contribute to the design and conduct of research activities that would be beyond the capacity of most academic departments. The broad research capabilities of the PPRL permit university faculty to be involved in projects whose scope exceeds most individual faculty research.

The research capacity of PPRL also enhances the ability of researchers beyond the College of Liberal Arts at A&M. Indeed, the PPRL has worked with most of the TAMU Colleges during its existence as well as the TAES, TAEX, TEES, and TEEX agencies. PPRL has provided capacity for data collection and analysis for several large scale projects at the Texas A&M Health Science Center and the Bush School. These agencies and organizations rely on PPRL for data collection and analysis capabilities that are unique in the state.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The state appropriation provides crucial support to PPRL and is central to its continued operations. A reduction in this support would severely curtail its efforts to obtain external funding for projects and the ability to serve the needs of Texas policymakers. The larger result would be a substantial loss to the citizens of Texas stemming from the unavailability of University expertise in developing and evaluating innovative programs which impact their daily lives.

5 Real Estate Research Center

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

By statute, the Real Estate Center's mission is to conduct studies in all areas directly or indirectly related to real estate or urban/rural economics and to publish and disseminate the findings and results. In practice the Center strives to provide useful and actionable information to help Texans make good business and investment decisions.

How did the Special Item originate?

The real estate brokerage industry requested the Texas Legislature pass a law locating the Center at Texas A&M University with funding in a dedicated account derived from additional fees collected from real estate licensing fees.

1996 was the first year that the Real Estate Center was a part of the Texas A&M bill pattern and appropriations that year were \$1,187,460. The Real Estate Center is self-supporting, funded primarily through fees collected from Texas real estate licensees.

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The Center for Housing and Urban Development (CHUD) is enhancing the quality of life for people and the place in which they live in the colonias and beyond, through (1)an integrated approach to practice, outreach, service, education, and research; (2)a continuum of research, development, demonstration, deployment, evaluation, and dissemination; (3)the application of principles of sustainability, lean project delivery, and fully integrated and advanced technologies, in defining what CHUD does (i.e. products), how it does it (i.e., processes followed), and with what (i.e., resources used), and (4)partnerships with other organizations.

CHUD's mission is to conceive, develop, and deliver solutions to fulfill its vision, alone or with its partners. To enhance the quality of life, CHUD delivers: (1)Health and human services focused on the well being of individuals, families, and communities; (2)Education and workforce development programs for young women and men, adult women and men, and the elderly; and (3)Economic development programs. To enhance the quality of the built environment, CHUD assists in the delivery of (1)Planning and design of urban, semi-urban/semi-rural, and rural environments; (2)critical civil infrastructure systems, with an emphasis on water, energy, transportation/mobility, sewage and stormwater, and communications systems; and (3)housing and critical community facilities, with an emphasis on affordable housing and community resource/self help centers.

How did the Special Item originate?

As mentioned previously in Section H, this special item was not the result of an original request from Texas A&M University. Rather, in 1991, the Texas State Legislature directly created the Colonias Program.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

The original legislative mandate for this special item did not have a time limit, in part due to the nature of the Colonias, which in Texas, have and will continue to have: rapid growth of the Hispanic population; extreme shortage of affordable quality housing; continued growth and development of unregulated human settlements; lack of mobility/transportation, water, energy, waste, and communications systems; limited and poor economic opportunities and conditions, low income, and low English literacy and fluency. Furthermore, limited understanding of, information about, and accessibility to, basic services and programs of town, school, and agency office systems, contribute to perpetuate the isolation of Colonias residents. In general, the quality of life of Colonias residents is poor, and as a result, this poses a serious challenge: if the questions, problems, needs, opportunities, and aspirations of their residents and their families are not addressed now, the costs of addressing them to the State and the Nation will only increase in the future. The Colonias Program is a direct response to this challenge. Over its almost 20 years of existence, it has earned an integral, critical, and permanent place within the Colonias, as a respected and trusted partner, which works together with the communities, in the elusive and sometimes seemingly hopeless quest and journey to gain access to basic infrastructure, reduce their isolation, and achieve a better quality of life and place.

Texas A&M University and the Texas A&M University System, through CHUD, with the disadvantaged communities of the Colonias. In addition, this special item also is focused in providing an objective and independent mechanism for establishing baselines of questions, problems, needs, opportunities, and aspirations of residents in the colonias; for transdisciplinary, transinstitutional, and transnational collaboration among agencies at the local, state, and federal levels, and in the private sector; and for the bidirectional transfer of knowledge (best practices) and experience (lessons learned) between the Colonias and all CHUD partners, particularly state agencies with Colonias programs.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The special item does not support any specific academic or research program at Texas A&M University directly. However, it interfaces, interacts, and collaborates with multiple units from various colleges on an as-needed project-by-project basis through the support it provides to faculty, students, and other teaching and research units internally and externally to the university. These relationships have enabled CHUD to leverage the investment made by the State of Texas to date by a multiplier of almost 1:2 in direct funding, and a significantly higher number in indirect support.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Loss of funding for the Colonias Program of the CHUD/CARC/TAMU will result in inability to meet the legislative intent that was established when the Colonias Program was created within CHUD in 1991.

More specifically, this would pose significant systemic negative impacts for the CHUD Colonias Program in its ability to:

- (1) Continuously seek and acquire external funding for, and to provide management and oversight to, a wide range of health and human services focused on the well being of individuals, families, and communities, education and workforce development programs, and economic development programs offered at the CRSCs located throughout its geographical area of operations
- (2) Maintain the extensive network of strategic alliances and partnerships with local government, state, and federal agencies, and nonprofit organizations [Note 3: CHUD is the only State organization that has a border-wide network of organizations serving specifically the Colonias]
- (3) Serve as a catalyst that promotes and facilitates the active involvement of Colonia residents in strengthening the social infrastructure of their community
- (4) Maintain the visible, active, respected, and cohesive institutional presence of TAMU across the border, which currently provides a portal of access and a bridge of connectivity to the entire TAMU education, research, service, and outreach resource base for Colonia residents and service providers.

TIAER is presenting new ideas based on sound science to make voluntary programs more effective and keep direct regulation removed from agricultural operations.

Statewide impact of the agriculture contests is exemplified by Tarleton enrolling students from over 220 of the 254 Texas counties. The Museum will actively collect, conserve, exhibit, research, and interpret outstanding works of visual art with particular interest in art of the Americas and of the region includes Mexico, Texas, and surrounding states. Each year over 85,000 students, South Texas residents, and visitors are served by Museum programs. Many activities are planned and implemented in collaboration with various departments within Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi, other area colleges and universities, public and private schools, senior citizen programs, and social service and criminal justice agencies that help troubled youth.

Other-The 74th Legislature of the State of Texas appropriated Special Item Funding within the State appropriated budget in 1995 with the intent of having the Art Museum of South Texas become affiliated with Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi and administered as a cooperative joint venture.

Loss of Special Item Funding would catastrophically impact the Museum's educational activity. It is doubtful that increased community funding could be secured to provide the financial support to cover the professional salaries provided from Special Item funds. Programs that serve University students and the broader community would have to be cut as private sector funding, which has already been strained due to the recession, could not compensate for the loss. A major effort would be needed to support

The negative impact in the region would adversely affect the perception and image of the State of Texas and the A&M University System.

3 Center for Coastal Studies

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of the Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi (TAMU-CC) Center for Coastal Studies(CCS) is to increase knowledge and understanding of the marine ecosystems, habitats, flora, fauna, and socioeconomics of the Texas coast and Gulf of Mexico. As an interdisciplinary marine research institute, the CCS conducts basic and applied research, ecological monitoring, public education and outreach, and graduate level education and research programs. CCS scientists and students are working on marine topics from the local area of the Texas Coastal Bend to the farthest reaches of the Gulf of Mexico on Mexico's southeastern coasts. These scientists provide nearly 70 years of scientific expertise. Their efforts contribute significantly to our understanding of the marine environments on which much of the quality of our lives is dependent. Center activities support Closing the Gaps and the university's goals as outlined in Momentum 2015.

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of the Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi Early Childhood Development Center (ECDC) is to be a comprehensive educational facility, collaborating with area school districts and demonstrating instructional excellence, integrated services and equity in an educational community for students, teachers, administrators, parents and university students. The Blanche Davis Moore Early Childhood Development Center at Texas A&M—Corpus Christi(TAMU-CC)has been in existence since 1996. Funded by the Seventy-Third Texas Legislature, the 50,000 square-foot, two-story facility was constructed to serve at-risk bilingual children and their parents. The ECDC encourages academicians and practitioners to work together to instruct children age three through grade five. Students are selected through a random stratified lottery which generates a demographic profile replicating that of the encompassing district, Corpus Christi Independent School District: 65% low socioeconomic, 35% non-low socioeconomic, and 50% students from homes where Spanish is spoken, and 50% students from homes where English is spoken. The ECDC is a clinical setting designed for direct instruction and observation and is a vital component in the preparation of undergraduate nursing and graduate nurse practitioners and pre-service teachers. The Center successfully operates a wellness center, counseling service, and parent literacy program—each supporting the overall development of the young child.

How did the Special Item originate?

Other-Special Item Appropriation.

There was no time limit on the item when it was created. The funds initially provided by the Special Item have continued to support the basic operation of the ECDC. One of the primary tenets of the ECDC is the need for educators to become involved in the lives of students at an early age—and to extend that involvement to all parts of their lives—physical, social, emotional, and intellectual. The ECDC successfully operates a wellness center, counseling service, and parent literacy program—each supporting the overall development of the young child. These comprehensive services address the needs of the children served by the Center and their families. University faculty is deeply involved in the delivery of these comprehensive services. The building is utilized year round for activities such as screening, assessment, play therapy, observation of parent-child interactions and childchild interactions, parent conferences and tutoring and is staffed on a flexible schedule to accommodate parent and family needs. ECDC is recognized for its excellent facility design and developing comprehensive services program. Programs are designed to impact the whole family through education and assistance.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

No other funds would be available if special or exceptional item funding was reduced or eliminated. The ECDC would not have an onsite nurse to care for the health needs

of the children in the Center. The Center would not be able to deliver services and programs planned for the next biennium to support the university's goals towards Closing the Gaps.

8 Coastal Bend Business Innovation Center

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi has established a business incubator, named the Coastal Bend Business Innovation Center(CBBIC). Aligned with the university's College of Business, the CBBIC will further the university's mission of education, research and economic development and will offer TAMU-CC faculty and students the opportunity to apply classroom learning to the real world experience of entrepreneurship and small business development. The TAMU-CC CBBIC incubator will promote entrepreneurship and technology commercialization from three main areas:

- 1. Faculty and researcher commercialization opportunities within TAMU-CC.
- 2. Support local industry by creating local support companies not currently available.
- 3. Local entrepreneurs with new and innovative ideas that have strong job creation or technical potential.

The incubator accepts these clients through a vetting process into a 2-5 year incubation program supported by student interns, graduate students, faculty, staff and a business resource network of local area business willing to support entrepreneurial start ups. The program has an active advisory committee of key leaders of industry and government to assist in the advisory process. This committee is currently chaired by the Mayor of Corpus Christi.

The university in turn will receive opportunities for students to work side by side assisting and counseling entrepreneurial companies, faculty research and consulting opportunities.

The National Business Incubation Association(NBIA)has actively conducted economic impact studies and surveys and has concluded that "Business Incubators Work." According to the NBIA, "Business incubation programs create new jobs for a low cost and a substantial return on investment. The estimated public subsidy cost per job was \$1,109." The NBIA reported that the return on public investment in terms of tax revenues was \$4.97 for every \$1 of estimated public operating subsidy. This figure is highly

understated as it does not include state and federal taxes. Over the 20-year history of the LBTC at LSU, the creation of over 10,000 new or retained jobs have been documented. Indiana University Emerging Technologies Center conducted a study in May 2005 and used the IMPLAN input-output model to determine the economic impact of their incubator. The survey revealed that the average tenant had 5 full-time and 2 part-time employees with a total payroll of \$437,000. The model calculated a total impact for the area in excess of \$36 million. The Indiana University incubator reported a \$2.72 value for each \$1.00 in governmental funding. Failure to fund this program would result in the loss of opportunity to the coastal bend area of all the aforementioned positive impacts as well as the end to the success of the program currently in operation. This would be devastating to this area currently impacted by a BRAC, low population growth and low economic growth.

9 Engineering Program

That need is ongoing and requires sustained funding.

The best and brightest students are leaving our region to pursue a college education because the resources are not here and these folks never return leading to poor economic growth over the last 30 years. The downward expansion of A&M-Texarkana is designed to address this problem. The Texarkana region is very supportive of the university goals and the impending downward expansion. This new milestone for the university will have an extremely positive impact on Northeast Texas and the State of Texas.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The legislature has provided downward expansion funding to other universities in the state over the years to assist in the transition to a self sufficient enrollment base. The effort to become a comprehensive four year University would be completely devastated if this funding is not continued. Funding sustainability is key as has been shown on three state campuses that have downward expanded successfully into full four year comprehensive Universities. A&M- Texarkana is committed to a phasing out of this downward expansion special item funding as soon the university enrollment reaches a 5,000 FTE annual enrollment which is the enrollment foundation considered to provide a self sufficient operational base with the current formula funding system by the Coordinating Board. Eliminating or reducing this funding at this time would result in an elimination of all student success initiatives and the staff supporting these efforts as well as eliminating all full time lower division faculty which would for all practical

These spin-off companies have generated more than 200 new high tech jobs and have a capitalization of over \$40 M. Reduction of the Special Item funding will put the Center in jeopardy of continuation of the strong track record of enhancing economic development in Texas. The Special Item funds are especially critical because they support much of the infrastructure of the Center including the majority of the research faculty personnel. The specific manpower support of the research faculty by the Special Item funds is critical since other Center funds either forbid or restrict full time support for research faculty. As a result, loss of Special Item funds would emaciate the research faculty positions in the Center with projected losses of more than 60% of faculty. Finally, Special Item support is intimately linked with support of the education mission of the Center. Loss of Special Item funding will severely restrict the education opportunities for talented graduate and undergraduate students, and terminate the unique research training program underway with the Houston Community College.

NASA-JSC designs, buys, and operates systems that monitor and control international space missions for the United States and international partners. Opportunities will be lost to participate in these activities.

The Post-Doctoral Aerospace Fellowship program between UH/UHCL and NASA-JSC would be terminated in its fourth three-year cycle of operation. This would terminate access by the State of Texas to over \$15 million per year of R&D performed by JSC and its contractors in cooperation with UH and UHCL. It would significantly slow the flow of that knowledge and technology into the Texas economy.

Various local, state and federal agencies provide funding to EIH to support applied research needs within the State of Texas. These project funds have provided support for over 30 graduate and 20 undergraduate students during most fiscal years.

In addition, there would be significant curtailment of university community involvement due to the loss of this major outreach program.

Failure to fund this special item would severely limit the ability to provide timely test results to farmers and ranchers in the region and reduce the University's research capacity. The nursery/landscape industry would also be affected by a reduction in services provided.

The Vietnam Center also leverages contacts in Vietnam to bring students from Vietnam to Texas Tech University while academic connections with Vietnam have led to joint research projects.

This special item funding contributes to the support of the Water Resources Center, the Wind Science and Engineering Research Center, and the Cooperative Biological Research Database program. Focused investments allowed through this funding support and encourage multidisciplinary research into current energy and environmental issues facing the region and state, as well as those having national and global impact.

The Water Resources Center is a multidisciplinary water resources and environmental research program, focusing on seeking solutions to water resource and energy issues that are of common concern, such as drought, population growth, declining groundwater levels, emerging contaminants, and competition for available water supplies.

The Wind Science and Engineering Research Center and the multi-disciplinary doctoral research program in wind science and engineering are also partially supported by the special item. WISE is advancing research in wind powered renewable energies and technologies. The Center's research progress into occupant protection, debris impact, shelter design and building retrofit, and the increase in understanding of tornadic wind loads are providing solutions to save lives.

The Cooperative Biological Research Database program provides a current and historical database of biological samples collected from Texas flora and fauna for use by decision-makers, scientists, and the general public.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

This strategy provides significant leverage in attracting sponsored funding by providing matching funds, infrastructural support for "in kind" matching, and a base of research reputation, experience, and expertise attractive to external research sponsors. As a result of no or reduced funding, important research of significant potential economic benefit to the State of Texas and the surrounding region would be eliminated. Additionally, valuable research in alternate energy sources, support for wind energy-related workforce development, more efficient use of existing energy and water resources, and environmental protection, restoration, and management will be lost.

4 Research in Emerging Technologies and Economic Development in Texas

Appropriation \$545,152 \$4,333,305 \$333,305

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of this special line item is to enhance the Texas economy by creating and transferring intellectual property and by developing more effective workforces and marketing strategies.

How did the Special Item originate?

Special item request funded by the Legislature. The three line items that were consolidated into the 2000-2001 Research in Emerging Technologies and Economic Development in Texas line item were initiated in 1967, 1986, and 1990.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No. This special item was proposed as an on-going effort to support research to enhance the Texas economy and workforce.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No

What University program is supported by the Special item?

