


On-line bed capacity reflects the total number of TDCJ beds available for the permanent assignment of incarcerated individuals. At the end of September 2019, 3,443 beds had been temporarily removed from on-line bed capacity (3,127 due to staffing shortages, 260 due to a renovation project, and 56 due to a wheelchair conversion project). Also at this time, on-line bed capacity did not include 2,242 temporary placement beds, which include medical (hospital beds and unit-based infirmary beds), transfer holding, and pre-hearing detention beds. Incarcerated individuals housed in temporary placement beds also have permanent beds assigned to them. The total number of Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds at the end of September 2019 was 2,845.


- •As of August 2019, agency capacity was modified due to staffing shortages resulting in a temporary net reduction of 1,625 beds (removed from capacity: Connally Unit 432, Daniel Unit 376, Michael Unit 321, Wallace Unit 252, Stevenson Unit 252, and Lynaugh Unit 260; returned to capacity: Rudd Unit 136, Telford Unit 84, and Jordan-Baten Unit 48). The changes to capacity were made to more effectively manage staffing shortages.
- •As of May 2019, agency capacity was reduced by 28 beds (Smith Unit 10, Allred Unit 8, Clements Unit 2, and Lewis Unit 8) for the conversion of space to accommodate a dayroom accessible restroom. These changes were part of changes associated with the conversion of the expansion cell blocks to cool housing beds for heat sensitive incarcerated individuals.
- •As of March 2019, 582 beds at the Smith Unit temporarily removed from the on-line bed capacity were re-opened and returned to capacity due to an increase in staffing and the movement of heat sensitive incarcerated individuals to cool beds.
- •As of September 2018, 56 beds were temporarily removed from capacity due to a wheelchair conversion project at the Duncan Unit.
- •As of August 2018, 163 sheltered housing beds (Jester III Unit 54 beds, Telford Unit 95 beds, and Carole Young Unit 14 beds) have been added to capacity and 64 beds at the Henley State Jail were converted from In Prison Therapeutic Community beds to ISF beds.
- •As of July 2018, 260 beds were temporarily removed from capacity at the Neal Unit as part of a renovation project.





- Capacity Adjustments and Other Notes:

 In August 2019, TJJD operating capacity decreased by 24 beds due to the closure of the Cottrell halfway house.

 In June 2018, TJJD operating capacity decreased by 149 beds. This was due to the transfer of the ownership of the Corsicana facility to the City of Corsicana.

 In September 2013, TJJD operating capacity decreased by 319 beds. This was due to the reduction in capacity at the Corsicana facility (49 beds), Giddings facility (46 beds), McLennan facility (120 beds), Ron Jackson I facility (16 beds halfway houses (40 beds), and contract residential placements (48 beds).

 In September 2011, TJJD operating capacity decreased by 107 beds. This was due to the reduction in capacity at the Ron Jackson I facility (32 beds) and the reduction in capacity of contract residential placements (75 beds).

 In July 2011, TJJD operating capacity decreased by 596 beds. This was due to the closure of three facilities: Al Price (280 beds), Crockett (208 beds), and Ron Jackson II (108 beds).



Supplemental Definition and Classification

Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Supervision (Adult Probation) Populations

- ¹ During fiscal year 2010, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Justice Assistance Division transitioned from compiling aggregate population data from counties through the Monthly Community Supervision and Corrections Report (MCSCR) to generating monthly population reports based on detailed case-based data collected through the Community Supervision Tracking System / Intermediate System (CSTS Intermediate System). Community supervision data through fiscal year 2009 are based on population counts reported to the MCSCR, and fiscal years 2010 to the present data are based on monthly reports generated from the CSTS Intermediate System.
- ² Supervision placements include adjudicated probation, deferred adjudication, and return from shock incarceration.
- ³ Successful supervision terminations include early terminations and those with expired terms.
- ⁴ Unsuccessful supervision terminations include revocation to county jail, state jail, prison, and other revocations,

- Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² A new commitment is a juvenile committed to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) for the first time.
- ³ A determinate sentence is a commitment for a specified period of time that is set by the juvenile court and can last up to 40 years in length; those who have not completed their sentence length by their 19th birthday are transferred to the adult system to complete the sentence.
- ⁴ An indeterminate sentence is a commitment for an unspecified length of time up to the individual's 19th birthday; TJJD has sole discretion over the commitment length.
- ⁵Since January 2016, a youth is said to have multiple commitments when there is more than one lawful court order committing him/ her to the TJJD simultaneously. This differs from a recommitted youth, which is a youth who has been *discharged* from a TJJD commitment, usually due to positive completion of the program before age 17, only to reoffend and be *committed again* ("recommitted") by the county juvenile court. Prior to January 2016, the term recommitment was used in the context of what is a multiple commitment.
- ⁶ The parole revocation information in this table presents the offense category that initiated the parole revocation.
- ⁷ Other commitments (also referred to as negative movements) are juveniles returned to a state residential facility for medical care, mental health care, and other non-disciplinary reasons. It also includes juveniles moved to a secure facility for a court hearing that does not result in a revocation.
- ⁸Total admissions is the sum of total new commitments, total multiple and recommitments, total revocations, and other.
- ⁹This calculation included a juvenile who had an unusually long length of stay.


- A formal referral occurs when: 1) delinquent conduct, conduct indicating a need for supervision (CINS), or violation of probation was allegedly committed; 2) the juvenile probation department has jurisdiction and venue; and 3) face-to-face contact occurs with the department or official designated by the juvenile board. Juveniles are typically referred to juvenile probation departments by schools and police but may also be referred by social workers, parents, and others. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² Misdemeanor Offenses include contempt of magistrate orders in addition to class A and B misdemeanor offenses.
- ³ Conduct in Need of Supervision (CINS) is a non-criminal offense for a juvenile and includes public intoxication, truancy, running away from home, fine-only offenses that have been transferred to a juvenile court from a municipal or justice court, inhalant abuse, and expulsion from an alternative school setting for persistent misconduct.
- ⁴ Dispositions reflect the outcomes of referrals to juvenile probation departments. The dispositions listed above do not include consolidated or transferred cases. Adjudicated probation includes all adjudicated dispositions of probation and modification of probation. Dismissed dispositions include dismissals, findings of not guilty, and findings of no probable cause. Supervisory caution is a non-judicial disposition that may involve such actions as referring the child to a social service agency or a community-based first offender program operated by law enforcement, contacting parents to inform them of the child's activities, or simply warning the child about his or her activities. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information. Figures in the table represent the number of cases, not the number of juveniles. A juvenile may have more than one case in a quarter.
- ⁵Juveniles under conditional predisposition, deferred prosecution, or adjudicated probation supervision may also be on Intensive Supervision (ISP) and/or placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility. ISP is a form of supervision that typically involves smaller caseloads supervised by specially trained probation officers and more frequent contacts between the juvenile and his or her probation officer. Juveniles under deferred prosecution or adjudicated probation supervision may be placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility.
- ⁶ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program (JJAEP) table and graph include information associated only with those students with a mandatory placement, those for whom the state provides reimbursement, though JJAEPs may accept students referred for discretionary reasons. The number of mandatory attendance days in June and July are low because many schools close in May and others only operate for part of June. The counts in summer school are also typically low because operating a summer school is optional. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ⁷ Mandatory Attendance Days reflect the sum of the number of days mandatory students attended JJAEPs within the month.
- ⁸ The graph reflects the number of juveniles certified as an adult and the number of cases sent to TJJD state residential facilities.
- ⁹ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program graph reflects mandatory attendance days accrued during the regular school year and does not include those accrued during summer school. Since summer school is optional and only available when sufficient funding exists, including only the regular school year renders year-to-year results that are comparable over time.



