Spotlight: Top 100 Federal Funding Sources

In the 2004–05 biennium, appropriated Federal Funds total \$39.2 billion and make up about one-third of the state budget. Improvement in Federal Funds to Texas can be demonstrated by comparing the relative growth of Federal Funds within the state budget. In fiscal year 1983, Federal Funds made up less than one-fifth of the budget. Growth in Federal Funds has averaged 10.3 percent per year for the previous 20 years. Awards from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services accounted for 54.4 percent of all federal grant expenditures in Texas in federal fiscal year 2002.

The Legislative Budget Board issued a report at the end of September on the **Top 100 Federal Funding Sources in the Texas State Budget.** A description for each funding source includes the purpose of the grant, information on how federal allocations to states are determined, match or maintenance of effort provisions, selected information on allowable federal uses or restrictions, and eligibility criteria. The recipient state agency is listed, and if grants are shared by multiple agencies a chart showing the proportionate share of funds is provided. A fiveyear funding history of federal fiscal year awards is included as well. The complete report is available at www.LBB.state.tx.us.