In addition to the individually targeted proof of concept research efforts noted above, the line item contributes to the support of the Wine Marketing Research Institute. The Institute's programs and studies focus on fostering economic development and growth of the grape and wine industry in Texas. Through these research efforts in marketing and enology, the Institute is helping Texas wineries to expand domestic and export markets, and improve the quality of Texas wines and grapes. The industry has grown from a relatively small local industry with approximately 12 wineries to 180 wineries which with grape growers and ancillary industries generate \$1.35 billion in economic impact for the state. Much of this development is in rural areas where the vineyards and wineries provide economic diversity, attract tourism to the regions, and provide crucial employment opportunities. The Institute continues to play an important role in providing educational opportunities for undergraduate and graduate students in cutting edge research for the Texas wine industry.

This line also contributes to seeded research grants in human development and family studies, personal financial planning, addiction and recovery, food, nutrition and hospitality, interior design, and marriage and family therapy. These investments are expected to lead to major advances to increase productivity in Texas, potentially reducing burdens on social and governmental services, and improving family relations.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

TTU is committed to supporting the commercialization of new technologies, and this special item contributes to an overall plan to bridge the gap between basic and applied research and proof of concept. Through this vehicle to advance promising technologies, TTU is able to bring forward opportunities of significant potential economic benefit to the State of Texas and the surrounding region. Reducing this ability to provide start-up capital money to fund promising projects during formative stages would all but eliminate the chances of obtaining substantial external federal support for such research and would decrease the level of sponsored projects to the university in areas

emphasized. Beginning in Fall 2009 this line contributes critical graduate research fellowship support to an initiative targeted at growth in areas of research identified by TTU to deliver an economically important return to the State and to the region. These graduate students will be the faculty of the future and the innovative problem-solving business leaders of tomorrow. TTU's workforce research also addresses important social and human problems of Texas and nation. The findings from such research programs have untold economic benefit to the State of Texas and beyond. This funding has allowed TTU the ability to respond quickly to problems, opportunities, and issues of emerging state and national interest. Reduction of funding would adversely affect TTU's ability to protect intellectual property.

5 Competitive Knowledge

Start Year: 2006 2010 2011

Appropriation \$2,500,000 \$2,965,865 \$2,965,865

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The undergraduate and graduate educational experience, and ultimately the success of students, is dependent upon the quality of student-faculty interaction. Faculty members are expected to provide quality instruction, engage in meaningful research endeavors, and contribute to their communities through informed and skillful service. Therefore, it is important that an adequate number of faculty members be provided who use their research expertise to enrich their teaching. Findings of research are integrated into the teaching and service components of the university's mission to provide graduates who are well prepared to enter the workforce and address the challenges facing Texas and the world.

How did the Special Item originate?

During the 79th Legislative Session, the Legislature implemented a new funding mechanism for general academic institutions reporting greater than \$50 million per year in total research expenditures. Prior to this policy change by the Legislature, TTU had been receving funding for a special item named Faculty Excellence. The Faculty Excellence line was eliminated and replaced with the Competitive Knowledge Fund.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No time limit was given to this item when it was created.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

This line item will require continuous support because formula funding does not completely provide for base level funding needs within the university.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The following colleges have faculty members supported by this funding: College of Arts and Sciences, College of Agriculture Sciences and Natural Resources, Rawls College of Business Administration, College of Architecture, College of Engineering, Honors College, College of Human Sciences, the School of Law, College of Mass Communication and Visual and Performing Arts.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Texas Tech University has invested in these highly qualified and skilled faculty members with the expectations that they continue to function as valuable contributors to TTU's teaching and research mission. Not having this line item would adversely impact the level and quality of service provided to our students, including reduced research productivity, course offerings, and graduation rates. Faculty Salaries costs are recurring expenses. If this funding source is reduced or eliminated, TTU would not have the resources to fund the 33 filled faculty positions.

6 Junction Annex Operation

Start Year: 1972 2010 2011

Appropriation \$250,000 \$362,592 \$362,592

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

To provide enhanced access to higher education for residents of the under-served Western Hill Country region; facilities for off-campus academic programs (especially field science and teacher education) for local and resident Texas Tech students; and facilities for off-campus special programs, such as Outdoor School, (a residential field science enrichment program for rural independent school districts).

How did the Special Item originate?

Statute: V.T.S. Article 2615d-1 as passed by the 62d Legislature and Special item approved by the same Legislature.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. 206 students are enrolled in courses taught by TTU. This accounted for 677 semester credit hours. The TTU "Instruction and Operations" formula funding supports these instructors. This Center supports higher education opportunities in a very rural area three hours distance from the serving community college. Therefore, the Center will continue to rely on special support for academic program delivery, as well as facility upgrade and maintenance.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Academic programs offered at this site include: Master of Art Education; B.S. in Multidisciplinary Studies (EC-6) with ESL endorsement; Ed.D. in Educational Leadership; M.Ed. in Educational Leadership with Principal Certification; Superintendent Certification Preparation; Master of Science in Multidisciplinary Science; Bachelor of General Studies; M.Ed. in Guidance and Counseling (Angelo State University); various field science courses for TTU College of Arts and Sciences.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The fastest-growing rural area in Texas would be severely underserved in terms of higher education, including technical and workforce development training, and critical scientific research would be eliminated. Discontinuing the distance education programs offered at Junction would negatively impact Texas Tech students (who have no other regional options for field science study) and the residents of rural counties in the Hill Country desiring to participate in higher education. The residents of Junction and surrounding Kimble County would suffer severe negative economic impact through the loss of a major driver of regional economic development (over \$3 million per year impact).

7 Texas Tech University Hill Country Educational Network

To provide expanded access to higher education for residents of the underserved Hill Country through a network of higher education teaching sites; The TTU Hill Country Educational Network

How did the Special Item originate?

Exceptional item request

Does item still serve original purpose

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. 459 students are enrolled in courses taught by TTU. This accounted for 1366 semester credit hours. The TTU "Instruction and Operations" formula funding supports these instructors. However, this initiative supports the higher education support centers spaced an hour apart over a 14-county rural area. These special item funds support the operations of these centers, not the instruction salaries. Growth rates in student enrollment will never equal those in urban centers, so continued support of this initiative is imperative to providing opportunities to rural residents.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

TTU: B.S. in Multidisciplinary Studies (EC-6) with ESL endorsement (special education coming fall 2010); M.Ed. in Educational Leadership with Principal Certification; Ed.D. in Educational Leadership; Superintendent Certification Preparation; Master of Science in Multidisciplinary Science; Bachelor of General Studies.; Angelo State: M.Ed. in Guidance and Counseling; M.A. in Curriculum and Instruction coming summer 2010; M.Ed. (Reading and Diagnostician) coming fall 2010; Master's in Public Administration coming fall 2010; undergraduate certificate in business and technical writing coming fall 2010.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The fastest growing rural area in Texas would continue to be under-served in terms of public higher education opportunities, including technical and workforce development training, with subsequent negative impact on economic development in the region. Discontinuing the development of these facilities and instructional programs would negatively impact the residents of the rural counties in the Texas Hill Country and fail to support the goals of the Closing the Gaps study by eliminating critical skills training for nurses and educators.

8 Small Business Development Center

Start Year: 1990 2010 2011

Appropriation \$200,000 \$1,227,706 \$1,227,706

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

To provide free business counseling and training for all small businesses in the 95 county service area of the Northwest Texas SBDC (NWTSBDC). Special emphasis is being given to rural small businesses through basic and advanced counseling and wireless broadband teleconferencing.

How did the Special Item originate?

The original funding was created by a strategy in the General Appropriations Act along with rider restrictions.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No, there was no time limit placed on the SBDC funding. This program has been viewed to have a continuous value in supporting the growth and expansion of the small business community of the State. As a result, this program has been funded on an ongoing basis as one of the primary programs of the State in supporting small business. This program has had excellent success in developing and growing small business activity in the state. Since line item funding began in 1990, the NWTSBDC has helped open 7,122 new businesses, helped expand 1,620 existing businesses and helped create 24,261 new jobs through the end of FY 2009. This economic activity has and will continue to justify the line item funding based upon the revenue returned to the state as determined by the CPA's formula.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. The current state funding for the SBDC comes from a recommendation from the Comptroller of Public Accounts (CPA) of revenue neutrality based upon a formula that office developed. This formula takes data from an independent third party annual survey that determines the jobs created and retained, and economic activity generated by the respective SBDC region within the state. This information is then input into the CPA's formula and a revenue neutral funding level is determined for the respective SBDC region. This then forms the basis of the CPA's recommendation to the legislature for biennial funding for the SBDC region. This approach has been in place for the past six years and has proven to be fair and effective in supporting the SBDC's assistance in developing and expanding the small businesses of Texas.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The Northwest Texas Small Business Development Center is the program supported by the special item. This program is one of the primary community outreach programs of the university and is an integral part of the effort to support economic growth of the region and expansion of the small business sector.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

All of the Federal Funds that this program receives require either one-for-one or two-for-one matching. If this program is not funded by the State of Texas, an equal amount of funding will be lost from Federal and Local Sources. This decrease in funding would result in a major reduction in program services and would cause the NWTSBDC to serve 3,000 to 4,000 fewer small business clients, 6,000 to 9,000 fewer seminar attendees, create 300 to 400 fewer new businesses and a loss of 1,500 to 2,000 new jobs created.

9 Museum & Historic, Cultural, and Educational Centers

Start Year: 1966 2010 2011

Appropriation \$1,937,634 \$2,137,634 \$2,137,634

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

This strategy includes support for the International Cultural Center, the Lubbock Lake Landmark, the Museum of Texas Tech University, and the National Ranching Heritage Center (NRHC). Each of the four entities has a teaching and research function for university students and faculty, and an over-arching mission of public outreach and education locally, regionally, nationally, and globally. The collections, exhibitions, publications, and programs conducted at all four sites complement the diverse interests and roles of TTU in public and professional service. All four centers offer an inviting and informative gateway to the university and provide many citizens opportunities for direct involvement with various functions of the centers.

How did the Special Item originate?

International Cultural Center

It originated due to the interest in, and need for, expansion of the University's international programs and the initiative of a K-12 international education program. The ICC was created and funded by Legislative initiative. An operational and programming budget is provided as a line item. The category is listed as public service and the purpose is to maximize and synergize international dimensions of education for TTU students, faculty, and the multiple and diverse communities served by the University in its outreach programs.

Museum and Lubbock Lake Landmark

Beginning in 1966, the Museum/Lubbock Lake Landmark had its own bill pattern in the General Appropriations Act. In 1989, The Legislature decided that the Museum, the Natural Ranching Heritage Center should be moved to a Special Line Item within the Texas Tech University bill pattern.

National Ranching Heritage Center

Special Item request funded by the Legislature.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No, none of these programs had a time limit.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No

What University program is supported by the Special item?

International Cultural Center

International K-12 Educational Outreach program provides educational opportunities exposing K-12students in public, private schools and home schooled classes to global awareness. International Cultural Center Operations provides international programming for students and faculty/staff of TTU and for thousands of South Plains residents each year. Study Abroad has sent 832 students to study throughout the world since 2008. International Student and Scholar Services (ISSS) provides orientation, counseling and services to international students in many cross-cultural issues; operates F-1 Student and J-1 Exchange Visitor programs; files employment-based applications for H-1B, O-1 and Permanent Resident status in the United States.

Museum and Lubbock Lake Landmark

9 Museum & Historic, Cultural, and Educational Centers

A Master's of Arts in Museum Science and a Master's of Science in Heritage Management. Museum facilities and resources also support the Interdisciplinary, Sciences, Arts and Humanities, and Architecture programs at Texas Tech University.

National Ranching Heritage Center

NRHC staff support graduate studies in Museum Science and Heritage Management degree programs as instructors and guest speakers; provides venue for student interns; the historic structures provide research opportunities for students in Historical Preservation studies in College of Architecture; special events provide venue for students in history, agriculture, mass communications and education.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The Museum, Lubbock Lake Landmark, and National Ranching Heritage Center are trusted with the responsibility to preserve and protect collections, and to provide professional stewardship for those objects placed in their care. That mandate will be disrupted as a consequence of reduced or eliminated funding. The immediate impact of no funding will be loss of staff, accreditation, and forfeiture of collections held-in-trust on behalf of the state and federal governments. Public programming, as well as the dissemination of information gained from collections, will be decreased or eliminated should funding be cut. Service to the University's academic programs will be eliminated, and the Museum Science & Heritage Management graduate programs and other TTU classes held at the locations will have to be discontinued. The research and educational activities at the NRHC and the Lubbock Lake Landmark will be curtailed, and care of the cultural and natural heritage associated with these locations will be dramatically reduced or terminated. The loss of public trust will be devastating nationally and internationally. If not funded, the International Cultural Center will be inoperative and cannot fulfill the functions for which the building was constructed. The target groups to be served by the International Cultural Center, especially the thousands of schoolchildren and TTU students who will be adversely affected by receiving reduced services and inadequate educational opportunities.

10 Center for Financial Responsibility

Start Year: 2000 2010 2011

Appropriation \$240,000 \$240,001 \$240,001

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The Center for Financial Responsibility (CFR) mission is to help Texas citizens achieve personal responsibility in retirement planning, debt management and financial literacy by conducting research, and delivery of financial knowledge to citizens, financial services professionals, fiduciaries and teachers. The CFR focuses on the financial well-being of Texas citizens by emphasizing increasing savings and financial preparation for retirement. The CFR develops financial literacy resources to prevent individual bankruptcy and financial hardships that negatively affect state and local economies. Research conducted by the CFR with high school teachers found a reluctance to teach the topic due to 1) lack of academic preparation and 2) personal financial issues within the lives of those educators. Institutions of higher education and those students graduating with high debt loads from student loans and credit card abuse are being served through research and service from the nationally recognized Red-to-Black Financial Counseling Center (R2B) and state-wide financial literacy research with Texas adults. The R2B model continues to earn national visibility and recognition as a means of increasing student retention and matriculation rates in colleges and universities throughout the U.S. A third goal is to increase the number of academic programs in Personal Financial Planning (PFP) with emphasis on increasing career opportunities within minority institutions throughout Texas.

How did the Special Item originate?

This item originated through special item request for funding to allow the faculty in Personal Financial Planning to bring their unique knowledge of financial planning and research skills to bear on the financial problems of families and individuals in Texas. Those areas of emphasis such as debt management, retirement planning and financial literacy are issues of public policy and direct economic benefit to the citizens of Texas.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No. This special item was proposed as an on-going effort to impact Texas public policy by assisting families and individuals with those personal finance issues that have direct impact on Texas public policy and economic activity. Research conducted, grants sought by and information/ testimony delivered by CFR personnel and PFP doctoral students is focused on family and individual debt management, retirement planning, health insurance adequacy, financial literacy/education

The relatively small amount of funds requested are essential to providing an institutional framework to develop the truly unique services, research and programs that brought national recognition to the PFP program and Texas Tech University as the best program in the U.S. from The New York Times. The ability to leverage the funds has been proven every year in the form of the acquisition of additional monies that increase the academic uniqueness, recruitment and retention of students, publication of research, and development of programs of direct benefit to Texas Tech as well as the state of Texas.

11 Institutional Enhancement

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of this special line item is to support and enhance the academic research environment at Texas Tech University, preparing students to be the workforce of tomorrow for Texas.

The 76th Legislature enacted a policy decision to consolidate certain types of Special Items and added \$1 M per year for academic enhancement.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No. This special item was proposed as an on-going effort to enhance the academic research programs and operations for Texas Tech University.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item?

No. Unless the funding allocated to the formulas is dramatically increased, the institution will continue to need this funding to cover the costs of essential core academic costs.

The Institutional Enhancement line funding impacts every academic research program at Texas Tech University through infrastructural program support.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

This line item contributes core academic and operational infrastructure support that enables Texas Tech University to provide an extensive selection of academic research programs all dedicated to educational excellence: 118 undergraduate, 107 master's, and 60 doctoral degree programs. Through successful graduates and research generated through these programs, Texas Tech University is able to provide long term economic benefit to the region and State. The current \$20M over the biennium for this special item represents the difference in the University's ability to provide basic educational services, and in developing quality academic and research programs. If this funding is reduced or eliminated the University's academic support infrastructure would be compromised, resulting in fewer programs and opportunities to produce outstanding leaders in the Texas workforce and innovative faculty of tomorrow.