Also at this time, on-line bed capacity did not include 2,242 temporary placement beds, which include medical (hospital beds and unit-based infirmary beds), transfer holding, and pre-hearing detention beds. Incarcerated individuals housed in temporary placement beds also have permanent beds assigned to them. The total number of Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds at the end of October 2019 was 2,845.



The changes to capacity were made to more effectively manage staffing shortages.
- •As of May 2019, agency capacity was reduced by 28 beds (Smith Unit 10, Allred Unit 8, Clements Unit 2, and Lewis Unit 8) for the conversion of space to accommodate a dayroom accessible restroom. These changes were part of changes associated with the conversion of the expansion cell blocks to cool housing beds for heat sensitive incarcerated individuals.
- •As of March 2019, 582 beds at the Smith Unit temporarily removed from the on-line bed capacity were re-opened and returned to capacity due to an increase in staffing and the movement of heat sensitive incarcerated individuals to cool beds.

Supplemental Definition and Classification

Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Supervision (Adult Probation) Populations

- ¹ During fiscal year 2010, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Justice Assistance Division transitioned from compiling aggregate population data from counties through the Monthly Community Supervision and Corrections Report (MCSCR) to generating monthly population reports based on detailed case-based data collected through the Community Supervision Tracking System / Intermediate System (CSTS Intermediate System). Community supervision data through fiscal year 2009 are based on population counts reported to the MCSCR, and fiscal years 2010 to the present data are based on monthly reports generated from the CSTS Intermediate System.
- ² Supervision placements include adjudicated probation, deferred adjudication, and return from shock incarceration.
- ³ Successful supervision terminations include early terminations and those with expired terms
- ⁴ Unsuccessful supervision terminations include revocation to county jail, state jail, prison, and other revocations.

- ² A new commitment is a juvenile committed to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) for the first time.

- ⁴ An indeterminate sentence is a commitment for an unspecified length of time up to the individual's 19th birthday; TJJD has sole discretion over the commitment length.
- ⁵Since January 2016, a youth is said to have multiple commitments when there is more than one lawful court order committing him/ her to the TJJD simultaneously. This differs from a recommitted youth, which is a youth who has been *discharged* from a TJJD commitment, usually due to positive completion of the program before age 17, only to reoffend and be *committed again* ("recommitted") by the county juvenile court. Prior to January 2016, the term recommitment was used in the context of what is a multiple commitment.
- 6 The parole revocation information in this table presents the offense category that initiated the parole revocation.
- ⁷ Other commitments (also referred to as negative movements) are juveniles returned to a state residential facility for medical care, mental health care, and other non-disciplinary reasons. It also includes juveniles moved to a secure facility for a court hearing that does not result in a revocation.
- ⁸Total admissions is the sum of total new commitments, total multiple and recommitments, total revocations, and other.
- ⁹This calculation included a juvenile who had an unusually long length of stay.


- ¹ A formal referral occurs when: 1) delinquent conduct, conduct indicating a need for supervision (CINS), or violation of probation was allegedly committed; 2) the juvenile probation department has jurisdiction and venue; and 3) face-to-face contact occurs with the department or official designated by the juvenile board. Juveniles are typically referred to juvenile probation departments by schools and police but may also be referred by social workers, parents, and others. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² Misdemeanor Offenses include contempt of magistrate orders in addition to class A and B misdemeanor offenses.
- ³ Conduct in Need of Supervision (CINS) is a non-criminal offense for a juvenile and includes public intoxication, truancy, running away from home, fine-only offenses that have been transferred to a juvenile court from a municipal or justice court, inhalant abuse, and expulsion from an alternative school setting for persistent misconduct.
- ⁴ Dispositions reflect the outcomes of referrals to juvenile probation departments. The dispositions listed above do not include consolidated or transferred cases. Adjudicated probation includes all adjudicated dispositions of probation and modification of probation. Dismissed dispositions include dismissals, findings of not guilty, and findings of no probable cause. Supervisory caution is a non-judicial disposition that may involve such actions as referring the child to a social service agency or a community-based first offender program operated by law enforcement, contacting parents to inform them of the child's activities, or simply warning the child about his or her activities. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information. Figures in the table represent the number of cases, not the number of juveniles. A juvenile may have more than one case in a quarter.
- ⁵Juveniles under conditional predisposition, deferred prosecution, or adjudicated probation supervision may also be on Intensive Supervision (ISP) and/or placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility. ISP is a form of supervision that typically involves smaller caseloads supervised by specially trained probation officers and more frequent contacts between the juvenile and his or her probation officer. Juveniles under deferred prosecution or adjudicated probation supervision may be placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility.
- ⁶ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program (JJAEP) table and graph include information associated only with those students with a mandatory placement, those for whom the state provides reimbursement, though JJAEPs may accept students referred for discretionary reasons. The number of mandatory attendance days in June and July are low because many schools close in May and others only operate for part of June. The counts in summer school are also typically low because operating a summer school is optional. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ⁷ Mandatory Attendance Days reflect the sum of the number of days mandatory students attended JJAEPs within the month.
- ⁸ The graph reflects the number of juveniles certified as an adult and the number of cases sent to TJJD state residential facilities.
- ⁹ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program graph reflects mandatory attendance days accrued during the regular school year and does not include those accrued during summer school. Since summer school is optional and only available when sufficient funding exists, including only the regular school year renders year-to-year results that are comparable over time.



Supplemental Definition and Classification

Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Supervision (Adult Probation) Populations

- ¹ During fiscal year 2010, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Justice Assistance Division transitioned from compiling aggregate population data from counties through the Monthly Community Supervision and Corrections Report (MCSCR) to generating monthly population reports based on detailed case-based data collected through the Community Supervision Tracking System / Intermediate System (CSTS Intermediate System). Community supervision data through fiscal year 2009 are based on population counts reported to the MCSCR, and fiscal years 2010 to the present data are based on monthly reports generated from the CSTS Intermediate System.
- ² Supervision placements include adjudicated probation, deferred adjudication, and return from shock incarceration.
- ³ Successful supervision terminations include early terminations and those with expired terms.
- ⁴ Unsuccessful supervision terminations include revocation to county jail, state jail, prison, and other revocations.

- Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² A new commitment is a juvenile committed to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) for the first time.
- ³ A determinate sentence is a commitment for a specified period of time that is set by the juvenile court and can last up to 40 years in length; those who have not completed their sentence length by their 19th birthday are transferred to the adult system to complete the sentence.
- ⁴ An indeterminate sentence is a commitment for an unspecified length of time up to the individual's 19th birthday; TJJD has sole discretion over the commitment length.
- ⁵Since January 2016, a youth is said to have multiple commitments when there is more than one lawful court order committing him/ her to the TJJD simultaneously. This differs from a recommitted youth, which is a youth who has been *discharged* from a TJJD commitment, usually due to positive completion of the program before age 17, only to reoffend and be *committed again* ("recommitted") by the county juvenile court. Prior to January 2016, the term recommitment was used in the context of what is a multiple commitment.
- ⁶ The parole revocation information in this table presents the offense category that initiated the parole revocation.
- ⁷ Other commitments (also referred to as negative movements) are juveniles returned to a state residential facility for medical care, mental health care, and other non-disciplinary reasons. It also includes juveniles moved to a secure facility for a court hearing that does not result in a revocation.
- ⁸Total admissions is the sum of total new commitments, total multiple and recommitments, total revocations, and other.
- ⁹This calculation included a juvenile who had an unusually long length of stay.


- ¹ A formal referral occurs when: 1) delinquent conduct, conduct indicating a need for supervision (CINS), or violation of probation was allegedly committed; 2) the juvenile probation department has jurisdiction and venue; and 3) face-to-face contact occurs with the department or official designated by the juvenile board. Juveniles are typically referred to juvenile probation departments by schools and police but may also be referred by social workers, parents, and others. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² Misdemeanor Offenses include contempt of magistrate orders in addition to class A and B misdemeanor offenses
- ³ Conduct in Need of Supervision (CINS) is a non-criminal offense for a juvenile and includes public intoxication, truancy, running away from home, fine-only offenses that have been transferred to a juvenile court from a municipal or justice court, inhalant abuse, and expulsion from an alternative school setting for persistent misconduct.
- ⁴ Dispositions reflect the outcomes of referrals to juvenile probation departments. The dispositions listed above do not include consolidated or transferred cases. Adjudicated probation includes all adjudicated dispositions of probation and modification of probation. Dismissed dispositions include dismissals, findings of not guilty, and findings of no probable cause. Supervisory caution is a non-judicial disposition that may involve such actions as referring the child to a social service agency or a community-based first offender program operated by law enforcement, contacting parents to inform them of the child's activities, or simply warning the child about his or her activities. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information. Figures in the table represent the number of cases, not the number of juveniles. A juvenile may have more than one case in a quarter.
- ⁵Juveniles under conditional predisposition, deferred prosecution, or adjudicated probation supervision may also be on Intensive Supervision (ISP) and/or placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility. ISP is a form of supervision that typically involves smaller caseloads supervised by specially trained probation officers and more frequent contacts between the juvenile and his or her probation officer. Juveniles under deferred prosecution or adjudicated probation supervision may be placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility.
- ⁶ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program (JJAEP) table and graph include information associated only with those students with a mandatory placement, those for whom the state provides reimbursement, though JJAEPs may accept students referred for discretionary reasons. The number of mandatory attendance days in June and July are low because many schools close in May and others only operate for part of June. The counts in summer school are also typically low because operating a summer school is optional. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ⁷ Mandatory Attendance Days reflect the sum of the number of days mandatory students attended JJAEPs within the month.
- ⁸ The graph reflects the number of juveniles certified as an adult and the number of cases sent to TJJD state residential facilities.
- ⁹ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program graph reflects mandatory attendance days accrued during the regular school year and does not include those accrued during summer school. Since summer school is optional and only available when sufficient funding exists, including only the regular school year renders year-to-year results that are comparable over time.



On-line bed capacity reflects the total number of TDCJ beds available for the permanent assignment of incarcerated individuals. At the end of December 2019, 3,828 beds had been temporarily removed from on-line bed capacity (3,379 due to staffing shortages, 353 due to construction for sheltered housing, 56 due to a wheelchair conversion project, and 40 due to a renovation project). Also at this time, on-line bed capacity did not include 2,242 temporary placement beds, which include medical (hospital beds and unit-based infirmary beds), transfer holding, and pre-hearing detention beds. Incarcerated individuals housed in temporary placement beds also have permanent beds assigned to them. The total number of Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds at the end of December 2019 was 2,845.


- •As of November 2019, there was a net increase of 43 beds to agency capacity. Capacity was reduced by 186 beds at the Stiles unit due to conversion to sheltered housing, reduced by 31 beds (McConnell Unit 4, Ferguson Unit 4, Allred Unit 6, Eastham Unit 10, Mountain View Unit 1, Robertson Unit 6) due to the conversion of cells to medical triage rooms, and increased by 260 beds at the Neal Unit due to the completion of maintenance project.
- •As of October 2019, agency capacity was reduced by 509 beds. This change to capacity included a temporary reduction of 459 beds with 252 beds (Smith Unit) due to staffing shortages, 40 beds (Ellis Unit) due to a renovation project, 167 beds (Pack Unit) for the construction of sheltered housing, and permanent reductions of 50 beds (Ramsey Unit 26 and Byrd Unit 24) for the conversion of space to accommodate dayroom accessible restrooms.
- •As of August 2019, agency capacity was modified due to staffing shortages resulting in a temporary net reduction of 1,625 beds (removed from capacity: Connally Unit 432, Daniel Unit 376, Michael Unit 321, Wallace Unit 252, Stevenson Unit 252, and Lynaugh Unit 260; returned to capacity: Rudd Unit 136, Telford Unit 84, and Jordan-Baten Unit 48). The changes to capacity were made to more effectively manage staffing shortages.
- As of March 2019, 582 beds at the Smith Unit temporarily removed from the on-line bed capacity were re-opened and returned to capacity due to an increase in staffing.

Supplemental Definition and Classification

Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Supervision (Adult Probation) Populations

- ¹ During fiscal year 2010, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Justice Assistance Division transitioned from compiling aggregate population data from counties through the Monthly Community Supervision and Corrections Report (MCSCR) to generating monthly population reports based on detailed case-based data collected through the Community Supervision Tracking System / Intermediate System (CSTS Intermediate System). Community supervision data through fiscal year 2009 are based on population counts reported to the MCSCR, and fiscal years 2010 to the present data are based on monthly reports generated from the CSTS Intermediate System.
- ² Supervision placements include adjudicated probation, deferred adjudication, and return from shock incarceration.
- ³ Successful supervision terminations include early terminations and those with expired terms.
- ⁴ Unsuccessful supervision terminations include revocation to county jail, state jail, prison, and other revocations.

- Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² A new commitment is a juvenile committed to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) for the first time.
- ³ A determinate sentence is a commitment for a specified period of time that is set by the juvenile court and can last up to 40 years in length; those who have not completed their sentence length by their 19th birthday are transferred to the adult system to complete the sentence.
- ⁴ An indeterminate sentence is a commitment for an unspecified length of time up to the individual's 19th birthday; TJJD has sole discretion over the commitment length.
- ⁵Since January 2016, a youth is said to have multiple commitments when there is more than one lawful court order committing him/ her to the TJJD simultaneously. This differs from a recommitted youth, which is a youth who has been *discharged* from a TJJD commitment, usually due to positive completion of the program before age 17, only to reoffend and be *committed again* ("recommitted") by the county juvenile court. Prior to January 2016, the term recommitment was used in the context of what is a multiple commitment.
- ⁶ The parole revocation information in this table presents the offense category that initiated the parole revocation.
- ⁷ Other commitments (also referred to as negative movements) are juveniles returned to a state residential facility for medical care, mental health care, and other non-disciplinary reasons. It also includes juveniles moved to a secure facility for a court hearing that does not result in a revocation.
- ⁸Total admissions is the sum of total new commitments, total multiple and recommitments, total revocations, and other.
- ⁹This calculation included a juvenile who had an unusually long length of stay.


- ¹ A formal referral occurs when: 1) delinquent conduct, conduct indicating a need for supervision (CINS), or violation of probation was allegedly committed; 2) the juvenile probation department has jurisdiction and venue; and 3) face-to-face contact occurs with the department or official designated by the juvenile board. Juveniles are typically referred to juvenile probation departments by schools and police but may also be referred by social workers, parents, and others. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² Misdemeanor Offenses include contempt of magistrate orders in addition to class A and B misdemeanor offenses
- ³ Conduct in Need of Supervision (CINS) is a non-criminal offense for a juvenile and includes public intoxication, truancy, running away from home, fine-only offenses that have been transferred to a juvenile court from a municipal or justice court, inhalant abuse, and expulsion from an alternative school setting for persistent misconduct.
- ⁴ Dispositions reflect the outcomes of referrals to juvenile probation departments. The dispositions listed above do not include consolidated or transferred cases. Adjudicated probation includes all adjudicated dispositions of probation and modification of probation. Dismissed dispositions include dismissals, findings of not guilty, and findings of no probable cause. Supervisory caution is a non-judicial disposition that may involve such actions as referring the child to a social service agency or a community-based first offender program operated by law enforcement, contacting parents to inform them of the child's activities, or simply warning the child about his or her activities. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information. Figures in the table represent the number of cases, not the number of juveniles. A juvenile may have more than one case in a quarter.
- ⁵Juveniles under conditional predisposition, deferred prosecution, or adjudicated probation supervision may also be on Intensive Supervision (ISP) and/or placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility. ISP is a form of supervision that typically involves smaller caseloads supervised by specially trained probation officers and more frequent contacts between the juvenile and his or her probation officer. Juveniles under deferred prosecution or adjudicated probation supervision may be placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility.
- ⁶ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program (JJAEP) table and graph include information associated only with those students with a mandatory placement, those for whom the state provides reimbursement, though JJAEPs may accept students referred for discretionary reasons. The number of mandatory attendance days in June and July are low because many schools close in May and others only operate for part of June. The counts in summer school are also typically low because operating a summer school is optional. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ⁷ Mandatory Attendance Days reflect the sum of the number of days mandatory students attended JJAEPs within the month.
- ⁸ The graph reflects the number of juveniles certified as an adult and the number of cases sent to TJJD state residential facilities.
- ⁹ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program graph reflects mandatory attendance days accrued during the regular school year and does not include those accrued during summer school. Since summer school is optional and only available when sufficient funding exists, including only the regular school year renders year-to-year results that are comparable over time.



Note: TDCJ defines operating capacity as 96.0% of its on-line bed capacity. TDCJ is accustomed to going beyond its operating capacity for short periods of time.





On-line bed capacity reflects the total number of TDCJ beds available for the permanent assignment of incarcerated individuals. At the end of January 2020, 3,828 beds had been temporarily removed from on-line bed capacity (3,379 due to staffing shortages, 353 due to construction for sheltered housing, 56 due to a wheelchair conversion project, and 40 due to a renovation project). Also at this time, on-line bed capacity did not include 2,242 temporary placement beds, which include medical (hospital beds and unit-based infirmary beds), transfer holding, and pre-hearing detention beds. Incarcerated individuals housed in temporary placement beds also have permanent beds assigned to them. The total number of Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds at the end of January 2020 was 2,961.


- •As of January 2019, agency capacity was temporarily reduced by 116 beds (Rudd Unit 68 and Jordan-Baten Unit 48) due to the conversion of transfer facility beds to ISF beds.
- •As of November 2019, there was a net increase of 43 beds to agency capacity. Capacity was reduced by 186 beds at the Stiles unit due to conversion to sheltered housing, reduced by 31 beds (McConnell Unit 4, Ferguson Unit 4, Allred Unit 6, Eastham Unit 10, Mountain View Unit 1, Robertson Unit 6) due to the conversion of cells to medical triage rooms, and increased by 260 beds at the Neal Unit due to the completion of maintenance project.
- •As of October 2019, agency capacity was reduced by 509 beds. This change to capacity included a temporary reduction of 459 beds with 252 beds (Smith Unit) due to staffing shortages, 40 beds (Ellis Unit) due to a renovation project, 167 beds (Pack Unit) for the construction of sheltered housing, and permanent reductions of 50 beds (Ramsey Unit 26 and Byrd Unit 24) for the conversion of space to accommodate dayroom accessible restrooms.
- •As of August 2019, agency capacity was modified due to staffing shortages resulting in a temporary net reduction of 1,625 beds (removed from capacity: Connally Unit 432, Daniel Unit 376, Michael Unit 321, Wallace Unit 252, Stevenson Unit 252, and Lynaugh Unit 260; returned to capacity: Rudd Unit 136, Telford Unit 84, and Jordan-Baten Unit 48). The changes to capacity were made to more effectively manage staffing shortages.
- •As of March 2019, 582 beds at the Smith Unit temporarily removed from the on-line bed capacity were re-opened and returned to capacity due to an increase in staffing.

Supplemental Definition and Classification

Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Supervision (Adult Probation) Populations

- ¹ During fiscal year 2010, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Justice Assistance Division transitioned from compiling aggregate population data from counties through the Monthly Community Supervision and Corrections Report (MCSCR) to generating monthly population reports based on detailed case-based data collected through the Community Supervision Tracking System / Intermediate System (CSTS Intermediate System). Community supervision data through fiscal year 2009 are based on population counts reported to the MCSCR, and fiscal years 2010 to the present data are based on monthly reports generated from the CSTS Intermediate System.
- ² Supervision placements include adjudicated probation, deferred adjudication, and return from shock incarceration.
- ³ Successful supervision terminations include early terminations and those with expired terms.
- ⁴ Unsuccessful supervision terminations include revocation to county jail, state jail, prison, and other revocations.

