The Comptroller of Public Accounts (CPA) included this savings in the revised <i>Biennial Revenue Estimate</i> ; therefore, there will be no additional certification savings. The net savings results primarily from increased District Property Value growth, lower-than-anticipated Average Daily Attendance rates, increased non-General Revenue Funds revenues, and federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funding.