4 Center for Fine Arts

Based on their assessments, appropriate nutrition and/or exercise programs are developed and monitored to ensure each person achieves their intended goals. The IWH also supports the annual Power of a Healthy Woman Symposium, an annual event that brings outstanding researchers, medical and health professionals together for a half day event to educate women to learn more about wellness and taking responsibility for their own lives and choices. We have supported the Irma Rangel Fit to Lead summer camp for underprivileged girls, the Dallas Women's Museum summer camp for young women, health fairs both on and off campus, and a brown bag lunch series for on-campus education and advocacy.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The IWH has played a major role in the University's initiative focusing on wellness, called Wellness Connections. It is a comprehensive healthy lifestyle initiative for TWU students, faculty, and staff. The director of the IWH and the staff and students of the Exercise and Sports Nutrition Clinic will both play major roles in ensuring the success of this initiative by providing leadership, education, programs, assessments, and seeking outside funding to further the research agenda of the IWH. The IWH is seen as a place to receive accurate, up-to-date information and research regarding women's health and is a platform for the Power of a Healthy Woman precepts to become a community-wide movement. If not funded, these programs, initiatives and symposia will no longer be available to the community. We have made great strides in the last three years to become more involved in both the university and community, especially by targeting our research to meet the needs of students, faculty and staff struggling with obesity, and attempting to incorporate healthy behaviors their lifestyles. The Institute for Women's Health is the only research center in the nation that is studying a combination of physical, emotional, and social factors to learn about women's health across the life span. Without this information, women's health will remain fragmented and many of women's unique health needs will continue to go unrecognized, unidentified, or unmet.

Medical education is only partially complete when the M.D. degree is awarded; further education in accredited clinical residency programs is essential for the development of the full range of knowledge and skills to perform medical diagnosis and treatment, the actual practice of medicine, and the certification required before a doctor is qualified to practice medicine. This residency education function is a major part of the primary mission of all Texas Medical schools. UT Southwestern shoulders the burden of training the vast majority of residents in North Texas. Consequently, it has one of the largest residency programs in the state – larger than every other State institution – and bears a disproportionate share of the resident costs in the state. Serving the mission of training residents has significant costs. Medical schools bear the full costs of providing instruction by faculty, and yet the State's recently-created GME formula currently provides funding for only 1/3 of these education costs. A second significant cost is the stipend paid to the residents, which can be borne by the hospitals or by the medical schools, and finding sources to fund these stipend costs for primary care residents can be particularly challenging. This strategy is essential to enable primary care residency programs vital to the state to continue, which are a crucial source of primary care doctors in North Texas and indeed all of Texas.

How did the Special Item originate?

The Primary Care Residency Training Program originated as a new Special Item strategy in UT Southwestern's bill pattern in the 1996-1997 General Appropriations Act, as directed by the 74th Legislature.

This strategy specifically supports the 88 primary care residents who rotate through UT Southwestern's University Hospital, which is a critical part UT Southwestern's mission, and which is critical in meeting the Legislature's statewide goal of decreasing the shortage of primary care doctors and providing quality care to the citizens of North Texas.

The loss of any one of these leaders would have a corresponding impact on technical talent and outside grant funding brought to Texas. Moreover, with the reduction in or flattening of external grant funding sources, such as the NIH, attracting the best and brightest becomes even more critical for growing the research base in Texas, while competition becomes even more fierce and institutions without independent sources will have an even harder time recruiting and retaining other star researchers. The funding provided to the Institute positions Texas well to be able to offer research support to attract either current National Academy members or rising-star young investigators who will collaborate with them. Finally, without state research funds to the Institute, the major federal and private funding investment projected for 2010 and 2011 would not be possible even if star researchers were not recruited away and new star recruits were brought to UT Southwestern.

The Institute for Innovations in Medical Technology support Core Laboratories, which are an extremely vital resource for Graduate Biomedical students, for faculty research laboratories throughout the university, and for future commercial partners. Research services provided by these Core Laboratories contributes substantially to the education of all graduate students and fellows at UT Southwestern, a total of 1,775 or 952 FTSEs. In addition, the Office for Technology Development is supported by the Institute for Innovations in Medical Technology, which successfully spearheads UT Southwestern's technology transfer efforts.

3 Institute for Innovations in Medical Technology

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

A reduction or loss of funding would hinder research that would otherwise lead to the development of new biomedical technologies and would limit the crucial continuous development of Core Laboratory infrastructure that facilitates the transition from discovery to commercialization.

On the whole, UT Southwestern has the opportunity of creating a significant commercialization center in Dallas. The new BioCenter in the Southwestern Medical District holds the promise of creating a critical mass of infrastructure for the emergence of a biotechnology industry in North Texas. The Core Laboratories are continuing to identify and offer leading technologies to UT Southwestern researchers and future commercial partners. For example, new-generation DNA sequencing systems that offer striking new abilities to understand the molecular basis of disease are the newest addition to our cutting-edge infrastructure. Without continued Special Item funding for the Institute for Innovations in Medical Technology not only will early-stage research that is already identifying drug targets, drug candidates, and other treatments be critically impaired, but the promise of a vibrant biotechnology industry in North Texas becomes unfeasible.

4 Metroplex Comprehensive Medical Imaging Center

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Modern imaging techniques permit exquisite views of both structure and function – from views of every atom in a protein molecule to functional magnetic resonance images of the neural activities that underlie complex behaviors in humans. With such amazing opportunities, the Imaging Center's scientists and doctors are engaged in both the development of imaging technologies and their exploitation to understand and treat disease. The goals of the Center are to: Provide the only imaging center of its kind in the Southwest, allowing UT Southwestern researchers and collaborators to investigate molecular and cellular mechanisms of disease. Advance the diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of numerous debilitating diseases through the development and use of advanced medical imaging. Retain highly sought-after basic and clinical researchers and recruit rising star faculty to Texas. Bring millions in federal and private grants to Texas. To achieve these goals, the Center at UT Southwestern encompasses a broad spectrum of imaging activities. The Advanced Imaging Research Center – established in collaboration with UT Dallas and UT Arlington – houses necessary state-of-the-art instruments and a variety of other imaging capabilities are encompassed in core labs. Ultimately, the unprecedented images and measurements of healthy and diseased tissue that modern imaging provides are crucial to developing more effective treatments for the sick and, eventually, preventive care to the well.

How did the Special Item originate?

The Metroplex Comprehensive Medical Imaging Center originated as a new Special Item strategy in UT Southwestern's bill pattern in the FY 2006-2007 General Appropriations Act, as directed by the 79th Legislature.

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No time limit was placed on the Metroplex Comprehensive Medical Imaging Center when it was created as new technology and enhancements will always be changing and developing.

Seed funding is vital to support the development of cutting-edge imaging technologies, to continue to recruit star faculty to Texas who bring many millions in grant funding, to acquire cutting-edge equipment, and to offer joint academic programs with UT Dallas and UT Arlington. Resulting discoveries, in turn, attract many millions more in grant funding to Texas. However, State formula funding for health institutions matches research expenditures at health institutions at a rate of only ~1.5% (while expenditures at General Academics are matched at 5% to 16%). A 1.5% match is not nearly sufficient to grow a vibrant research enterprise. Without significantly increased Research Formula Funding, Special Item funding to support vital infrastructure and to seed research continues to be essential.

Research is a vital and predominant part of Graduate Biomedical student education, since the learning happens through mentorship in the laboratory. Research conducted in the Imaging Center involves not only the scientists spearheading discoveries of new methods and technologies of advanced medical imaging for diagnosis and treatment of health disorders, but also all other scientists and students on campus who utilize the resources of the imaging equipment. Therefore, the Imaging Center contributes to the education of all graduate students and fellows at UT Southwestern, a total of 1,775 or 952 FTSEs, as well as to the education of approximately 45 graduate and undergraduate students from UT Southwestern, UT Dallas, and UT Arlington that work directly in the Imaging Center.

4 Metroplex Comprehensive Medical Imaging Center

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The operation of this unique facility housing costly state-of-the-art equipment requires substantial support for the engineers, staff, and physicists that operate it. Retention and recruitment of world-class faculty to continue to position Texas as a leader in imaging science demands such infrastructure. Without support, the facility could not be maintained, world-class faculty could not be retained and rising stars could not be recruited. The opportunity cost of not having this facility and this expertise would be in the loss of scientific discovery and hundreds of millions in future external grant funding.

5 Regional Burn Care Center

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

To provide comprehensive burn care rehabilitation, education, supplies, and banked organs and tissues for clinical transplant for adult and pediatric patients and healthcare professionals. The Center is also the only American Burn Association and American College of Surgeons-verified burn center in North Texas, providing a regional resource for disaster management of burn trauma.

How did the Special Item originate?

The Regional Burn Center originated as a new Special Item strategy in UT Southwestern's bill pattern in the FY 1988-1989 General Appropriations Act, as directed by the 70th Legislature.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No time limit was placed when the Regional Burn Center was created, with the intent of growing the Center to the internationally-recognized stature that it currently holds and continuously providing the specialized care demanded by critically-injured burn patients.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The Burn Center supports the continued training of faculty and the teaching of medical and professional health students and advanced personnel in clinical and rehabilitative burn treatment and in the use of homologous tissue and transplants. Approximately 51 residents rotate through the Burn Center each year. The Regional Burn Center provides crucial patient care to burn and transplant patients as well as exceptional learning and training experience for the medical students at UT Southwestern. The Burn Center provides comprehensive care and banked organs and tissues for clinical transplant for residents across Texas and is the only such resource for North Texas. The Center also makes available to all medical facilities and physicians caring for burns across Texas, the consultation services and skin allograft tissues that may aid in the care of their patients.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

As the only American Burn Association and American College of Surgeons-verified burn center in North Texas, curtailment of this program would seriously hamper the continuation of current services to adult and pediatric patients and health care professionals in the region, and delay the development of critical improvements such as permanent skin transplants for critically-injured burn patients.

6 Center for Treatment and Research on Sickle Cell Disease

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Sickle cell disease, which is most prevalent in those of African descent, causes excruciating pain, organ damage, and premature death. A third of all children with this disease suffers from brain abnormalities and reduced IQ. There is a pressing need to screen for such brain injury in patients, and to understand the biology of the sickling process and the genetic basis of the disease, in order to translate basic science discovery into better patient treatment and eventually a cure.

The Center has helped UT Southwestern make dramatic progress both in clinical research that promises better near-term treatments to care for patients with sickle cell and its related complication and in basic scientific discoveries that promise even a possible cure. Most promising is a completely new technique developed to repair genetic mutations using DNA's own processes, which could eventually lead to a cure not just for sickle cell disease, but for many other genetic and blood disorders. With continuing added support from this State Special Item, UT Southwesten's mission is to maintain a world-class Sickle Cell Center focused on: research on the fundamental cause of the disease leading to the discovery of a cure, development and refinement of new and improved therapies, and dramatic expansion of treatment clinics, as with steadily improving childhood care, most patients now survive long into adulthood but with increasingly complex problems.

How did the Special Item originate?

The Center for Treatment and Research on Sickle Cell Disease originated as a new Special Item strategy in UT Southwestern's bill pattern in the FY 2006-2007 General Appropriations Act, as directed by the 79th Legislature.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

There was no time limit placed when the Center for Treatment and Research on Sickle Cell Disease was created with the theory that ongoing research will continue to develop means to new therapies and treatments of diseases, and eventually a cure for Sickle Cell disease.

Basic and clinical research conducted in the Sickle Cell Center supports the education of approximately 500 graduate students and fellows and 1st and 3rd year medical students. In addition, 20 graduate students and fellows are directly trained in the sickle cell researchers' laboratories.

In addition, this Center provides crucial leading-edge patient care of both children and adult patients afflicted with this devastating disease, as well as exceptional learning and training experience for the medical students, residents, and physicians at UT Southwestern.

6 Center for Treatment and Research on Sickle Cell Disease

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Sickle Cell disease is one of the most common and most devastating diseases of African Americans. It is a genetic condition that causes the production of abnormal red blood cells that are unable to carry oxygen normally. Sickle Cell disease can cause severe pain, blindness, brain defects, lung disorders, and early death (often in the teen years or early adulthood). Despite dramatic progress in recent years, it remains an often fatal and almost always disabling illness. An all-out effort is needed to find a cure. State funding is essential for UT Southwestern to remain well-positioned to receive the new NIH designation as a Basic and Translational Research Program for Sickle Cell disease. It is essential for UT Southwestern to continue to advance the groundbreaking discoveries made thus far, and to continue to offer specialized care for sickle cell patients who are now surviving long into adulthood with the advent of vastly improved care available at centers like UT Southwestern's.

7 Science Teacher Access to Resources at UT Southwestern (STARS)

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

To create an educational partnership between UT Southwestern and regional science teachers that will improve science education in the north Texas area and beyond. The ultimate goal is to improve secondary school student interest in science and science-related careers.

How did the Special Item originate?

The Science Teacher Access to Resources program at UT Southwestern originated as a new Special Item strategy in UT Southwestern's bill pattern in the FY1994 and FY1995 General Appropriations Act, as directed by the 73rd Legislature.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No time limit was imposed on the Science Teacher Access to Resources program at UT Southwestern in recognition that: 1) the need to prepare local area high school teachers and students to become more scientifically literate is ongoing, and 2) the program will constantly help to address the statewide need to diversify the economy and create new jobs in technology-based industries.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No, formula funding cannot be used to extend UT Southwestern's world-class research and science curriculum to enhance the teaching of secondary school science teachers and to enrich and spark the interest of secondary students to be our future scientists.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The intent of the STARS internship programs and symposia for high school teachers is to multiply many-fold the potential impact of UT Southwestern's faculty on high school science education by enlisting teachers as partners in the educational process. The symposium concept was initialed on a pilot basis in September1991 and was expanded with the inception of this special item strategy. Over 5,000 high school teachers from approximately 2,000 schools have since participated in the all-day symposia and other summer internship programs held on the UT Southwestern campus. It would be impossible to calculate how many North Texas high school students have subsequently been supported by STARS. The discussion with participants following the internships and symposium provide virtually unanimous endorsement of the concept by the science teachers and a commitment to participate in future STARS programming so that they may continue to incalculably enrich their student's science education.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Without funding, local science educators and UT Southwestern faculty would lose the opportunity and inherent potential in sharing in the educational process of science. Much knowledge would not be transmitted to and from educators and would therefore never serve to enrich or spark the interest of our future scientists who are currently secondary school students.

8 Institutional Enhancement

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Institutional Enhancement funding plays a significant role in financing the core missions of all Health Related Institutions by providing a base level of funding for services and programs. Institutional Enhancement funding helps support leading-edge and innovative programs in education not otherwise supported by formula funding. The purpose of Institutional Enhancement at UT Southwestern is to help provide the highest quality education in the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of disease to our medical students.

Institutional Enhancement originated as a new Special Item strategy in UT Southwestern's bill pattern in the FY 2000 and FY2001 General Appropriations Act, as directed by the 76th Legislature. All Health Related Institutions received this new Special Item strategy at that time, at a funding level of \$1,000,000 per campus.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No time limit was placed on Institutional Enhancement when it was created, as it was a recognized integral part of providing the highest-quality ongoing training and facilities needed to maintain excellence in education for the medical students at UT Southwestern and in myriad educational programs at health institutions across Texas.

Therefore, it is important the current level of General Revenue support be maintained and not reduced.

9 Center for Obesity, Diabetes, and Metabolism Research

Appropriation \$18,000,000 \$9,000,000 \$9,000,000

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Obesity and its related diseases is a national crisis that continues to cost Texas more than \$10 billion annually and \$120 billion nationwide. The trends are frightening, with the percent of overweight Texans increasing from 43% to 63% in just 15 years. What was once unheard of—Type II diabetes occurring in children—is now common, and obesity dramatically increases not only the risk of diabetes but also heart disease, kidney failure, stroke, high blood pressure, and respiratory problems. The mission of the Center is to gain a vital understanding of the root causes – genetic, molecular and behavioral – of obesity and its related diseases in order to stem the current catastrophic increase in prevalence. State support has allowed UT Southwestern to amass an interdisciplinary team with unparalleled expertise to attack this epidemic from all aspects, including fundamental biochemistry, advanced MRI studies, nutrition, population studies, and genetics. For decades, UT Southwestern had world-renowned expertise in obesity and cholesterol metabolism. Recently recruited are a National Academy of Sciences neuroscience department chair and a world authority in hypothalamic function from Harvard. The esteemed Center faculty now includes 3 Howard Hughes investigators, 7 members of the National Academy, 7 members of the Institute of Medicine, and 3 Nobel laureates. There are more National Academy members in the Center than exist at any other entire medical institution in Texas.

How did the Special Item originate?

The Center for Obesity, Diabetes, and Metabolism originated as a new Special Item strategy in UT Southwestern's bill pattern in the FY 2008 and FY2009 General Appropriations Act, as directed by the 80th Legislature.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

There was no time limit placed when the Center for Obesity, Diabetes, and Metabolism was created with the theory that ongoing research will continue to develop new theories and better understanding and treatments of diseases.

9 Center for Obesity, Diabetes, and Metabolism Research

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The opportunity cost of not funding this Center would be enormous. Unless it is halted, the epidemic of obesity and its related diseases will cost Texas hundreds of billions of dollars in the future, and the preeminent team assembled at UT Southwestern is already making great strides in understanding the fundamental causes and developing highly-effective interventions. This funding has facilitated the recruitment and retainment of some of the most prestigious obesity and metabolism experts in the world. Furthermore, the research labs supported by this funding will leverage the funding many-fold in the future. Continuing the stature of this Center as one of worldis preeminent research centers in this field will take continued seed funding that this Special Item provides. Not funding this Center would not only cost the state many millions of dollars in grant funding in the near term, it will put at risk a valuable Texas resource. Most importantly, the opportunity cost of not realizing future discoveries may cost the State billions of dollars per year in the future that might otherwise be saved from treatments resulting from Center research.