Texas Juvenile Justice Department: State Correctional Populations

- Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² A new commitment is a juvenile committed to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) for the first time.
- ³ A determinate sentence is a commitment for a specified period of time that is set by the juvenile court and can last up to 40 years in length; those who have not completed their sentence length by their 19th birthday are transferred to the adult system to complete the sentence.
- ⁴ An indeterminate sentence is a commitment for an unspecified length of time up to the individual's 19th birthday; TJJD has sole discretion over the commitment length.
- ⁵Since January 2016, a youth is said to have multiple commitments when there is more than one lawful court order committing him/ her to the TJJD simultaneously. This differs from a recommitted youth, which is a youth who has been *discharged* from a TJJD commitment, usually due to positive completion of the program before age 17, only to reoffend and be *committed again* ("recommitted") by the county juvenile court. Prior to January 2016, the term recommitment was used in the context of what is a multiple commitment.
- ⁶ The parole revocation information in this table presents the offense category that initiated the parole revocation.
- ⁷ Other commitments (also referred to as negative movements) are juveniles returned to a state residential facility for medical care, mental health care, and other non-disciplinary reasons. It also includes juveniles moved to a secure facility for a court hearing that does not result in a revocation.
- ⁸Total admissions is the sum of total new commitments, total multiple and recommitments, total revocations, and other.
- ⁹This calculation included a juvenile who had an unusually long length of stay.


- ¹ A formal referral occurs when: 1) delinquent conduct, conduct indicating a need for supervision (CINS), or violation of probation was allegedly committed; 2) the juvenile probation department has jurisdiction and venue; and 3) face-to-face contact occurs with the department or official designated by the juvenile board. Juveniles are typically referred to juvenile probation departments by schools and police but may also be referred by social workers, parents, and others. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² Misdemeanor Offenses include contempt of magistrate orders in addition to class A and B misdemeanor offenses.
- ³ Conduct in Need of Supervision (CINS) is a non-criminal offense for a juvenile and includes public intoxication, truancy, running away from home, fine-only offenses that have been transferred to a juvenile court from a municipal or justice court, inhalant abuse, and expulsion from an alternative school setting for persistent misconduct.
- ⁴ Dispositions reflect the outcomes of referrals to juvenile probation departments. The dispositions listed above do not include consolidated or transferred cases. Adjudicated probation includes all adjudicated dispositions of probation and modification of probation. Dismissed dispositions include dismissals, findings of not guilty, and findings of no probable cause. Supervisory caution is a non-judicial disposition that may involve such actions as referring the child to a social service agency or a community-based first offender program operated by law enforcement, contacting parents to inform them of the child's activities, or simply warning the child about his or her activities. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information. Figures in the table represent the number of cases, not the number of juveniles. A juvenile may have more than one case in a quarter.
- ⁵Juveniles under conditional predisposition, deferred prosecution, or adjudicated probation supervision may also be on Intensive Supervision (ISP) and/or placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility. ISP is a form of supervision that typically involves smaller caseloads supervised by specially trained probation officers and more frequent contacts between the juvenile and his or her probation officer. Juveniles under deferred prosecution or adjudicated probation supervision may be placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility.
- ⁶ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program (JJAEP) table and graph include information associated only with those students with a mandatory placement, those for whom the state provides reimbursement, though JJAEPs may accept students referred for discretionary reasons. The number of mandatory attendance days in June and July are low because many schools close in May and others only operate for part of June. The counts in summer school are also typically low because operating a summer school is optional. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ⁷ Mandatory Attendance Days reflect the sum of the number of days mandatory students attended JJAEPs within the month.
- ⁸ The graph reflects the number of juveniles certified as an adult and the number of cases sent to TJJD state residential facilities.
- ⁹ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program graph reflects mandatory attendance days accrued during the regular school year and does not include those accrued during summer school. Since summer school is optional and only available when sufficient funding exists, including only the regular school year renders year-to-year results that are comparable over time.



Note: TDCJ defines operating capacity as 96.0% of its on-line bed capacity. TDCJ is accustomed to going beyond its operating capacity for short periods of time.





On-line bed capacity reflects the total number of TDCJ beds available for the permanent assignment of incarcerated individuals. At the end of February 2020, 3,828 beds had been temporarily removed from on-line bed capacity (3,379 due to staffing shortages, 353 due to construction for sheltered housing, 56 due to a wheelchair conversion project, and 40 due to a renovation project). Also at this time, on-line bed capacity did not include 2,242 temporary placement beds, which include medical (hospital beds and unit-based infirmary beds), transfer holding, and pre-hearing detention beds. Incarcerated individuals housed in temporary placement beds also have permanent beds assigned to them. The total number of Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds at the end of February 2020 was 2,961.


- As of January 2020, agency capacity was temporarily reduced by 116 beds (Rudd Unit 68 and Jordan-Baten Unit 48) due to the conversion of transfer facility beds to ISF beds.
- •As of November 2019, there was a net increase of 43 beds to agency capacity. Capacity was reduced by 186 beds at the Stiles unit due to conversion to sheltered housing, reduced by 31 beds (McConnell Unit 4, Ferguson Unit 4, Allred Unit 6, Eastham Unit 10, Mountain View Unit 1, Robertson Unit 6) due to the conversion of cells to medical triage rooms, and increased by 260 beds at the Neal Unit due to the completion of maintenance project.
- •As of October 2019, agency capacity was reduced by 509 beds. This change to capacity included a temporary reduction of 459 beds with 252 beds (Smith Unit) due to staffing shortages, 40 beds (Ellis Unit) due to a renovation project, 167 beds (Pack Unit) for the construction of sheltered housing, and permanent reductions of 50 beds (Ramsey Unit 26 and Byrd Unit 24) for the conversion of space to accommodate dayroom accessible restrooms.
- •As of August 2019, agency capacity was modified due to staffing shortages resulting in a temporary net reduction of 1,625 beds (removed from capacity: Connally Unit 432, Daniel Unit 376, Michael Unit 321, Wallace Unit 252, Stevenson Unit 252, and Lynaugh Unit 260; returned to capacity: Rudd Unit 136, Telford Unit 84, and Jordan-Baten Unit 48). The changes to capacity were made to more effectively manage staffing shortages.
- •As of March 2019, 582 beds at the Smith Unit temporarily removed from the on-line bed capacity were re-opened and returned to capacity due to an increase in staffing.

Supplemental Definition and Classification

Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Supervision (Adult Probation) Populations

- ¹ During fiscal year 2010, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Justice Assistance Division transitioned from compiling aggregate population data from counties through the Monthly Community Supervision and Corrections Report (MCSCR) to generating monthly population reports based on detailed case-based data collected through the Community Supervision Tracking System / Intermediate System (CSTS Intermediate System). Community supervision data through fiscal year 2009 are based on population counts reported to the MCSCR, and fiscal years 2010 to the present data are based on monthly reports generated from the CSTS Intermediate System.
- ² Supervision placements include adjudicated probation, deferred adjudication, and return from shock incarceration.
- ³ Successful supervision terminations include early terminations and those with expired terms.
- ⁴ Unsuccessful supervision terminations include revocation to county jail, state jail, prison, and other revocations.