UT Southwestern is uniquely positioned to answer these questions. The cost of not funding the Institute for the Genetic and Molecular Basis for Disease will be in the missed opportunities to bring in millions of dollars more in grant funding to Texas, to accelerate the fundamental research of renowned faculty, to recruit rising stars in fundamental research, and to yield breakthroughs in the understanding of diseases.

1 Chronic Home Dialysis Center

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

To offer home dialysis training and services to patients with End Stage Renal Disease (ESRD). This program was initiated to offer a chronic home dialysis program as an alternative to inpatient dialysis, which at the time could only be obtained in a high-cost hospital setting, to a limited number of individuals.

Other - Hospital Units on 'General Appropriations by the Sixtieth Legislature, First Called Session, House Bill No. 5'

The funding allows for expansion of UTMB's Family Medicine Rural Track, giving medical students and residents the opportunity to experience the rewards of practicing in rural communities and producing physicians that go on to work in rural Texas. It also supports UTMB's success in attracting and retaining historically underrepresented minority students, students fluent in Spanish, and students who come from rural areas who go on to become primary physicians serving Texas' medically underserved communities.

How did the Special Item originate?

This Special Item originated as an addition of a special item in appropriations bill.

Formula Funding, historically, has not sufficiently covered the costs related to Primary Care Physician education which in turn facilitated the need for this Special Item. There has been and will continue to be a great need for primary care physicians in the state of Texas and more importantly within minority and underserved communities; the additional funding that the special item generates has allowed UTMB to help fulfill this need. Given historical funding and recent GR reductions, continued Special Item funding will be needed to support this educational mission.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Family Medicine, Internal Medicine, Preventive Medicine & Community Health, OBGYN, and Pediatrics receive funding via the Primary Care Physicians Services special item.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Special item funding directly supports the education of primary care physicians. Without it, UTMB's ability to provide an education in primary care services would be greatly diminished. Continued support is needed now and into the future to ensure that UTMB will maintain and enhance its primary care programs and continue the tradition of graduating primary care physicians who will provide the highest quality healthcare to Texans and help combat the ongoing primary care physician shortfall.

3 Fast Texas Area Health Education Center

Start Year: 1996 2010 2011

Appropriation \$1,250,451 \$2,005,846 \$2,005,846

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The vision of East Texas Area Health Education Center (ETxAHEC) is optimal health for all people in our service region. The mission of ETxAHEC is to improve the health of our communities by developing a quality health workforce and helping address unmet health needs. This mission is carried within the context of the AHEC Recruitment and Retention Community (ARRC) Model. In ARRC, AHEC works with communities who are interested in the economic impact of their local healthcare system and its role in the future success of the community. Efforts focus first on identifying urgent health workforce needs, with a priority on primary healthcare providers, recruiting, and retaining providers in practice. Second, efforts focus on placement of health professions' students from UTMB and other Texas campuses in the community who are embraced as an intermediate recruitment strategy. Developing local youth interest, capability, and success entering health professions as a long term recruitment strategy is another focus. ETxAHEC also delivers a wide range of health literacy programming to individuals, and groups to improve personal knowledge, responsibility, and accountability for their own health. ETxAHEC is positioned to be a leading training organization for community health workers to meet health outreach and health literacy needs of local employers and communities. ETxAHEC prioritizes efforts directed at underrepresented and disadvantaged individuals and underserved communities.

How did the Special Item originate?

This Special Item originated as an addition of special item in appropriations bill. Additionally, the AHEC network of Texas was honored and acknowledged by the Texas House of Representatives on February 15, 2007 with H.R. 377, which identifies Texas AHEC Network as consisting of the East Texas AHEC, based at UTMB; the South Texas AHEC, based at UTHSC-SA; and the West Texas AHEC, based at TTUHSC which provide statewide coverage for AHEC services "to develop a quality health workforce and address unmet health-related needs in underserved communities... improve health literacy and increase consumers' understanding of health care... strengthen healthcare infrastructure of communities, thereby enhancing economic development and quality of life..." in a unanimous non-record yote of the members.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No time limit was imposed on the Special Item at the time that it was initiated in 1995, or in any Legislative Session since inception of state funding for ETxAHEC through UTMB.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item?

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. ETxAHEC does not enroll its own students. 19,000 students are supported by this strategy but pertain to the total number of students they support in the area, not just UTMB students. This includes K-12 students that they help counsel regarding careers in Health Care, community based training for healthcare professional students, and adult training/continued education. It also provides clinical training support for students enrolled in UTMB and other health science and higher education campuses with health science degree and certificate programs.

The core costs of AHEC are that of sustaining the regional operations infrastructure through which a wide range of programmatic activities are carried out, and which enables the capability to respond to requests for services or support by academic partners who are formula funded, by communities, organizations, and state agencies with complementary interests to the ETxAHEC program plan.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The ETxAHEC program is uniquely benefited by this Special Item. The ETxAHEC program through its programmatic efforts supports the educational mission of UTMB's Schools of Medicine, Nursing and Health Professions, as well as its primary care residency programs in Pediatrics, Family Medicine and Internal Medicine, East TX Geriatric Education Center, and Institute for Translational Science. ETxAHEC developed and conducted the first telemedicine demonstration project at UTMB, which ultimately resulted in the largest correctional healthcare and free-world telemedicine program in the U.S. ETxAHEC's programs and projects support UTMB's excellent

track record of matriculating minority and disadvantaged students in its schools; supports faculty development of clinical teachers on-campus and off-campus; and is one of the three largest community outreach programs of UTMB, along with correctional healthcare and the regional maternal child health program, followed by the community-based clinics of the physician group practice. ETxAHEC is widely accepted across its service region as a premier community outreach program not just of UTMB, but also of its host partners for regional operations that include UTHSC Tyler, UT Southwestern Medical Center, S.F. Austin State University, Victoria College, Weatherford College, Texas State University, and McLennan County Medical Education and Research Foundation. Education and outreach efforts of these benefit as well from this Special Item.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

- 1. The ETxAHEC will cease to exist.
- 2. Federal funding is contingent upon non-federal 1:1 match funding, which is made through state GR.
- 3. Other major grant funders typically require a match, which is accommodated by state GR funds.
- 4. State GR funds provide for maintenance of the infrastructure of nine regional operations through which all programming is carried out.
- 5. Unique programming supporting health workforce planning and development, community health systems planning, CHW development, training and support will be lost.
- 6. K-12 students will lose health literacy and health careers orienting and recruitment services provided by AHEC.
- 7. Public schools will lose what in most places is their only information and staff support resource for health careers information.
- 8. Health professions schools will have to increase staffing to support clinical placements of students that AHEC currently manages on their behalf.
- 9. Vulnerable communities will lose primary care providers that receive AHEC-provided practice retention educational and technical consultative services, especially in rural and urban underserved areas.
- 10. Vulnerable communities will be disadvantaged in recruitment of new health professionals by loss of AHEC recruitment support services because they cannot afford commercial recruiting services.

4 Support for Indigent Care

Appropriation \$4,000,000 \$3,508,761 \$3,508,761

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The original mission was to maintain existing levels of indigent care provided. However, the cost of providing healthcare has increased dramatically due to shortages of nurses, increasing demand for services and increasing pharmaceutical and supply costs. As a result, current service levels could not be maintained without the special item.

Healthcare services provided by UTMB are not currently formula funded. However, there have been discussions regarding formula funding models in the future for healthcare services provided by state owned teaching hospitals, such as UTMB. This program easily lends itself to a formula funding methodology (\$ per treatment, \$ per visit, \$ per patient, etc.).

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The provision of indigent care is instrumental in every resident's training and education. Also, nearly all residency programs depend on indigent patient volumes to meet residency accreditation agency patient requirements. Additionally, indigent patients also support research activities at UTMB.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

UTMB will be required to reduce the number of indigent and unfunded patients treated including approximately 376 inpatients and 6,234 outpatients per year. Also, the provision of indigent care is instrumental in every resident's training and education. Nearly all residency programs depend on indigent patient volumes to meet residency accreditation agency patient requirements. Elimination of this funding could place certain residency programs in jeopardy.

5 Institutional Enhancement

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Institutional Enhancement funding plays a significant role in financing the core mission of our institution by providing a base level of funding for our institution's services and programs. This funding helps support leading edge and innovate programs in education not otherwise supported by formula funding. A reduction to our Institutional Enhancement funding would erode the quality of our programs and result in declines in the level of services that we have been able to deliver to students. Therefore, it is important that the current level of General Revenue support be maintained. UTMB uses this funding to strengthen relationships with the communities we serve by providing an environment that promotes credibility and integrity. This is possible through the development of strategic partnerships and initiatives which are consistent with UTMB's core values, vision, and mission.

The Office of Health Policy helps health professions students gain health policy experience through selective rotations, health policy lecture series, student mentoring, and hands on experience through health fairs. It also serves as a center for innovation and coordination for new programs and health models including chronic disease care management, as well as serving as a center for strategic planning, health outcomes development and publication.

How did the Special Item originate?

Other. Institutional Enhancement was established by the 76th Legislature.

1 Improving Public Health in Texas Communities

Appropriation \$9,500,000 \$9,500,000 \$0

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

To expand significantly statewide public health educational, research, and community service activities to address rising public health issues such as diabetes, obesity, and disaster preparedness. School of Public Health campuses in Houston, Brownsville, El Paso, San Antonio, Austin, and Dallas and their collaborative academic and health science center partners benefit from the expansion through increased enrollment, capacity for new research, and ability to address local public health issues.

Unmet public health needs are vast. According to the Centers for Disease Control, in 2007 nearly 66 percent of Texas adults were overweight or obese. If the current trends continue, 75 percent of Texas adults might be overweight or obese by the year 2040, and the Department of State Health Services has estimated the cost to Texas could quadruple from \$10.5 billion today to as much as \$39 billion by 2040.

In a report issued by the Texas Diabetes Council it is estimated that 1.3 million persons aged 18 years and older in Texas have been diagnosed with diabetes at a cost of \$3.7 billion. Further, if current trends continue, persons born in the year 2000 will face a one in three chance of developing diabetes some time in their life.

The funding provided for this Special Item is aimed squarely at dealing with these complex public health issues through expanded education, research and community service activities.

Potentially. To maximize the benefits, this Special Item should be funded at the current level for six years and at a reduced level for subsequent years. Thereafter, formula funding will partially be able to support this Special Item. Funding will still be needed for community and research efforts not addressed through formula funding.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The University of Texas School of Public Health - Main campus in Houston; Regional campuses in Austin, Brownsville, Dallas, El Paso, and San Antonio.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Without this funding for expansion, the UT School of Public Health will not be able to increase graduation of trained public health specialists to help fill the large projected shortfall in the Texas workforce, nor will it be able to bring to bear the expertise of additional faculty on public health issues in the local communities. In Texas 85 percent of the Texas public health workforce does not have professional preparation in public health. In addition, the Association of Schools of Public Health (ASPH) has reported that the number of public health workers has declined from 220 to 158 per 100,000 population over the period 1980-2000 and an estimated 23 percent of the current public health work force will be eligible to retire by 2012.

1 Improving Public Health in Texas Communities

Obesity and diabetes are on the rise in Texas with dramatic costs associated with these public health issues. According to the Centers for Disease Control, in 2007 nearly 66 percent of Texas adults were overweight or obese and if current trends continue, this number could rise to 75 percent by 2040. The health care costs to Texas of the obesity epidemic is estimated to quadruple from \$10.5 billion today to as much \$39 billion by 2040, according to the Department of State Health Services.

2 Regional Academic Health Center - Public Health

Start Year: 2006 2010 2011

Appropriation \$750,000 \$750,000 \$750,000

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The Public Health Division of the Lower Rio Grande Valley Regional Academic Health Center (RAHC), which also functions as the UTHSC-H School of Public Health's Brownsville Regional Campus, brings much-needed resources to the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Not only does the campus offer a graduate public health education program to the local community, it also provides an academic base where faculty and students conduct in-depth research into the causes of high rates of numerous diseases in Valley residents. This region of Texas has higher disease rates, is more economically depressed, has fewer health care providers, and has fewer people trained to research and address the causes for disease.

How did the Special Item originate?

Legislative mandate by the 75th Texas Legislature - SB 606

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? Yes

If yes, should the item be reduced? No.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. The population base in the Lower Rio Grande Valley is insufficient to support a graduate program in public health through formula funding alone. The Brownsville RAHC Public Health program provides an extensive service function to the community in addition to its educational programs and sponsored research. Continuing funding of this Special Item is essential for supporting those enhanced services to the local community.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The University of Texas School of Public Health Brownville Regional Campus.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Loss of funding would diminish this well-established graduate public health training and research program in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, and would jeopardize the important intervention programs being developed in cooperation with a variety of organizations across the region for obesity, diabetes, certain cancers, and tuberculosis. Furthermore, the campus has trained a number of students from the LRGV who now occupy key public health posts in city, county and state public health departments and who, in their current positions, work closely with the RAHC - Public Health campus. The loss would be especially harmful because this region of the state has perhaps the most health disparities in Texas, including higher disease rates and little access to health institutions, particularly in the areas of diabetes and obesity.

The two counties where the RAHC campuses are located are among the poorest in the US according to the US Census Bureau with incomes less than 50% of the US median. Furthermore they have among the highest rates in the US of several conditions including tuberculosis, diabetes, obesity and one of the highest rates of liver cancer and cervical cancer.

The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston 3 Heart Disease and Stroke

Appropriation \$3,000,000 \$5,125,000 \$5,125,000

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The goal of the heart and stroke research special item is to apply the powerful new techniques of genomic and proteomic research to advance understanding of the causes, treatments and cure of major disease, including cardiovascular disease, neuro-degenerative diseases and metabolic disorders. The funds are used to recruit and retain outstanding scientists and to expand the research capacity of the health science center, including the Institute for Molecular Medicine. Funding is targeted to improve Texas' position as a national leader in biomedical research and to build upon superb infrastructure and academic research programs by improving our position in the market place to retain the very best of our scientists and to attract new talent. Funding will also allow Texas to invest in new research and new research programs that can make a real difference to health care by supporting the most innovative and potentially most rewarding new programs.

Further, Texas will lose ground in these cutting-edge areas of research focus.

4 Biotechnology Program

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The Biotechnology effort includes the Office of Biotechnology and Office of Technology Management. The Biotechnology Program promotes the formation of cross-disciplinary programs and special projects related to biotechnology innovation and the creation of public-private partnerships to promote the commercialization of UTHSC-H biotechnology. The overall program fosters environments in which researchers, clinicians, and staff manage programs and projects widely beneficial to the UTHSC-H, the Texas Medical Center, and the State of Texas. The Biotechnology Program has been designed to promote commercialization of discoveries and inventions that improve medical care and public heath. Examples include Dr. Mauro Ferrari's initiatives in nanomedicine that have resulted in a program with a team of 40+ researchers, research funding in the tens of millions of dollars. Dr. Holcomb's recruitment from the US Army Institute of Surgical Research initiated the creation of a new world-class center for trauma research and treatment, bridging physiological research, technology evaluation and clinical application of the latest surgical procedures. Creation of new companies based on technologies developed by Dr. Iyengar from NASA, Dr. Ferrari in nanomedicine and Dr. Red Duke in telemedicine, demonstrate the competence of the program and the benefits derived.

Failure to do so will result in the loss of a competitive advantage and the ceding of new opportunities to competing academic technology centers like those associated Harvard and MIT, Stanford and University of California, and University of North Carolina, NC State and Duke University. Texas would lose its ability to attract and retain world-renowned experts, discover, develop and commercialize needed products that improve medical care and public health in Texas. Continuing the momentum of creating 17 new start-ups, and numerous license deals is critical for the Texas economy.

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

To continue to build the capacity for application of the powerful new techniques of genomic and proteomic research (combined with expertise in bioinformatics) to advance the understanding of the causes, treatments and cure of major disease, including cardiovascular disease and stroke, neuro-degenerative diseases, lung disease, cancer, autoimmune diseases and metabolic disorders. This special item is an enhancement to the existing "Heart Disease and Stroke" Special item.

By supporting the recruitment and retention of key scientific leaders to UTHSC-H and the Texas Medical Center, the State will directly assist (and benefit from) UTHSC-H's ability to uncover fundamental disease mechanisms and develop new therapies for some of the most debilitating diseases. If funds do not materialize, UTHSC-H will be far less successful.

The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston 6 Harris County Hospital District

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

This item provides much needed indigent health care and graduate medical education to patients of the Harris County Hospital District through LBJ General Hospital. Harris County has an estimated 1 million residents, or 26.9% of the population with no health insurance and an additional 500,000 residents are underinsured. Also important is the opportunity for UTHSC-H faculty to promote understanding of cultural mores and their impact on health care delivery to faculty colleagues, residents and students. Not funding would likely lead to an erosion of the clinical spectrum that Medical School's trainees experience, and to fewer trainees and subsequent loss of physicians in Texas.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

Yes. If formula funding rates for Instruction & Operation, Infrastructure Support, and Research Enhancement formulas on a per unit basis are restored to at least FY 2000-01 levels and subsequent increases.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Academic support programs.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

In order to provide the State of Texas with a critical mass of health professionals and bench scientists, it is important to ensure the quality and reputation of the State's health-related institutions. The Texas Heart Institute will also evaluate other types of non-embryonic cells to determine the best types of stem cells for treatment of heart and peripheral vascular diseases. Additionally, they will investigate non-embryonic cell-based therapies for prevention and treatment of pulmonary arterial hypertension, a rare but often fatal disease.

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The 75th Texas Legislature (SB 606, Lucio/Hinojosa) authorized the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System to establish a medical education and research program serving counties in deep South Texas. As authorized by legislation, the Board of Regents assigned management of the RAHC programs to The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio with the exception of the public health initiative that was assigned to The University of Texas Health Science Center-Houston School of Public Health. UTHSCSA has institutional affiliation agreements with the Valley Baptist Medical Center in Harlingen as its primary inpatient teaching facility and other hospitals throughout the Valley. Ambulatory education programs are conducted at the Su Clinica Familiar in Harlingen and numerous other community-based practitioners and healthcare facilities and organizations in a four-county region consisting of Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, and Willacy. Basic and clinical research activities have been incorporated into the RAHC targeting emerging diseases, infectious diseases, diabetes and other chronic diseases that disproportionately affect the population of the U.S./Mexico border region.

How did the Special Item originate?

The Regional Academic Health Center (RAHC), which serves Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, and Willacy counties, was created by Senate Bill 455 during the 75th Legislature which authorized the UT System Board of Regents to create a regional academic health center to serve to be operated as part of the UTHSCSA. The primary purpose of the center is to provide urgently needed medical care and research, as well as undergraduate clinical education, graduate education, including residency training programs or other levels of medical educational work in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Funding, however, for the RAHC was not appropriated until the 76th Legislature. The original funding request was for \$19,598,263 beginning 2000-2001; actual funding was only \$4 million with UB authority. (Note: Funding was appropriated to the UT System and transferred to the UTHSCSA in 2000-01. Partial funding was appropriated to UTS and UTHSCSA in 2002-03 and 2004-05, with UTS's portion being transferred to UTHSCSA.) Beginning with the 2006-07 biennium, the 79th Legislature appropriated all funds for RAHC directly to the UTHSCSA.)

No. The funding received for the RAHC was intended to establish a permanent satellite facility for education, clinical, and research services in Harlingen and Edinburg and to provide for continued operational support.

The small student base for which the RAHC receives formula funding is insufficient to support the clinical and research activities, and would be equally insufficient to cover facilities and administrative costs. To reduce the amount of appropriations currently received would result in a loss of critical resources needed to maintain accreditation requirements for the various health professional students, cause existing programs to be terminated that in turn would decrease the availability of greatly needed healthcare in the local communities, and reduce the number of participating and projected students to these campuses that would in turn decrease the number of practicing health professions that remain in this severely underserved region of Texas.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Medical students educated at the RAHC are enrolled for courses based on an academic year program and not by SCHs. Numerous medical education and basic and clinical research programs targeting emerging diseases, infectious diseases, diabetes and other chronic diseases that disproportionately affect the population in the South Texas border region are supported at the RAHC's three facilities in Harlingen and Edinburg. Over 250 community-based practitioners are UTHSCSA faculty that participate in RAHC medical education programs, and the Academic & Clinical Research (ACR) building houses the newly established Federal Veterans Administration Health Care Center, the subspecialty referral site for Valley Veterans.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Legislative funding at an appropriate level will be crucial to ensure that the UTHSCSA can maintain and operate its medical education and medical research programs at the RAHC. Specifically, this funding will provide the UTHSCSA with the critical resources needed to maintain the accreditation requirements at the RAHC and to continue the regionalization and expansion of programs. The RAHC is a "geographically separated campus" of UTHSCSA, and to function in this capacity, its medical education and student support programs must be comparable to the UTHSCSA medical school campus in San Antonio. Adequate funding will be required to develop and maintain the basic and clinical research programs that are important complements to the medical education initiative throughout the Lower Rio Grande Valley. In addition, programs may be terminated with resulting adverse reactions from local communities, their leadership, local practicing health professionals, participating health professional students, and projected students.

The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio 2 Laredo Campus Extension (LCE)

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The 76th Texas Legislature (SB 1288, Zaffirini/Cuellar) authorized the creation of the Laredo Campus Extension (LCE) of UTHSCSA to develop a remote health professional education campus to meet community-defined health professional educational and clinical training needs in the Laredo area. A geographically separate campus located adjacent to the Laredo Medical Center, the LCE demonstrates a progressive increase in remote health professional educational services offered by UTHSCSA. The completion of the D.D. Hachar Building formally established the institutional emphasis on the Texas-Mexico Border that began in 1993 with the establishment of the Mid Rio Grande Border (MRGB) Area Health Education Center (AHEC). The Mid-Rio Grande Border AHEC functions as an affiliated program targeting Laredo/Webb County students with resources and opportunities to learn about health careers. The Hachar Building and the new academic building represent the core facilities of a planned campus that support a variety of health professional education and training programs that include medical, dental, allied health, and public health.

How did the Special Item originate?

The Laredo Campus Extension program is a response to a legislative mandate originating from Senate Bill 1288 (Zaffirini/Cuellar) during the 76th Texas Legislature that requires the UTHSCSA to provide health professional education programs meeting community defined needs in the Laredo area. Funding began in 2000-2001 at an initial level of \$1.4 million. (Note: Funding was appropriated to the UT System and transferred to the UTHSCSA in 2000-01. Partial funding was appropriated to UTS and UTHSCSA in 2002-03 and 2004-05, with UTS's portion being transferred to UTHSCSA. Beginning with the 2006-07 biennium, the 79th Legislature appropriated all funds for the Laredo Campus Extension directly to the UTHSCSA.)

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No. The funding received for the Laredo Campus Extension was intended to develop a permanent health professional education campus to meet community-defined health professional educational and clinical training needs in the Laredo area, and to provide for continued operational support.

No. The LCE supports a wide variety of educational programs targeting the Laredo and MRGB region that are intended not only to benefit health professional students but to increase healthcare awareness among the local communities. The LCE addresses the shortage of dental specialists and the dental disparity of the underserved in this region; provides educational and field experiences to practitioners, residents, students and elected/appointed officials; provides a pipeline program with community high schools to enhance the students' knowledge about health profession opportunities; conducts community events focusing on regionally prevalent healthcare issues; and provides continuing health professional educational programs. The small student base for which the LCE receives formula funding is insufficient to support these healthcare and outreach activities, and would be equally insufficient to cover facilities and administrative costs. To reduce the amount of appropriations currently received would result in a loss of critical resources needed to maintain accreditation requirements for the various healthcare programs, cause existing programs to be terminated that in turn would decrease the availability of greatly needed healthcare and healthcare awareness in the local communities, and reduce the number of participating and projected students to these campuses that would in turn decrease the number of participating health professions in this severely underserved region of Texas.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Numerous dental and allied health education and healthcare awareness programs are supported among the two facilities at the LCE. Dental students educated at the LCE are enrolled for courses based on an academic year program and not by SCHs. The dental residencies address the shortage of dental specialists and also address the dental disparity of this underserved region. An Allied Health degree program is in place to graduate respiratory therapists. The nationally recognized STEER program provides educational and field experiences in environmental health issues to practitioners, residents, students and elected/appointed officials both nationally and internationally. The highly effective Med/Ed Program is a pipeline program that works with community high schools during the academic/summer sessions to enhance the students' knowledge about health profession opportunities. This hands-on experience offered to these students by health professionals increases the student's knowledge to make better choices about going into a health profession. Community events related to the UTHSCSA's mission are conducted at the LCE campus. Electronic access to the Briscoe Library in San Antonio and the National Library of Medicine is available to students and the community. Continuing health professional educational programs are ongoing and being expanded. And a collaborative Physician Assistant Program with TAMIU, UTHSCSA and the Laredo/Webb County provide clinical experiences for this region.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Legislative funding at a sufficient level is crucial to maintain and operate current programs at the LCE, as well as to develop and operate the Dental Regional Campus. In addition, programs may be terminated with resulting adverse reactions from local communities, their leadership, local practicing health professionals, and participating and projected students. This funding is critical to develop the academic infrastructure needed to support the academic programs of the Dental Regional Campus, its regionalization and accreditation compliance. For the Dental Regional Campus to function as geographically remote campus of UTHSCSA, its dental education and student support programs must be comparable to the UTHSCSA dental school in San Antonio. Additionally, the development of a nutrition and dietetics program to train nutritionists to work in clinical settings is critical to address the high rates of diabetes in the region. Strategic plans for the LCE identified the following activities as appropriate for this border region: 1) Dental Resident and Dental Student Training (Dental Regional Campus), 2) Advanced degree in nutrition and dietetics, 3) Infrastructure Support for Community/Population-Based Research, 4) Select Allied Health Education, 5) Professional Continuing Education, 6) Student Health Careers "Pipeline", and 7) Environmental Health Training and Education (STEER).

3 Outreach Support for South Texas Programs

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The funding to the UTHSCSA from the Formula Funding Equation has/does not include funding for administrative costs required to provide institutional support to programs funded as Exceptional/Special Items. UTHSCSA has/is subsidizing administrative support for these programs through Institutional Support funding provided for Core operations.

How did the Special Item originate?

Outreach Support originated through Exceptional Item Request during and as appropriated by the 77th Legislature.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No. The funding received for Outreach Support was intended to cover administrative and infrastructure costs for Special Item programs provided for Core operations through Institutional Support functions.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item?

No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

The funding received for Outreach Support was intended to cover administrative and infrastructure costs for Special Item programs provided for Core operations through Institutional Support functions. The cost of providing core infrastructure support to Special Item programs in San Antonio and South Texas, such as the RAHC, Laredo Campus Extension, and SALSI, out-pace infrastructure funding provided through the formula funding mechanism. The distance between the main campus in San Antonio and the regional campuses in Harlingen, Edinburg and Laredo is predominately causing the need for separate infrastructure support for these established and growing programs and facilities in South Texas. The continued success of these programs is dependent on funding the core infrastructure needs of these programs. With the 12.5% General Revenue budget reduction enacted by the 78th Legislature, funding for this Special Item was reduced from \$4 million to \$3.5 million beginning in 2004-05. The reduction has never been restored, yet these programs have received significant levels of enhanced funding (\$35.6 million more in 2010-11 over 2004-05) and continuously undergo program expansion. Consequently, greater demands are placed on core administrative functions. Without adequate funds, the quality and timeliness of core institutional support functions will be negatively impacted.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Outreach Support provides infrastructure support from core administrative functions to Special Item programs in San Antonio and South Texas, including the Regional Academic Health Center (RAHC), the Laredo Campus Extension (LCE), the San Antonio Life Sciences Institute (SALSI), the Family Practice and Podiatry Residency training programs, and the Mycobacterial-Mycology Research Lab. As our involvement in outreach programs increases, greater demands are placed on core administrative functions, which Outreach Support funding can help to alleviate.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

UTHSCSA will continue to have institutional funding problems for core administrative and infrastructure support functions.

4 Family Practice Residency Training Program

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Provide training for family practice resident physicians, as well as third and fourth year medical students.

How did the Special Item originate?

Funding for this program has been in existence for an undetermined period but at least since the mid-1970s. With the inception of formula funding, the 76th Legislature moved the Family Practice Residency Training Program from the Medical Instruction strategy (A.4.2) to Special Item support (E.2.1) beginning in the 2000-01 biennium. The amount of funding moved from Instruction to Special Item support for 2000-01 totaled \$1,291,834, but was reduced to \$1,130,355 beginning in 2004-05 with the 12.5% General Revenue budget reduction enacted by the 78th Legislature. Funding was continued as a special item because of the shortage of primary care physicians in the McAllen/Brownsville area. Trainee positions in local proprietary and non-profit hospitals in the region were established for these residents in their third year of training. The demand and need for this program has grown beyond the McAllen/Brownsville area and residency programs have also been established in San Antonio, Kerrville, Weslaco, New Braunfels, Dallas, and Harlingen.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No. Funding was provided to address the shortage of primary care physicians in the McAllen/Brownsville area, which has expanded to broader areas of South Texas and the border region.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item?

If yes, should the item be reduced?

No. With the 12.5% General Revenue budget reduction enacted by the 78th Legislature, funding for this Special Item was reduced from \$1,291,834 to \$1,130,355 beginning in 2004-05. The reduction has never been restored. In addition, the nominal support the program receives from THECB continues to dwindle, and local hospitals in which the residents practice are unable to support any portion of the cost of the program. Because the Family Practice Residency Training Program is accredited by the ACGME, the institution does receive funding through the Graduate Medical Education formula for participating residents. However, the demand and need for this program has grown beyond the McAllen/Brownsville area to broader regions of South Texas and along the borders of Texas, the cost of which far outweighs the funding currently received through formula, special item support, or THECB. It is critical that adequate financial support be provided for the family medicine residency training program to ensure that the supply of primary care providers in the South Texas/Border Region continues to improve. Inadequate funding will impair the access of the South Texas/Border Region population to primary care services.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. With the 12.5% General Revenue budget reduction enacted by the 78th Legislature, funding for this Special Item was reduced from \$1,291,834 to \$1,130,355 beginning in 2004-05. The reduction has never been restored. Yet the demand and need for this program has grown beyond the McAllen/Brownsville area to broader regions of South Texas and along the borders of Texas, the cost of which far outweighs the funding currently received through formula, special item support, or THECB. 17 residents participate in various ACGME graduate medical education programs specializing in primary health care services.

It is critical that adequate financial support be provided for the family medicine residency training program to ensure that the supply of primary care providers in the South Texas/Border Region continues to improve. Inadequate funding will impair the access of the South Texas/Border Region population to primary care services.

5 Podiatry Residency Training Program

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Improve the supply of podiatrists and expand outreach clinics for foot care to the population of South Texas to treat predominantly diabetic induced foot ulcers and to teach state of the art treatment options that preclude amputation. This program participates in the Area Health Education Council and South Texas Border Initiative.

How did the Special Item originate?

Funding for this program has been in existence for an undetermined period but at least since the mid-1970s. With the inception of formula funding, the 76th Legislature moved the Family Practice Residency Training Program from the Medical Instruction strategy (A.4.3) to Special Item support (E.2.2) beginning in the 2000-01 biennium. The amount of funding moved from Instruction to Special Item support for 2000-01 totaled \$405,196, but was reduced to \$354,546 beginning in 2004-05 with the 12.5% General Revenue budget reduction enacted by the 78th Legislature. Funding was continued as a special item because of the shortage of foot care physicians and the high incidence of diabetes and its complications in the South Texas/Border Region area.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No. Funding was provided to address the shortage of foot care physicians and the high incidence of diabetes and its complications in the South Texas/Border Region area.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item?

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. This program supports 9 residents that are not captured as Medical Students under the current formula mechanisms for instruction. Furthermore, the Podiatry Residency Training Program is not accredited by the ACGME, and thus the institution does not receive funding for these residents through the Graduate Medical Education formula. With the 12.5% General Revenue budget reduction enacted by the 78th Legislature, funding for this Special Item was reduced from \$405,196 to \$354,546 beginning in 2004-05. The reduction has never been restored. Inadequate funding will impair the access of the South Texas/Border Region population to podiatry services.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

9 residents participate in various non-ACGME graduate medical education programs specializing in podiatry foot care services predominately induced by diabetes.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Without adequate foot care, diabetic patients are at risk for serious complications. It is essential that an adequate supply of podiatrists be available to serve the needs of the South Texas/Border Region.

6 Mycobacterial-Mycology Research Lab

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

During the 2000-2001 biennium, UTHSCSA assumed responsibility for operation of the Mycobaterial-Mycology Research Laboratory (MMRL) previously located at the Texas Center for Infectious Diseases in San Antonio. Personnel and operating funds have been assumed by the UTHSCSA, and continued funding to support this program is necessary to sustain the current level of activity. This program is a major position of strength in the development of joint research and training programs in conjunction with our sister institution UTSA.

How did the Special Item originate?

During the 2000-2001 biennium, UTHSCSA assumed responsibility for operation of the Mycobaterial-Mycology Research Laboratory (MMRL) previously located at the Texas Center for Infectious Diseases in San Antonio. The 77th Legislature authorized funding restructuring so that appropriations were provided directly to the UTHSCSA beginning with the 2002-03 biennium. The amount of funding appropriated to the UTHSCSA for 2002-03 totaled \$438,870, but was reduced to \$384,012 beginning in 2004-05 with the 12.5% General Revenue budget reduction enacted by the 78th Legislature. Funding was continued as a special item to sustain the research operations of the MMRL.

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No. Funding was provided to sustain

Funding reductions would likely result in program terminations. Any interrupted progress will severely impair the success of this research that will prevent the elimination of important human diseases in Texas and improve human health for its citizenry.