- ¹ Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² A new commitment is a juvenile committed to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) for the first time.
- ³ A determinate sentence is a commitment for a specified period of time that is set by the juvenile court and can last up to 40 years in length; those who have not completed their sentence length by their 19th birthday are transferred to the adult system to complete the sentence.
- ⁴ An indeterminate sentence is a commitment for an unspecified length of time up to the individual's 19th birthday; TJJD has sole discretion over the commitment length.
- ⁵Since January 2016, a youth is said to have multiple commitments when there is more than one lawful court order committing him/ her to the TJJD simultaneously. This differs from a recommitted youth, which is a youth who has been *discharged* from a TJJD commitment, usually due to positive completion of the program before age 17, only to reoffend and be *committed again* ("recommitted") by the county juvenile court. Prior to January 2016, the term recommitment was used in the context of what is a multiple commitment.
- 6 The parole revocation information in this table presents the offense category that initiated the parole revocation.
- ⁷ Other commitments (also referred to as negative movements) are juveniles returned to a state residential facility for medical care, mental health care, and other non-disciplinary reasons. It also includes juveniles moved to a secure facility for a court hearing that does not result in a revocation.
- ⁸Total admissions is the sum of total new commitments, total multiple and recommitments, total revocations, and other.
- ⁹This calculation included a juvenile who had an unusually long length of stay.


- ¹ A formal referral occurs when: 1) delinquent conduct, conduct indicating a need for supervision (CINS), or violation of probation was allegedly committed; 2) the juvenile probation department has jurisdiction and venue; and 3) face-to-face contact occurs with the department or official designated by the juvenile board. Juveniles are typically referred to juvenile probation departments by schools and police but may also be referred by social workers, parents, and others. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² Misdemeanor Offenses include contempt of magistrate orders in addition to class A and B misdemeanor offenses.
- ³ Conduct in Need of Supervision (CINS) is a non-criminal offense for a juvenile and includes public intoxication, truancy, running away from home, fineonly offenses that have been transferred to a juvenile court from a municipal or justice court, inhalant abuse, and expulsion from an alternative school setting for persistent misconduct.
- ⁴ Dispositions reflect the outcomes of referrals to juvenile probation departments. The dispositions listed above do not include consolidated or transferred cases. Adjudicated probation includes all adjudicated dispositions of probation and modification of probation. Dismissed dispositions include dismissals, findings of not guilty, and findings of no probable cause. Supervisory caution is a non-judicial disposition that may involve such actions as referring the child to a social service agency or a community-based first offender program operated by law enforcement, contacting parents to inform them of the child's activities, or simply warning the child about his or her activities. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information. Figures in the table represent the number of cases, not the number of juveniles. A juvenile may have more than one case in a quarter.
- ⁵Juveniles under conditional predisposition, deferred prosecution, or adjudicated probation supervision may also be on Intensive Supervision (ISP) and/or placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility. ISP is a form of supervision that typically involves smaller caseloads supervised by specially trained probation officers and more frequent contacts between the juvenile and his or her probation officer. Juveniles under deferred prosecution or adjudicated probation supervision may be placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility.
- ⁶ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program (JJAEP) table and graph include information associated only with those students with a mandatory placement, those for whom the state provides reimbursement, though JJAEPs may accept students referred for discretionary reasons. The number of mandatory attendance days in June and July are low because many schools close in May and others only operate for part of June. The counts in summer school are also typically low because operating a summer school is optional. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ⁷ Mandatory Attendance Days reflect the sum of the number of days mandatory students attended JJAEPs within the month.
- ⁸ The graph reflects the number of juveniles certified as an adult and the number of cases sent to TJJD state residential facilities.
- ⁹ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program graph reflects mandatory attendance days accrued during the regular school year and does not include those accrued during summer school. Since summer school is optional and only available when sufficient funding exists, including only the regular school year renders year-to-year results that are comparable over time.



On-line bed capacity reflects the total number of TDCJ beds available for the permanent assignment of incarcerated individuals. At the end of March 2020, 3,828 beds had been temporarily removed from on-line bed capacity (3,379 due to staffing shortages, 353 due to construction for sheltered housing, 56 due to a wheelchair conversion project, and 40 due to a renovation project). Also at this time, on-line bed capacity did not include 2,242 temporary placement beds, which include medical (hospital beds and unit-based infirmary beds), transfer holding, and pre-hearing detention beds. Incarcerated individuals housed in temporary placement beds also have permanent beds assigned to them. The total number of Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds at the end of March 2020 was 2,961.



This change to capacity included a temporary reduction of 459 beds with 252 beds (Smith Unit) due to staffing shortages, 40 beds (Ellis Unit) due to a renovation project, 167 beds (Pack Unit) for the construction of sheltered housing, and permanent reductions of 50 beds (Ramsey Unit 26 and Byrd Unit 24) for the conversion of space to accommodate dayroom accessible restrooms.
- •As of August 2019, agency capacity was modified due to staffing shortages resulting in a temporary net reduction of 1,625 beds (removed from capacity: Connally Unit 432, Daniel Unit 376, Michael Unit 321, Wallace Unit 252, Stevenson Unit 252, and Lynaugh Unit 260; returned to capacity: Rudd Unit 136, Telford Unit 84, and Jordan-Baten Unit 48). The changes to capacity were made to more effectively manage staffing shortages.



Supplemental Definition and Classification

Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Supervision (Adult Probation) Populations

- ¹ During fiscal year 2010, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Justice Assistance Division transitioned from compiling aggregate population data from counties through the Monthly Community Supervision and Corrections Report (MCSCR) to generating monthly population reports based on detailed case-based data collected through the Community Supervision Tracking System / Intermediate System (CSTS Intermediate System). Community supervision data through fiscal year 2009 are based on population counts reported to the MCSCR, and fiscal years 2010 to the present data are based on monthly reports generated from the CSTS Intermediate System.
- ² Supervision placements include adjudicated probation, deferred adjudication, and return from shock incarceration.
- ³ Successful supervision terminations include early terminations and those with expired terms.
- ⁴ Unsuccessful supervision terminations include revocation to county jail, state jail, prison, and other revocations.

- ² A new commitment is a juvenile committed to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) for the first time.
- ³ A determinate sentence is a commitment for a specified period of time that is set by the juvenile court and can last up to 40 years in length; those who have not completed their sentence length by their 19th birthday are transferred to the adult system to complete the sentence.
- ⁴ An indeterminate sentence is a commitment for an unspecified length of time up to the individual's 19th birthday; TJJD has sole discretion over the commitment length.
- ⁵Since January 2016, a youth is said to have multiple commitments when there is more than one lawful court order committing him/ her to the TJJD simultaneously. This differs from a recommitted youth, which is a youth who has been *discharged* from a TJJD commitment, usually due to positive completion of the program before age 17, only to reoffend and be *committed again* ("recommitted") by the county juvenile court. Prior to January 2016, the term recommitment was used in the context of what is a multiple commitment.
- ⁶ The parole revocation information in this table presents the offense category that initiated the parole revocation.
- ⁷ Other commitments (also referred to as negative movements) are juveniles returned to a state residential facility for medical care, mental health care, and other non-disciplinary reasons. It also includes juveniles moved to a secure facility for a court hearing that does not result in a revocation.
- ⁸Total admissions is the sum of total new commitments, total multiple and recommitments, total revocations, and other.
- ⁹This calculation included a juvenile who had an unusually long length of stay.