The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio 7 Institutional Enhancement

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Initial funding for this strategy was provided to support the growth and expansion of existing and new programs both in South Texas and San Antonio locations, and to address salary competitiveness issues. Funds flowing through this strategy, commonly referred to as Article III, Section 56 funding, represents the partial restoration of a 12.5% General Revenue budget reduction experienced during the 2004-2005 biennium and enacted by the Legislature for health-related higher education institutions.

How did the Special Item originate?

The 76th Legislature enacted an initiative to allocate \$1 million per year for all Health-Related Institutions in the 2000-2001 biennium. With a 12.5% General Revenue reduction in the 2004-05 biennium, the funding for this special item was reduced to \$875,000 per year. The 78th Legislature partially restored the overall 12.5% General Revenue reduction to Health-Related Institutions of Higher Education through Article III, Section 56. The total restored to the UTHSCSA amounted to \$15,028,752. At the recommendation of the LBB, these funds were allocated to Institutional Enhancement in the 2006-07 biennium since the restoration was related to formula strategies and operations at the main campuses in San Antonio. The amount allocated to this special item grew in the 2008-09 biennium when the 80th Legislature authorized the restructuring of the South Texas Professional Education special item strategy to be consolidated into the 2008-09 baseline requests for the Regional Academic Health Center, the Laredo Campus Extension, and the main campuses in San Antonio. The portion of the STPE restructuring that supported the main campuses in San Antonio was allocated to Institutional Enhancement.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No. This special item was legislatively provided because formula pools have been significantly reduced and are significantly underfunded to cover the actual costs of instruction, research and space support. These funds are needed to sustain the costs of the UTHSCSA's core missions that resulted from the restoration of the 12.5% General Revenue reduction to Health-Related Institutions of Higher Education and from the restructuring of the South Texas Professional Education special item strategy.

No. This special item was legislatively provided because formula pools have been significantly reduced and are significantly underfunded to cover the actual costs of instruction, research and space support. Without this General Revenue, educational, research, clinical training programs, and healthcare will negatively affect communities, practicing health professionals, and students. No alternative source of funding is available for the administration of the institution's educational, research and clinical training programs.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Institutional Enhancement provides funding to all of the various educational, clinical and research programs and support functions at the UTHSCSA. They include: medical, graduate medical, dental, and nursing education; biomedical sciences and allied health professions training; research activities and support; facilities infrastructure and space support; dental health care support; South Texas regional programs including the Regional Academic Health Center (RAHC), the Laredo Campus Extension (LCE), Family Practice and Podiatry Residency training programs. Institutional Enhancement serves to support shifts in workforce demands in the San Antonio area towards more skilled and highly trained employees, as competition for available employees is felt institution-wide. And, as our involvement in outreach programs increases, greater demands are placed on the main campus for support functions, which Institutional Enhancement funding can help to alleviate.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

This special item reflects restorative funding to Health-Related Institutions of Higher Education from Article III, Section 56 of the 78th Legislature as it pertained to an overall 12.5% General Revenue reduction. It also includes funds, as authorized by 80th Legislature, funds from the restructuring of the South Texas Professional Education special item strategy into the 2008-09 baseline requests for the Regional Academic Health Center, the Laredo Campus Extension, and the main campuses in San Antonio. The portion of the STPE restructuring that supported the main campuses in San Antonio was allocated to Institutional Enhancement. As the workforce demands in the San Antonio area shift towards more skilled and highly trained employees, competition for available employees is felt institution-wide. As our involvement in outreach programs increases, greater demands are placed on the main campus for support functions. Because state general revenue plays such a significant role in financing the core mission of our institution, it is important that it be maintained and not reduced. Without fully restoring our General Revenue, educational, research, clinical training programs, and healthcare will negatively affect communities, practicing health professionals, and students. No alternative source of funding is available for the institution's educational and clinical training programs in the South Texas and San Antonio locations.

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Generation of new knowledge that can be translated to the practical benefit of the State of Texas is a critical catalyst fundamental to the growth, development and well-being of our state. Recognizing this, Sen. Leticia Van de Putte and Rep. Robert Puente, along with the members of the Bexar County legislative delegation authored H.B. 1716 and its companion bill, S.B. 728, during the 77th session of the Legislature to authorize the creation of the San Antonio Life Sciences Institute (SALSI). This institute was designed to: (1) to facilitate the establishment of collaborative activities between public and private institutions that would lead to the overall enhancement of their research, teaching and service missions; (2) to promote collaboration (e.g., joint doctoral programs and research projects) between these institutions; and (3) to enable the development of initiatives that will stimulate the growth of the biomedical and biotechnology industries in San Antonio and South Texas that foster the commercialization of the products of research at the partner institutions. SALSI's goal is to develop synergies in research and education that exceed the combined efforts of the institutions if each acts alone.

How did the Special Item originate?

HB 1716 and SB 728 authorized the creation of the San Antonio Life Sciences Institute (SALSI) during the 77th Legislature to facilitate and/or enable collaborative and joint research and degree programs between the UTHSCSA and the University of Texas at San Antonio (UTSA). No funding was appropriated for the 2002-03 biennium. State funding in the amount of \$4 million for SALSI was not appropriated until the 81st Legislature for the 2010-11 biennium. However, State support for SALSI came in the form of Federal Stimulus Funds allocated through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009, of which the funding is not guaranteed or likely to be sustained beyond the 2010-11 biennium.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

No. HB 1716 and SB 728 authorized the creation of SALSI during the 77th Legislature to facilitate and/or enable collaborative and joint research and degree programs between the UTHSCSA and UTSA. The funding received for SALSI was intended to permanently cover operations for an institute that facilitates and promotes collaborative and joint research, teaching and service programs, and to enable the development of initiatives that will stimulate the growth of the biomedical and biotechnology industries that foster commercialization of research products in San Antonio and South Texas.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No. The funding received for SALSI was intended to permanently cover operations for an institute that facilitates and promotes collaborative and joint research, teaching and service programs, and to enable the development of initiatives that will stimulate the growth of the biomedical and biotechnology industries that foster commercialization of research products in San Antonio and South Texas. SALSI's goal is to develop synergies in research and education in San Antonio and South Texas that exceed the combined efforts of the partnering institutions if each acts alone. In addition, the level of external research expenditures is insufficient to generate the needed resources to fully support SALSI operations and other UTHSCSA research enhancement activities.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

SALSI supports research, teaching and service activities, including biomedical and biotechnology programs and the commercialization of intellectual property.

8 San Antonio Life Sciences Institute (SALSI)

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The outcome ultimately will enhance research funding at all partner institutions and provide new advanced degree opportunities for students. In addition, the emergent biomedical/biotechnology industry offers a unique opportunity for UTHSCSA to develop university/ industry partnerships, to help San Antonio and South Texas to become a major player in the industries of the future, and to become major drivers of the San Antonio and South Texas economy. SALSI has fostered collaboration and alignment where there would have been none; it has provided appealing incentives in the form of seed funding for researchers and educators at different institutions who are working on similar problems. It has set the platform and the model for what has been duplicated successfully throughout the UT System and which can be broadly adopted across the State of Texas. Unfortunately, there is no funding available for the continued support of SALSI and without legislative support, future opportunities for continued leveraging across the State of Texas will not be possible. Based on the success of the SALSI model in creating opportunities for new collaborative interactions it was our top funding priority for the 81st legislative session.

The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center uses the Research Support special item funding to support its Faculty Excellence program. Anderson is committed to enhancing current research efforts to carry out the most innovative investigations of the cause, diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of cancer. Science has identified many new potential targets for cancer treatment and prevention. These resources will allow for the recruitment of world-renowned scientists who will expand knowledge about the genes and molecular pathways that regulate cell proliferation, providing scientists a better understanding of the ways that the body's natural response to cancer can be enhanced and identifying new targets for anti-cancer drugs.

How did the Special Item originate?

In 2001, the Legislature provided \$2 million per year in special item support for research programs identified by the institution. M. D. Anderson's leadership selected this program of excellence.

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The primary goals of the M. D. Anderson Physician Scientist Program are to provide a structured environment for outstanding research oriented and dedicated physicians by: (1) establishing and conducting a relevant laboratory research program, and (2) exploring new therapies administering clinical oncology patient care. The program provides salary support and research resources to initiate an independent research program, and mentorship from senior research faculty for a period of three years, which is renewable for up to two additional years. Upon successful completion, the scholar will have established him/herself as an independent researcher who can successfully compete for external grant funding, on a path to becoming one of tomorrow's leaders in oncology research.

The M. D. Anderson Cancer Genomics Core Program is directed by the Head of the Division of Pathology and Laboratory Medicine. This program aims to support genomics research, minimize duplication of expensive resources and enhance collaborations by providing core genomics support to independent research studies at M. D. Anderson. A core component of the program is the Genomics Core Laboratory. Since the inception in 1999, the Core Laboratory has been in the forefront of genomic research and service.

How did the Special Item originate?

The Institutional Enhancement special item was a Legislative initiative added to each institution's bill pattern strategies.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? There was no time limit placed on the Institutional Enhancement special item.

The Core Laboratory provides key research support for many projects identifying abnormal genes and molecules in cancer specimens from patients, which would be hindered without these funds. This may require the institution to identify other internal or external sources of funding to enhance these efforts. If the institution is required to redirect internal sources of funding to support these programs, the ability to meet patient care demand, which is expanding at a rate of 5-8% per year, would be impacted.

3 Breast Cancer Research Program

The IBC Program and Clinic's mission is to increase awareness of Inflammatory Breast Cancer among health care professionals and in the community, apply a translational approach to new treatment options and bring them rapidly to patients, and increase the overall survival rate of patients through earlier diagnosis and novel therapies.

How did the Special Item originate?

The speicial item originated as a rider in M. D. Anderson bill pattern in the 2008-09 biennium as follows:

8. Creation of the Rare and Aggressive Breast Cancer Research Program. Of the amounts appropriated above in Strategy E.1.2, Breast Cancer Research, \$2 million in fiscal year 2008 and \$2 million in fiscal year 2009 in General Refvenue is for the creation of a rare and aggressive breast cancer research program. Its efforts will contribute to improving the diagnostics in patients with breast cancer.

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? There was no time limit on the Breast Cancer Research Program when it was created.

The consequences of not funding the special item could result in a reduction of research and direct patient care related to inflammatory breast cancer (IBC) which is an aggressive, often fatal, type of breast cancer that is commonly misdiagnosed. To maintain current funding levels, elimination of the support for this special item would require the institution to supplant General Revenue with other internal or external sources of funding. If the institution is required to redirect internal sources of funding to support these programs, the ability to meet patient care demand, which is expanding at a rate of 5-8% per year, would be impacted.

Made up of 15 institutions of higher education located in the eastern half of Texas, the members include community and technical colleges and public universities. Built upon a study commissioned by Senator Bill Ratliff, fifteen Texas higher education institutions formed a collaborative initiative called the Northeast Texas Consortium (NETnet), established a central coordinating office at the University of Texas Health Science Center at Tyler, and began to assess the diverse and disparate technology needs of the consortium members, the surrounding communities, and a 50-county region within East Texas. In 1998, NETnet developed a comprehensive broadband network plan connecting an area of the state containing 46% of the rural Texas population. In 2002, an East Texas distance-learning network came online, connecting 15 higher education institutions and creating broadband educational access points in the member communities.

The consortium and its member institutions meet a critical need in the underserved rural areas of East Texas by providing:

- Degree opportunities in science, education, healthcare and technology
- Regional connectivity to statewide and national networks, including both the UT and Texas A&M Systems, Texas LEARN and others.

How did the Special Item originate?

Senator Bill Ratliff commissioned a study of the higher education needs of Northeast Texas in 1993. NCHEMS Management Services, Inc. concluded that the region needed broadly enhanced distance learning connectivity and expanded educational opportunities within defined programmatic areas, particularly. In response, fifteen Texas higher education institutions formed a collaborative initiative in 1994 called Northeast Texas Consortium (NETnet), established a central coordinating office with full-time staff in 1996, and began to assess the diverse and disparate technology needs of the consortium members, the surrounding communities, and a 50-county region within East Texas. In 1998, NETnet developed a comprehensive technology network connecting an area of the state containing 46% rural Texas population. In 2002, an East Texas distance-learning network came online, connecting 15 higher education institutions and creating educational access points in the member communities.

Not funding the consortium would immediately leave the most rural colleges with no realistic option for broadband connectivity and, in effect, strand thousands of rural college and dual credit students from the option of "closing the gap" with a college or university degree. Dual credit in many of the 1A and 2A schools would essentially cease or be accomplished only through bussing. At the same time, the networking infrastructure supporting the northeast Texas A&M campuses would be interrupted and require alternative routes for providing the student support software and TTVN connectivity to Texas A&M Texarkana. Colleges in the region would also lose their regional hub for the Texas LEARN network.

Core services like the Medication Assistance Program have proven to save area counties millions in indigent funding over the past five years and have eased and/or eliminated the out-of-pocket expenses of prescriptions for the uninsured program participants, and therefore, freeing up a significant portion of their limited budget for meeting other critical expenses needed for living a better quality life.

As a state supported institution, the College has an obligation to enhance the quality of life of its constituents by utilizing its experts to expand the knowledge of pharmacy and pharmacotherapy. The college values excellence in teaching, research and scholarship, drug therapy management, and public service.

How did the Special Item originate?

Through Exceptional Item Request in the Request for Legislative Appropriations for fiscal years 2008 and 2009.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? Yes

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? Yes

If yes, should the item be reduced?

No. The College of Pharmacy is continuing to grow to a class size of about 120-150 students, consistent with other state programs in Texas. Continued special item support is needed until such time that the full class size is reached and the lag in formula funding is closed, which typically takes an additional biennium. In addition, the special item funding is needed to provide resources to support additional biomedical and pharmaceutical research infrastructure that is not available on the Texas A&M-Kingsville campus. This infrastructure is a critical component to the College being able to fulfill its mission of excellence in teaching, research and scholarship, drug therapy management, and public service. Finally, as a young College created in fiscal year 2008, the funds are required to stabilize this critical professional school in South Texas.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

Yes

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Irma Lerma Rangel College of Pharmacy

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

According to a report completed by the Texas Department of Health Services and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, the Texas-Mexico border region has a population-to-pharmacist ratio of 1,700 to 1, which is 32 percent higher than the statewide ratio. The report concludes that the border's rapid population growth, difficulty in recruiting and retaining pharmacists, and a decrease in the number of pharmacy graduates in Texas over the last several years have contributed to the pharmacist shortage in the border region.

Failure to reinstate the special item funding for the Rangel College of Pharmacy would have a negative impact on the ability of the college to fulfill its mission, and therefore inhibit its ability to address the shortage of pharmacists in the region and across the state. In addition, loss of the special item funding would limit access to health

4 College Station, Temple, Round Rock - Medical

Start Year: 2008 2010 2011

Appropriation \$24,000,000 \$29,000,000 \$16,000,000

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

As identified in a Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board 2002 study, Texas faces a significant physician shortage that must be addressed by increasing the number of Texas medical school graduates by at least 300 per year. In order to meet the need, the 80th Texas Legislature called on the Texas A&M Health Science Center College of Medicine to begin expanding its class size from 80 to 200 students to help provide one-third of the additional Texas medical student graduates needed. To support the expansion, which was begun in FY2008, 38 basic science faculty and 29 clinical science faculty have been added through January 2010 across the Bryan/College Station, Temple, Round Rock, and Houston campuses. In addition, dozens of community-based physicians have been added to the clinical faculty on a part-time basis. The number of additional faculty needed is based upon national averages of student-to-faculty ratios. Maintaining these national benchmarks will support continued accreditation status.

How did the Special Item originate?

The 80th Texas Legislature determined that the TAMHSC College of Medicine should be provided special item funding for the foreseeable future to begin increasing its class size from 80 to 200, dependent on availability of future state funding. The Legislature, through rider, directed the College to establish a new medical education campus and facility in Round Rock and to secure additional educational and research space at the Temple campus.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? Yes

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created?

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? Yes

If yes, should the item be reduced?

No. Since the formulas are funded based on enrollment counts from the fall semester before the biennium, institutions experiencing enrollment growth do not receive formula funding for the new students added during the biennium. Therefore, the formulas "lag" actual enrollment. The difference in funding, or lag, between students funded vs. students actually enrolled for the Health Science Center College of Medicine creates a funding shortfall for the FY 2011/2012 biennium. Additionally, formula funding for medical education currently falls short of the cost of training medical students in Texas due to formula funding rates below the level needed to support student growth, inflation, and infrastructure costs across the Health-Related Institutions. Due to the formula funding lag alone, the College of Medicine expansion will require special item funding at least through the FY 2016-2017 biennium when enrollment will stabilize at 800 medical students. Even after student levels stabilize, unless the formula rates are dramatically increased as recommended by the Health Related Institution Formula Advisory Committee in 2007 and 2009, special item funding will be needed well beyond the 2016-2017 biennium to continue to fund the additional required infrastructure and inflationary costs not adequately funded by the formulas.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

Not unless the formula funding rates are increased significantly. In addition, this special item is unique in that it supports significant educational infrastructure needed to provide medical student education at the Temple and Round Rock campuses. Unlike most start-up special items, which support programmatic expansion alone and where facilities are provided through TRBs and debt service is funded separately, under this special item the Legislature supported acquisition of a 134,000 square foot health professions education building in Round Rock and a 32,000 square foot translational research laboratory in Temple through this special item. The debt service and lease costs of these two facilities are included in the College's special item, meaning that only a portion of the resources are available for direct educational costs such as providing faculty to support the growing student body.