- ¹ A formal referral occurs when: 1) delinquent conduct, conduct indicating a need for supervision (CINS), or violation of probation was allegedly committed; 2) the juvenile probation department has jurisdiction and venue; and 3) face-to-face contact occurs with the department or official designated by the juvenile board. Juveniles are typically referred to juvenile probation departments by schools and police but may also be referred by social workers, parents, and others. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² Misdemeanor Offenses include contempt of magistrate orders in addition to class A and B misdemeanor offenses.
- ³ Conduct in Need of Supervision (CINS) is a non-criminal offense for a juvenile and includes public intoxication, truancy, running away from home, fine-only offenses that have been transferred to a juvenile court from a municipal or justice court, inhalant abuse, and expulsion from an alternative school setting for persistent misconduct.
- ⁴ Dispositions reflect the outcomes of referrals to juvenile probation departments. The dispositions listed above do not include consolidated or transferred cases. Adjudicated probation includes all adjudicated dispositions of probation and modification of probation. Dismissed dispositions include dismissals, findings of not guilty, and findings of no probable cause. Supervisory caution is a non-judicial disposition that may involve such actions as referring the child to a social service agency or a community-based first offender program operated by law enforcement, contacting parents to inform them of the child's activities, or simply warning the child about his or her activities. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information. Figures in the table represent the number of cases, not the number of juveniles. A juvenile may have more than one case in a quarter.
- ⁵Juveniles under conditional predisposition, deferred prosecution, or adjudicated probation supervision may also be on Intensive Supervision (ISP) and/or placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility. ISP is a form of supervision that typically involves smaller caseloads supervised by specially trained probation officers and more frequent contacts between the juvenile and his or her probation officer. Juveniles under deferred prosecution or adjudicated probation supervision may be placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility.
- ⁶ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program (JJAEP) table and graph include information associated only with those students with a mandatory placement, those for whom the state provides reimbursement, though JJAEPs may accept students referred for discretionary reasons. The number of mandatory attendance days in June and July are low because many schools close in May and others only operate for part of June. The counts in summer school are also typically low because operating a summer school is optional. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ⁷ Mandatory Attendance Days reflect the sum of the number of days mandatory students attended JJAEPs within the month.
- ⁸ The graph reflects the number of juveniles certified as an adult and the number of cases sent to TJJD state residential facilities.
- ⁹ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program graph reflects mandatory attendance days accrued during the regular school year and does not include those accrued during summer school. Since summer school is optional and only available when sufficient funding exists, including only the regular school year renders year-to-year results that are comparable over time.



On-line bed capacity reflects the total number of TDCJ beds available for the permanent assignment of incarcerated individuals. At the end of April 2020, 3,828 beds had been temporarily removed from on-line bed capacity (3,379 due to staffing shortages, 353 due to construction for sheltered housing, 56 due to a wheelchair conversion project, and 40 due to a renovation project). Also at this time, on-line bed capacity did not include 2,242 temporary placement beds, which include medical (hospital beds and unit-based infirmary beds), transfer holding, and pre-hearing detention beds. Incarcerated individuals housed in temporary placement beds also have permanent beds assigned to them. The total number of Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds at the end of April 2020 was 2,961.


- •As of January 2020, agency capacity was temporarily reduced by 116 beds (Rudd Unit 68 and Jordan-Baten Unit 48) due to the conversion of transfer facility beds to ISF beds.
- •As of November 2019, there was a net increase of 43 beds to agency capacity. Capacity was reduced by 186 beds at the Stiles unit due to conversion to sheltered housing, reduced by 31 beds (McConnell Unit 4, Ferguson Unit 4, Allred Unit 6, Eastham Unit 10, Mountain View Unit 1, Robertson Unit 6) due to the conversion of cells to medical triage rooms, and increased by 260 beds at the Neal Unit due to the completion of maintenance project.
- •As of October 2019, agency capacity was reduced by 509 beds. This change to capacity included a temporary reduction of 459 beds with 252 beds (Smith Unit) due to staffing shortages, 40 beds (Ellis Unit) due to a renovation project, 167 beds (Pack Unit) for the construction of sheltered housing, and permanent reductions of 50 beds (Ramsey Unit 26 and Byrd Unit 24) for the conversion of space to accommodate dayroom accessible restrooms.
- •As of August 2019, agency capacity was modified due to staffing shortages resulting in a temporary net reduction of 1,625 beds (removed from capacity: Connally Unit 432, Daniel Unit 376, Michael Unit 321, Wallace Unit 252, Stevenson Unit 252, and Lynaugh Unit 260; returned to capacity: Rudd Unit 136, Telford Unit 84, and Jordan-Baten Unit 48). The changes to capacity were made to more effectively manage staffing shortages.

Supplemental Definition and Classification

Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Supervision (Adult Probation) Populations

- ¹ During fiscal year 2010, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Community Justice Assistance Division transitioned from compiling aggregate population data from counties through the Monthly Community Supervision and Corrections Report (MCSCR) to generating monthly population reports based on detailed case-based data collected through the Community Supervision Tracking System / Intermediate System (CSTS Intermediate System). Community supervision data through fiscal year 2009 are based on population counts reported to the MCSCR, and fiscal years 2010 to the present data are based on monthly reports generated from the CSTS Intermediate System.
- ² Supervision placements include adjudicated probation, deferred adjudication, and return from shock incarceration.
- ³ Successful supervision terminations include early terminations and those with expired terms
- ⁴ Unsuccessful supervision terminations include revocation to county jail, state jail, prison, and other revocations.

- ¹ Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² A new commitment is a juvenile committed to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) for the first time.
- ³ A determinate sentence is a commitment for a specified period of time that is set by the juvenile court and can last up to 40 years in length; those who have not completed their sentence length by their 19th birthday are transferred to the adult system to complete the sentence.
- ⁴ An indeterminate sentence is a commitment for an unspecified length of time up to the individual's 19th birthday; TJJD has sole discretion over the commitment length.
- ⁵Since January 2016, a youth is said to have multiple commitments when there is more than one lawful court order committing him/ her to the TJJD simultaneously. This differs from a recommitted youth, which is a youth who has been *discharged* from a TJJD commitment, usually due to positive completion of the program before age 17, only to reoffend and be *committed again* ("recommitted") by the county juvenile court. Prior to January 2016, the term recommitment was used in the context of what is a multiple commitment.
- ⁶ The parole revocation information in this table presents the offense category that initiated the parole revocation.
- ⁷ Other commitments (also referred to as negative movements) are juveniles returned to a state residential facility for medical care, mental health care, and other non-disciplinary reasons. It also includes juveniles moved to a secure facility for a court hearing that does not result in a revocation.
- ⁸Total admissions is the sum of total new commitments, total multiple and recommitments, total revocations, and other.
- ⁹This calculation included a juvenile who had an unusually long length of stay.