4 College Station, Temple, Round Rock - Medical

What University program is supported by the Special item?

College of Medicine

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The THECB reports that expansion of the smaller programs is the most cost effective solution for the state's physician shortage. At the time the expansion began, the Health Science Center College of Medicine was the smallest program in the state, and because of its proven, quality model of community-based medical education, the College is ideally positioned for current and future enrollment increases. Unlike traditional medical school expansions, which require years of investment in facilities and faculty before class size is increased, the HSC's community-based model has resulted in rapid and cost-effective production of 70 additional medical school slots. Current funding levels have resulted in a cap of 150 students per year, and class size reductions may be necessary unless the formula funding lag is addressed. Continued delays in expansion will inhibit the State's ability to attain its goal of training additional physicians in Texas to help alleviate the critical shortage in the state. In conclusion, the current momentum to attain this Legislative initiative in an efficient and cost effective manner would be stopped.

5 Multicampus Institutional Enhancement

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

As Texas' youngest health science center, the TAMHSC is maturing rapidly into a statewide resource for health professions education, service and research. It currently offers training in more health disciplines than any other Health-Related Institution in Texas. With campuses located in Dallas, Temple, Round Rock, Bryan/College Station, Houston, Corpus Christi, and McAllen, it is critical that the institution receive the resources needed to support instructional operations required by a geographically dispersed, "virtual campus."

How did the Special Item originate?

This funding item was initiated by the Legislature as part of the transition to the formula funding model adopted in the 1999 Legislative session.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Failure to fund multi-campus institutional enhancement would critically damage the HSC's ability to operate effective educational outreach through its geographically diverse campuses. As a result, the state would be unable to address shortages of physicians, pharmacists, nurses, dentists, and public health professionals.

6 Biosecurity & Import Safety

Appropriation \$1,000,000 \$1,000,000 \$0

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The Biosecurity and Import Safety initiative addresses complex public health issues in a major "biosecurity hot spot" along the Texas-Mexico Border, through the TAMHSC South Texas Center in McAllen. The Border region faces an array of acute public health challenges such as the presence of drug-resistant strains of tuberculosis, the need for expanded influenza readiness, and the need for additional programs to control diseases transmitted by insects or passed from animals to humans, to name but a few. The funding will provide biomedical laboratory capacity in the region as well as develop and implement critical training needed to detect threats to public health as people and imports arrive at the border before these risks become established in the population.

How did the Special Item originate?

Through Exceptional Item Request in the Request for Legislative Appropriations for fiscal years 2010 and 2011.

1 Alzheimer's Diagnostic & Treatment Center

Appropriation \$500,000 \$798,220 \$798,641

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of the Alzheimer's Diagnostic and Treatment Center is threefold: (1) to expand clinical identification, treatment and care of persons with Alzheimer's and related memory disorders through the Department of Internal Medicine's Gerontology Assessment and Planning Program (GAP); (2) to facilitate basic science research into the origins and treatment of Alzheimer's; and (3) to establish productive links between Alzheimer's work in geriatrics clinical care, in basic science laboratories, and in public health.

UNT Health Science Center holds two NIH program project grant awards in aging and participates in several clinical trials in aging and Alzheimer's

In 2000, 10% of the Texas population was aged 65 or older; this is expected to double by 2040. The number of people with dementia will increase with the aging of the population. Geriatrics is a Center of Excellence at UNTHSC. The institution is well equipped to expand its work in Alzheimer's.

University of North Texas Health Science Center at Fort Worth 2 DNA Laboratory

Appropriation \$217,428 \$2,948,829 \$2,950,345

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The primary applications of DNA technology at the UNT Health Science Center include paternity testing, forensic assessment, diagnosis of Lyme Disease, and identification of missing persons. Additionally, faculty specializing in gene regulations and genetic polymorphisms are involved in basic research understanding how genes influence pathology and to develop new gene therapies. A master's degree in biomedical sciences with a discipline in Forensic Genetics has been established. Clinical Genetics/DNA also supports Education and research in clinical genetics.

The DNA/Identity Laboratory was first funded in 1989 to support the Texas Attorney General's Child Support Division in paternity testing. Additional funding was appropriated by the 77th Texas Legislature to establish the Lyme Disease laboratory and expand clinical genetics education. Through the Office of the Attorney General, the 77th Texas Legislature also funded the creation of a Missing Persons Database, connected to the FBI's CODIS database (Combined DNA Index system), which was operational in January 2003. The Texas Missing Person's Database requires direct state funding to support the needs of Texans.

The UNT Health Science Center DNA Laboratory a rich essential resource for Texans, providing genetic assessment services in paternity, Lyme Disease and forensic applications including missing persons. A doctoral degree is under development with a discipline in Forensic Genetics.

How did the Special Item originate?

Through the Office of the Attorney General, and the 77th Texas Legislature.

Research expenditures at UNT Health Science Center grew 188%, the fastest rate among all health-related institutions over the past six years. This funding supports continued progress in taking research from the bench to the bedside.

1 South Texas Border Region Health Professional Education

Appropriation \$1,125,000 \$906,228 \$906,228

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The South Texas Border Region Health Professional Education works in direct support of the residents of West Texas and provides the critical funding to support several areas.

The first is a neurosurgery faculty member. This support allows Thomason Hospital to provide Trauma 1 level care to our citizens within a 300 miles radius of El Paso. Further it allows Thomason to continue its Trauma 1 designation and accreditation and provides a critical and unique opportunity for our students and residents to obtain trauma 1 training and education.

Second, four Community Partnership Clinics are supported, in part, through this special item and assist in providing health care to over 6600 of the poorest residents in the El Paso area including the barrios. These clinics are critical to the training and education program for our Family Medicine clerkships, summer program for our second and fourth year undergraduate medical students, training for the UTEP/UT Austin Cooperative Pharmacy Program student clinical site and the Texas Tech Physician Assistant program.

Third, a modest portion of the funding is for infrastructure support, faculty salaries, and maintenance and operations for these educational programs. The total number of students currently involved is 140 medical students and 205 residents.

How did the Special Item originate?

In the 74th Legislature, House Bill No. 1, Article III - General Appropriations as a Special Item funded by the Legislature.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? There was no time limit on this special item.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

No, the purposes of this funding are uniquely suited for special line item consideration.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

This special item supports the Neurosurgery faculty in El Paso which allows Thomason Hospital to maintain their Trauma 1 designation.

This item supports Family Medicine clerkships and summer program for our second and fourth year undergraduate medical students, training for the UTEP/UT Austin Cooperative Pharmacy Program student clinical site and the Texas Tech Physician Assistant program. Clinical care is provided in part, through this special item and assists in providing health care to over 6600 of our poorest residents in the El Paso area including the barrios.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Without this funding we would no longer be able to support the neurosurgery faculty necessary for Thomason Hospital to maintain its Trauma I designation. It would prevent us from leveraging this funding to obtain external support for physicians with surgical trauma expertise and expanding to ocular and pediatric ocular trauma

expertise which provides unique training opportunities for Family Medicine and Community medicine students and residents. The joint training programs with UTEP/UT Austin Cooperative Pharmacy Program student clinical site would close. 2 Border Support – Academic Expansion

Appropriation \$250,000 \$3,888,891 \$3,888,891

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

El Paso, with a population of over 700,000 people has limited access to health care. This border region faces health care challenges not seen in most parts of the United States. The Texas Tech School of Medicine in El Paso plays a major role in meeting the health care needs of the region through faculty and residency programs. The Paul L. Foster School of Medicine, a new Children's Hospital and the new medical center at Ft Bliss have provided the perfect opportunity and environment for expansion of the TTUHSC residency programs. These programs focus on training resident physicians in the specific health care issues that are unique to El Paso and the border region. This special item provides a portion of the support for the residency programs in El Paso. The number of resident positions is planned to expand from approximately 200 to over 500 in the next several years. Because residency graduates are more likely to establish practice in the geographical area of their residency training, increasing the number of residency positions will have a direct impact on the number of practicing physicians in the El Paso border region.

How did the Special Item originate?

This special item originated in the 72nd Legislature, House Bill 1, in Article III. It was originally appropriated under the name "Border Indigent Health Care Support".

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? There was no time limit on this special item when it was created.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? Yes

If ves. should the item be reduced?

The formula for Graduate Medical Education is insufficient to cover the cost of Graduate Medical Education training. This special item is necessary to support the growing residency programs in El Paso and should not be reduced by the amount of the GME formula.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

The current rate of Graduate Medical Education formula funding contributes less than 50% of the faculty costs to educate a resident physician and is not sufficient to replace the funding in this special item.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

This special item is focused on supporting the Graduate Medical Education programs at the Paul L. Foster School of Medicine in El Paso.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The physicians trained in El Paso are critical to meeting the health care needs of this area. Without this special item, fewer physicians would be available to meet the needs of an already underserved area. Both faculty and staff positions would be eliminated who contribute to the medical education and residency program at TTUHSC. Both border and rural health would be negatively impacted. Finally, it is well documented that where physicians train has a major impact on where they will practice; thus if they train in West Texas, there is a significant increase in retaining physicians in the area. If they cannot train here, because of the lack of funding, having physicians locate in the 5th largest city in the State and 22nd largest city in the nation will decrease placing additional stress on the already strained health care system.

3 Academic Support - Border Development

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

This Special Item was created to expand the interest of the Texas student population (grade school – undergraduate) in becoming a physician, through the identification, encouragement, and education of the most promising students in the West Texas border area. Further, the program is also used to monitor the students progress and to provide oversight in some aspects of their experiences including summer programs, following medical students and physicians during their daily routine (HIPAA approved process), practicing in a medical simulation program and to promote consumer education in access to healthcare services.

How did the Special Item originate?

This special item originated in the 73rd Legislature, Senate Bill No. 5, Article III, General Appropriations Act; Legislature funded special item request.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? There was no time limit given on this special item.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

We do not believe formula funding will ever be able to support this special item given formula funding is focused on the specific educational and training needs of the medical students.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The Academic Expansion program within the University is focused on increasing the number of local students pursing medical careers, increasing the numbers of local students enrolled in the TTUHSC-PLFSOM program, training community leaders in the importance of healthcare and access and expanding recruitment and prematriculation educational efforts. This program touches approximately 4000-5000 high school students /year, with at least 600/year actively participating.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Recruitment and education efforts for Border residents would be diminished sharply and would negatively impact the number of students choosing careers in medicine with a reduction in the pipeline of physicians locating their practices in El Paso and the Border region. Healthcare services and access would fall even further behind the rest of the state.

4 Integrated Health Network

Appropriation \$500,000 \$1,324,895 \$1,324,895

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of the integrated health network is to deliver critically needed formal degree related education, patient care, and health related continuing education services to the rural and underserved areas of West Texas. This integrated health network provides high speed connectivity between the 7 campuses of the Health Sciences Center (Lubbock, Amarillo, El Paso, Odessa, Midland, Abilene, Dallas) and more than 30 satellite clinical and educational sites. It provides for the consistent delivery of academic curricula to cohorts of students in geographically isolated classrooms, creates operational efficiencies, and fosters collaboration, while avoiding the costly duplication of resources among and between TTUHSC campuses.

How did the Special Item originate?

In the 72nd Legislature, House Bill No. 1, Article III, - General Appropriations Act; Legislature funded special item request.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? There was no time limit on this special item.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Approximately 12,500 semester credit hours are delivered through this network.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

TTUHSC would lose the ability to leverage the funds and would not earn the local/contract revenue. The total funding available in the IT Division would be reduced by \$3,000,000 which would require the IT Division to discontinue the integrated health network that connects our campuses as a system that extends the Institution's outreach to communities in need.

TTUHSC would no longer be able to support interactive class sessions between faculty on one campus and students on multiple campuses. Without adding faculty at each campus the current schedule of classes could not be supported, losing 4,500 hours annually in interactive education.

TTUHSC would no longer be able to provide the technical infrastructure to support telemedicine which provides critical patient care to rural communities and the criminal justice system in Texas and educates rural providers through direct interaction with specialists from different health disciplines.

TTUHSC would no longer be able to provide accredited continuing education programs for health care professionals in civilian and military hospitals. The FY 09, this program provided over 90,000 hours of accredited CE programming to over 120,000 healthcare providers in Texas.

Without funding, TTUHSC and the State of Texas would be required to provide services in the traditional manner which could result in the drastic reduction of services and

5 Medical Education - Odessa

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The School of Medicine in Odessa is focused on Graduate Medical Education. These programs have provided the resources to enhance the health care for the Permian Basin region. In FY 2009, 20,778 patients were served through 58,154 clinic visits. The number of patients served has increased by 45% since FY 2000. This level of patient care is primarily available due to the residency programs supported by this special item. The item provides the administrative infrastructure for the graduate medical education programs at the Odessa campus.

How did the Special Item originate?

The current rate of Graduate Medical Education formula funding contributes less than 50% of the faculty costs to educate a resident physician and is not sufficient to replace the funding for this special item.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

This special item provides the administrative infrastructure for four graduate medical education programs at the Odessa campus.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The institution would be forced to redirect resources for clinical services in Midland to the Odessa campus. FY 2010 projected clinic visits in Midland approximate 14,000 in Internal Medicine, OB/GYN and Family Medicine. The number of clinic visits would be drastically reduced and some or all of the three disciplines eliminated.

The mission of this special item is to fund core operating costs for the new medical school and start-up costs such as clinical simulation, research equipment, etc. and educational and research faculty for the four year medical school in El Paso.

How did the Special Item originate?

77th Legislature, Senate Bill No. 1, Article III – General Appropriations Act.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? Yes

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

The Paul L. Foster School of Medicine admitted its first students in Fall 2009 with 40 students. The full enrollment of 100 students per class will be achieved in Fall of 2015. Full formula funding will not be received until FY 2018.

The establishment of the four year medical school required the addition of basic science faculty. These are organized into four transdisciplinary Centers of Excellence, which bring together experts in basic sciences, information sciences and clinical sciences, to produce new findings in each of these disciplinary domains. The Centers are focused on Infectious Diseases, Cancer, Neurosciences and Diabetes / Obesity, all of which are major health care concerns for the border region. The funding generated through the research enhancement formula will not be sufficient to replace the support for these centers of excellence.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The programs supported by this item are multifaceted. The first part of this program is the recruitment and support for basic science and clinical medical educators whose primary responsibility is to build and teach the curriculum beginning with our first new class of students. This part also includes the simulation center. A second major part of this program is the recruitment of research faculty who will focus on our four major Research Centers of Excellence; Neurosciences, Infectious Diseases, Cancer and Diabetes/Obesity. To support our Centers of Excellence it was necessary to actively recruit research faculty who specialized in Biostatistics and could support all of our research programs; basic, clinical and translational. A third major part of this program is focused on recruiting physician/scientists who can transverse the basic research centers of excellence and bring the clinical perspective to the basic research and ultimately to the bed side, in many cases this is called translational science. A fourth major part of this program is focused on the infrastructure to support the three parts noted above which includes libraries, IT systems which focus on educational and research areas, admission and student affairs, administration and facilities and maintenance.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

The school would face severe financial challenges. The vast majority of the current faculty would most likely leave, given the current funding which is necessary to retain our basic science educational and research faculty to educate first and second year medical students, continue to build our educational program for third and fourth year medical students and continue to build on our developing research program and infrastructure programs. We would be forced to withdraw from our agreements with other

UT schools, our community hospitals, VA clinics and Ft. Bliss's Beaumont Hospital which we share a joint residency program and are considering other joint residency programs. The number of students which we are expecting to admit when fully operational of 100 in each class would have to be reduced.

7 Physician Assistant Program

Appropriation \$1,016,500 \$508,250 \$508,250

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of this special item is to support a 33 percent enrollment increase (from 45 to 60 students per class) in the TTUHSC physician assistant program in Midland, Texas. The program serves the people of Texas with particular emphasis on increasing access to health care and improving the health status of the population of medically underserved regions of West Texas and Texas. Special item funds are needed for increased faculty, travel to increased numbers of clinical teaching sites, and teaching materials for the expanded enrollment.

How did the Special Item originate?

If yes, should the item be reduced?