- ¹ A formal referral occurs when: 1) delinquent conduct, conduct indicating a need for supervision (CINS), or violation of probation was allegedly committed; 2) the juvenile probation department has jurisdiction and venue; and 3) face-to-face contact occurs with the department or official designated by the juvenile board. Juveniles are typically referred to juvenile probation departments by schools and police but may also be referred by social workers, parents, and others. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ² Misdemeanor Offenses include contempt of magistrate orders in addition to class A and B misdemeanor offenses.
- ³ Conduct in Need of Supervision (CINS) is a non-criminal offense for a juvenile and includes public intoxication, truancy, running away from home, fine-only offenses that have been transferred to a juvenile court from a municipal or justice court, inhalant abuse, and expulsion from an alternative school setting for persistent misconduct.
- ⁴ Dispositions reflect the outcomes of referrals to juvenile probation departments. The dispositions listed above do not include consolidated or transferred cases. Adjudicated probation includes all adjudicated dispositions of probation and modification of probation. Dismissed dispositions include dismissals, findings of not guilty, and findings of no probable cause. Supervisory caution is a non-judicial disposition that may involve such actions as referring the child to a social service agency or a community-based first offender program operated by law enforcement, contacting parents to inform them of the child's activities, or simply warning the child about his or her activities. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information. Figures in the table represent the number of cases, not the number of juveniles. A juvenile may have more than one case in a quarter.
- ⁵Juveniles under conditional predisposition, deferred prosecution, or adjudicated probation supervision may also be on Intensive Supervision (ISP) and/or placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility. ISP is a form of supervision that typically involves smaller caseloads supervised by specially trained probation officers and more frequent contacts between the juvenile and his or her probation officer. Juveniles under deferred prosecution or adjudicated probation supervision may be placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility.
- ⁶ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program (JJAEP) table and graph include information associated only with those students with a mandatory placement, those for whom the state provides reimbursement, though JJAEPs may accept students referred for discretionary reasons. The number of mandatory attendance days in June and July are low because many schools close in May and others only operate for part of June. The counts in summer school are also typically low because operating a summer school is optional. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.
- ⁷ Mandatory Attendance Days reflect the sum of the number of days mandatory students attended JJAEPs within the month.
- ⁸ The graph reflects the number of juveniles certified as an adult and the number of cases sent to TJJD state residential facilities.
- ⁹ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program graph reflects mandatory attendance days accrued during the regular school year and does not include those accrued during summer school. Since summer school is optional and only available when sufficient funding exists, including only the regular school year renders year-to-year results that are comparable over time.



Note: TDCJ defines operating capacity as 96.0% of its on-line bed capacity. TDCJ is accustomed to going beyond its operating capacity for short periods of time. During April 2020, TDCJ temporarily suspended the transfer of individuals into state custody as part of the effort to contain the spread of COVID-19. Release policies and decisions have not been modified. Individuals are dischared when sentences are completed and released as eligible.





On-line bed capacity reflects the total number of TDCJ beds available for the permanent assignment of incarcerated individuals. At the end of May 2020, 3,828 beds had been temporarily removed from on-line bed capacity (3,379 due to staffing shortages, 353 due to construction for sheltered housing, 56 due to a wheelchair conversion project, and 40 due to a renovation project). Also at this time, on-line bed capacity did not include 2,242 temporary placement beds, which include medical (hospital beds and unit-based infirmary beds), transfer holding, and pre-hearing detention beds. Incarcerated individuals housed in temporary placement beds also have permanent beds assigned to them. The total number of Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds at the end of May 2020 was 2,961.

Capacity Adjustments and Other Notes:


- •As of January 2020, agency capacity was temporarily reduced by 116 beds (Rudd Unit 68 and Jordan-Baten Unit 48) due to the conversion of transfer facility beds to ISF beds.
- •As of November 2019, there was a net increase of 43 beds to agency capacity. Capacity was reduced by 186 beds at the Stiles unit due to conversion to sheltered housing, reduced by 31 beds (McConnell Unit 4, Ferguson Unit 4, Allred Unit 6, Eastham Unit 10, Mountain View Unit 1, Robertson Unit 6) due to the conversion of cells to medical triage rooms, and increased by 260 beds at the Neal Unit due to the completion of maintenance project.
- •As of October 2019, agency capacity was reduced by 509 beds. This change to capacity included a temporary reduction of 459 beds with 252 beds (Smith Unit) due to staffing shortages, 40 beds (Ellis Unit) due to a renovation project, 167 beds (Pack Unit) for the construction of sheltered housing, and permanent reductions of 50 beds (Ramsey Unit 26 and Byrd Unit 24) for the conversion of space to accommodate dayroom accessible restrooms.
- •As of August 2019, agency capacity was modified due to staffing shortages resulting in a temporary net reduction of 1,625 beds (removed from capacity: Connally Unit 432, Daniel Unit 376, Michael Unit 321, Wallace Unit 252, Stevenson Unit 252, and Lynaugh Unit 260; returned to capacity: Rudd Unit 136, Telford Unit 84, and Jordan-Baten Unit 48). The changes to capacity were made to more effectively manage staffing shortages.

During April 2020, TDCJ temporarily suspended the transfer of individuals into state custody as part of the effort to contain the spread of COVID-19. 

Capacity was reduced by 186 beds at the Stiles unit due to conversion to sheltered housing, reduced by 31 beds (McConnell Unit 4, Ferguson Unit 4, Allred Unit 6, Eastham Unit 10, Mountain View Unit 1, Robertson Unit 6) due to the conversion of cells to medical triage rooms, and increased by 260 beds at the Neal Unit due to the completion of maintenance project.
- •As of October 2019, agency capacity was reduced by 509 beds. This change to capacity included a temporary reduction of 459 beds with 252 beds (Smith Unit) due to staffing shortages, 40 beds (Ellis Unit) due to a renovation project, 167 beds (Pack Unit) for the construction of sheltered housing, and permanent reductions of 50 beds (Ramsey Unit 26 and Byrd Unit 24) for the conversion of space to accommodate dayroom accessible restrooms.
- •As of August 2019, agency capacity was modified due to staffing shortages resulting in a temporary net reduction of 1,625 beds (removed from capacity: Connally Unit 432, Daniel Unit 376, Michael Unit 321, Wallace Unit 252, Stevenson Unit 252, and Lynaugh Unit 260; returned to capacity: Rudd Unit 136, Telford Unit 84, and Jordan-Baten Unit 48). The changes to capacity were made to more effectively manage staffing shortages.

On-line bed capacity reflects the total number of TDCJ beds available for the permanent assignment of incarcerated individuals. At the end of June 2020, 3,828 beds had been temporarily removed from on-line bed capacity (3,379 due to staffing shortages, 353 due to construction for sheltered housing, 56 due to a wheelchair conversion project, and 40 due to a renovation project). Also at this time, on-line bed capacity did not include 2,242 temporary placement beds, which include medical (hospital beds and unit-based infirmary beds), transfer holding, and pre-hearing detention beds. Incarcerated individuals housed in temporary placement beds also have permanent beds assigned to them. The total number of Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds at the end of July 2020 was 2,961.



The changes to capacity were made to more effectively manage staffing shortages.

Supplemental Definition and Classification