80th Legislature, House Bill No. 1, Article III - General Appropriations Act.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? Yes

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? No time limit on this special item.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? Yes

Formula funding for this special item is not available in the current biennium. Full funding of this special item should continue until the program receives full formula funding in FY 2014.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

The 1st year class size will increase to 60 students in Summer 2010. The full enrollment of 180 students will not be complete until Summer 2012. Full formula funding for these students will not be achieved until the 2014 – 2015 biennium.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The Physician Assistant Program in Midland.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Denial of funding prior to achieving full formula funding will seriously threaten the ability of TTUHSC to maintain current student enrollment levels and adequate faculty numbers to deliver the curriculum. Not funding will result in diminished program effectiveness and a decrease in graduation and national certification rates. The number of licensed physician assistants in Texas and West Texas will not increase to meet state needs. As of 2009, TTUHSC PA graduates currently provide approximately 1.2 million patient encounters annually. Denial of funding would be a significant negative impact to access to health-care provided by these and future graduates in the state, particularly in regard to Hispanic and rural citizens.

8 Family and Community Medicine Residency

Start Year: 1998 2010 2011

Appropriation \$617,844 \$600,915 \$600,915

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of the Texas Tech University HSC Family Medicine Residency Training Program is to increase the number of physicians in practice in West Texas. Access to health care is a key and critical component of any economy. With an adequate number of physicians, the health of the rural population and rural community is ensured. If there is a shortage of physicians then a rural population shift to the larger urban communities occurs. There currently is a critical shortage of primary care physicians in Rural West Texas.

This Special Item was created to expand the mission of the Texas Tech University HSC School of Medicine through the Department of Family and Community Medicine by establishing Residency Training Programs in areas with rural training capabilities. Residents train in a private practice environment with a health care team including patient services, nursing, and physician. The residents are exposed to a diverse patient population and strong physician role models resulting in a strong foundation for training outstanding family physicians. This special item enhances the opportunities to train and retain family physicians in Rural West Texas. Such residency programs require state subsidy as they are less likely to receive teaching hospital support.

How did the Special Item originate?

75th Legislature, House Bill No. 1, Article III, - General Appropriations Act.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? There was no time limit on this special item.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? Yes

If yes, should the item be reduced?

This special item supports a specific residency program that has increased costs to the institution. The special items should not be reduced by the GME formula funding amount generated by the 6 residents in the program.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

The current rate of Graduate Medical Education formula funding contributes less than 50% of the faculty costs to educate a resident physician and is not sufficient to replace the funding in this special item.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

This funding supports six (6) Family Medicine residents per year. (Two Family Medicine Residents at each post graduate level for the three year program) in the Family Medicine Residency Training Program.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Texas has experienced a fast and consistent population growth rate, and Texas has the largest percent uninsured population in the United States. There are significant differences in the distribution of health care providers among metropolitan and non-metropolitan counties in Texas. Whole county Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) are located predominately in rural counties in Texas, especially in West Texas. Texas has experienced a decreasing supply of physicians because of an aging work force and consistently ranks 45th in the United States in physicians per 100,000 population. Other funding sources are not available to replace the special item funding. The TTUHSC Rural Track Family and Community Medicine Residency Training would be forced to close.

8 Family and Community Medicine Residency

Development of a new rural training site in Plainview is underway in collaboration with four established physicians. Establishment of this training site is contingent on the continuation of this special item.

9 Border Health - Resident Support

Start Year: 1994 2010 2011

Appropriation \$450,000 \$387,773 \$387,773

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The Border Health Resident Program provides funding to train physicians during their residency for an area with a rapidly growing population that is already experiencing significant limitations in access to health care. The El Paso and West Texas Border Region has a much greater shortage of physicians than the rest of the state and it is one of the most "underserved" areas, as noted by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, within the U.S. The number of resident positions is planned to expand from approximately 200 to over 500 in the next several years. Because residency graduates are more likely to establish practice in the geographical area of their residency training, increasing the number of residency positions will have a direct impact on the number of practicing physicians in the El Paso border region.

How did the Special Item originate?

This special item originated in the 73rd Legislature, Senate Bill No. 5, Article III, as a General Appropriations Act; Legislature funded special item request.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? There was no time limit on this special item.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? Yes

If yes, should the item be reduced?

The formula for Graduate Medical Education is insufficient to cover the cost of Graduate Medical Education training. This special item is necessary to support the growing residency programs in El Paso and should not be reduced by the amount of the GME formula.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

The current rate of Graduate Medical Education formula funding contributes less than 50% of the faculty costs to educate a resident physician and is not sufficient to replace the funding in this special item.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

The residency programs and the infrastructure support staff are supported by this special line item. This program has continued to assist in growing the residency program. They have continued to support each departmental program and continue to keep the high quality as all programs are approved and accredited.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

If this Special Item was not funded, the external funding sources would drastically reduce their funding, resulting in a significant drop in residents admitted to the TTUHSC-El Paso; therefore, decreasing the number of GME graduates that could be future health care providers in the border region. Given the region is already categorized by the US Department of Health and Human Services as one of the most "underserved" areas in the US, a reduction would be an enormous blow to the community.

Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center 10 Midland Medical Residency

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The mission of the TTUHSC Permian Basin is to promote excellence in medical education on our campus by developing new programs and improving existing programs that grow the physician supply for West Texas. This special item supports the educational training of primary care physicians in Internal Medicine, Family Medicine, and Obstetricians and Gynecology.

How did the Special Item originate?

Midland Surgical Residency -74th Legislature, House Bill No. 1, Article III - General Appropriations Act.

Midland Cardiology Residency Program - 75th Legislature, House Bill No 1, Article III - General Appropriations Act.

Medical Residency - 79th Legislature, Senate Bill No 1, Article III - General Appropriations Act.

Midland Medical Residency – combined the three special items above into one special item in 2010. 81st Legislature, Senate Bill No. 1, Article III – General Appropriations Act

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? There was no time limit on this special item.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? Yes

If yes, should the item be reduced?

The formula for Graduate Medical Education is insufficient to cover the cost of Graduate Medical Education training. This special item is necessary to support the residency programs in the Permian Basin and should not be reduced by the amount of the GME formula.

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

The current rate of Graduate Medical Education formula funding contributes less than 50% of the faculty costs to educate a resident physician and is not sufficient to replace the funding in this special item.

What University program is supported by the Special item?

Graduate Medical Education. Both the current Internal Medicine and Obstetrics/Gynecology residency training programs are supported with this funding. Full time surgery faculty have been hired to establish the basis for creating the infrastructure of a surgery department and future surgical residency training program.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

If current levels of funding are reduced, the Internal Medicine and Ob/Gyn training programs in Midland cannot be sustained. The surgical residency training program for TTUHSC Permian Basin cannot be initiated. Medical Students who are receiving their clinical education in the Permian Basin will have limited opportunity to do residency training at TTUHSC Permian Basin which will result in a significant decrease in the recruitment and retention of practicing physicians for West Texas. TTUHSC will be unable to take advantage of the tremendous potential for expanding its mission of education, research and clinical care in the Permian Basin.

11 Diabetes Research Center

Start Year: 2002 2010 2011

Appropriation \$300,000 \$289,140 \$289,140

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Diabetes is one of the major diseases which are ravaging the population and the impact is felt even more on the West Texas Border and rural areas where a larger portion than the rest of the US is diagnosed with diabetes. The Hispanic community for yet unknown specific reasons has a higher incidence of diabetes then the rest of the U.S.

The Texas Tech Diabetes Research Center was formed as the initial epi-center for the research, prevention and control of diabetes in the West Texas border area with the vision to improve the quality and multidisciplinary nature of diabetes research by providing shared access to specialized technical resources and expertise. One of the overall goals is to bring together clinical and basic science investigators, from relevant disciplines, to enhance and extend the effectiveness of research related to diabetes and its complications.

Focusing on the mission and goals has translated, in part, into focusing on population genomics which is becoming an increasingly important component of diabetes research and ultimately treatment. Deep gene sequencing technology is bringing an entirely new approach to the understanding of complex genetic mutations and genegene interactions. Microarray-based Single Nucleotide Polymorphism (SNP) studies, the current state of the art, are rapidly reaching the limit of their value, and the race is now on to understand how next-generation technology will change what's known about the genetics of diabetes.

How did the Special Item originate?

77th Legislature, Senate Bill No. 1, Article III – General Appropriations and Texas Education Code, §110.15.

Was item initially "Start Up" funding? No

Was there a time limit on the item when it was created? There was no time limit on this special item.

Does item still serve original purpose Yes

Does the Institutions get Formula Funding for Item? No

Will formula ever be able to support the Special Item?

What University program is supported by the Special item?

A very focused but modest Diabetes Center is supported by this program and is at the core of the Diabetes/Obesity Center of Excellence. Further, this Center interacts with the other Centers of Excellence allowing us to leverage support in all areas building a competitive core group of physicians and scientists for education/training/research and community involvement.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

If funding for the line item is not continued, the center will not be successful in recruiting a new Director for the Center of Excellence in Diabetes and Obesity which would prevent the school from obtaining several hundred thousand dollars in extramural research support. This core funding is considered crucial by the director candidates. This action would severely reduce the ability in El Paso to conduct state of art research in diabetes, a disease which is a major medical problem in El Paso. Texas.

To establish a major cancer research program at the TTUHSC School of Medicine that will:

- 3)Provide opportunities for West Texans to participate in cutting-edge oncology clinical trials.
- 4)Carry out laboratory and clinical trials to develop novel anti-cancer drugs for adults and children.
- 5) Enhance the reputation of Texas Tech via high-impact journal publications.
- 6) Insure that Texas Tech can be competitive for funding from the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT) and can actively participate in CPRIT cooperative research endeavors.

- 7)Carry out discovery and development research that results in filing of patent protection so that a future stream of revenue can accrue to Texas Tech.
- 8) Work closely with Texas-based commercial entities to bring novel anti-cancer therapies to market so as to benefit patients world-wide and benefit the economy of Texas.
- 9)Enhance the education of students at Texas Tech by involving them in high quality translational cancer research.
- 10)Ultimately, the goal is to build sufficient infrastructure and critical mass of cancer investigators to enable establishing a National Cancer Institute designated Cancer Center in West Texas.

12 Cancer Research

The special item provides critical infrastructure support for the TTUHSC School of Medicine Cancer Center, the TTUHSC Cancer Committee (www.TTUHSCCC.org), and the South Plains Oncology Consortium (www.SPONC.org). Special item funding supports faculty and staff for these organizations, direct support of both adult and pediatric clinical trials that enable participating institutions to enroll patients, supports the cancer banking effort in West Texas, initiation and storage of new cell lines, production, storage, and distribution of new anticancer drugs for clinical trials, and a variety of other infrastructural needs of the Program.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

Other funding sources are not sufficient to initiate or sustain the operating costs of the TTUHSC Cancer Center, the South Plains Oncology Consortium, or the associated research initiatives. The inability to continue the funding for this project from general revenue would compromise ongoing cancer research, prevent development of new clinical trials, likely cause ongoing Texas clinical trials to close, and diminish the ability of program investigators to successfully compete for external grant funding.

Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center 13 Rural Health Care

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

Rural Health Care (RHC) works in direct collaboration with the people of West Texas for the advancement of health through imaginative and scholarly research, innovative use of technology, comprehensive education and outreach. RHC is the primary liaison and linkage of TTUHSC to over 2.7 million rural, frontier, colonias, underserved and urban residents (12% of the state's population) living in communities across the vast 108–county TTUHSC service area. The area is 49% of Texas and half the counties are frontier by federal definition; 98 counties are rural, 12 counties do not have a physician, nurse practitioner or physician assistant and 32 counties do not have a hospital. RHC responds to the unique needs of West Texas and is nationally renowned for improvements to health and wellness produced by RHC's dedicated scholars, scientists, public health specialists, computer engineers, community outreach professionals, telehealth pioneers and administration professionals. RHC directs its efforts in developing, implementing and coordinating a wide range of rural health and community-based projects, which include assisting with the creation and implementation of sound rural health policies; focusing on health education and health workforce development; sponsoring and conducting rural-oriented scientific, scholarly and applied research programs and policy analysis; and, advancing enhanced health care access, delivery and clinical leveraging through technology.

How did the Special Item originate?

In the 71st Legislature, Senate Bill No. 22, Article III, - General Appropriations Act; Legislature funded special item request.

They include Telemedicine, Project FRONTIER, Project CHART, West Texas Area Health Education Center (Core Support and Federal Match), Schools of Medicine, Nursing, Allied Health Sciences, and Pharmacy (at all four campuses), research education training, Cancer Nutrition Network for Texans (CNNT), CPRIT funded cancer studies, the West Texas Influenza Center, the Office Rural and Community Health, the Garrison Institute for Aging, the Laura Bush Institute for Women's Health, and the West Texas Health Information Technology Regional Extension Center. It links to the Rawls College of Business at TTU for a multidisciplinary certificate and doctoral training in informatics and supports a HRSA Advanced Nursing Education Program in the Anita Thigpen Perry School of Nursing.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

RHC is an integrated and linked group of unique programs building on the strengths of the respective singular programs to develop into a consolidated and highly effective set of scientifically- and scholarly-defined responses to the health care needs of our West Texas communities. Loss of funding will distinctly impact the foundation of the Office of Rural and Community Affairs and significantly degrade and/or remove the series of networks to our rural communities, the achievements and ongoing programs in the development and implementation of an educational curriculum emphasizing rural health issues, the established links to regional, state, and national levels for funding and peer acceptance, and the collection and dissemination of rural health care information. Telemedicine services to rural communities would be reduced considerably or eliminated. Medical support to the Texas Department of Corrections and Community Based settings would engender higher costs to each and would merely shift burden to

other state agencies and/or local economies. Programs in rural research and data analysis would also be eliminated and along with it the potential to bring considerable new federal and other funding to West Texas. The focal point and leadership of rural innovation and promising initiatives would drop to a low priority behind the usual and customary duties of education, administration and the demands of clinical duties.

14 West Texas Area Health Education Center (AHEC) Program

Start Year: 2010 2010 2011

Appropriation \$2,000,000 \$2,000,000 \$2,000,000

What is the mission of the Special Item?:

The West Texas AHEC Program (WTAHEC) reduces health service disparities, health care provider shortages, and barriers to healthcare access in Texas through regional, need-based health professions workforce development. It introduces youth and their families to health careers, provides community-based clinical training for health professions students, provides practice support, placement and retention of health professionals in high need areas, and expands community-based opportunities to increase health professions training capacity. The clientele are youth, college and health professions students, health professionals, and communities that form a pipeline of future health professionals. A staff of 28 professionals serves 105 western-most Texas counties from offices located in Abilene, Canyon, El Paso, Midland, and Plainview. Programs respond to an expanding and diverse Texas population with chronic need for healthcare professionals in West Texas (21 counties have had no physician for over two decades), yet are the heart of the Texas agriculture and energy-related industries that require an adequate healthcare infrastructure to expand economic development. The Rural Messenger and the Atlas of Rural Health are among several ongoing sentinel publications used by researchers, policy advocates, and decision-makers to understand in detail issues of rural health in Texas and beyond.

How did the Special Item originate?

81st Legislature, Senate Bill No. 1, Article XII, Sec. 25. Allocation of Higher Education and Other Government Programs Stimulus Funding

The federal origination funding for the AHEC program required a long-term sustainment plan to leverage permanent state funding to support the program. TTUHSC has been in the process of pursuing that state support for the West Texas AHEC for the last two legislative sessions (the life of the program to date). State line item permanent funding has been provided to UTMB for East Texas AHEC and to UTHSC-San Antonio for South Texas AHEC (Center for South Texas Programs) for several years. Dedicated state funding for West Texas would establish permanent AHEC service coverage for the entire state. The ARRA appropriation supports this long-term plan for the next two years, but permanent state funding is critical in the next legislative session, or these services to West Texas will end with no possibility of replacement from the other existing AHECs in Texas.

Consequences of not funding the Special Item.

WTAHEC is integrated and linked to critical rural health programming for West Texas. Loss of funding will induce a disparity to the region by eliminating the benefits of AHEC programming in community-based health education and health care workforce development for nearly ½ the state while simultaneously providing AHEC program benefits to other parts of Texas through an unfair imbalance from biennial state funding provided to East Texas AHEC and South Texas AHEC. State legislators clearly recognized that imbalance and the consequential impact when they provided a temporary 2-year funding source. 26 professionals will be terminated, reassigned or demoted and 5 centers will close displacing local employees. Health professions students will lose rotation opportunities to rural practices negatively impacting clinical capacity for training programs and significant scholarship reductions will impact every health profession program. HealthMATCH program would cease. Career shadowing/exploration, community-based training, and the opportunity for rural communities to meet their long term health professions needs will be severely limited. Programs in rural workforce development, health needs assessments/analysis would also be eliminated and along with it the potential to bring considerable new federal and other funding to West Texas. The focal point and leadership of rural innovation and promising initiatives would drop to a low priority.

Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center is a multi-campus institution with Lubbock as the administrative center and regional campuses in Amarillo, El Paso, Odessa, Midland, Abilene and Dallas. Programs at these regional campuses include Medicine, Nursing, Allied Health, Pharmacy and Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences with enrollment of over 900 students. The campus infrastructure consists of approximately 600,000 square feet and over 2,500 employees who serve the students, resident physicians and patients. This special item is used to enhance the academic programs of the institution by centrally funding the cost of support services that are required for accreditation.
